Monday, March 5, 1973 The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Mr. ROSS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I would like to question anybody on the Legal Affairs Committee. Since the wording of this bill crosses out the present daylight saving time to verbiage, does it mean we will not have any daylight saving time until 1976?

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Bath, Mr. Ross, poses a question through the Chair to any member who may answer if he desires.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Rockland, Mr. Emery.

Mr. EMERY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: If I had about three more minutes, I would read the bill over to check the exact language that the gentleman from Bath is referring to. But just a very brief explanation of why we passed this out unanimously "ought to pass."

A few years ago, I believe in 1967, this matter was before the legislature for the first time and it passed without any debate at the time. Now all this does is to put Maine on record as going to daylight savings time all year round, at such a time as six other states in the region do the same thing.

There was a statute of limitations which ran out a few years ago and this is merely reinstating something that was passed a few years back.

If that satisfies the gentleman, or if it doesn't satisfy the gentleman from Bath, I would certainly be happy that this be tabled for a day.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Sabattus, Mr. Cooney.

Mr. COONEY: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I am sorry I am taking action on this measure at this late stage, but I did want to bring to your attention my objections to this bill before we made it a law. If you look at it, it is a short bill and seemingly rather innocuous, but I do represent some small towns, and it does seem to me this is not the kind of thing we want to saddle them with.

It says quite simply that a municipality has to register any ordinance land control at the registry of deeds, and when I talked to the sponsor of the measure and the chairman of the committee that heard it, they felt that this would be a convenience lawyers, who might he to investigating certain land transactions and land development proposals and it would be a service to have all of these ordinances in one central place; namely, at the registry. But I think we are all

aware that our small towns, are already saddled with as much red tape as they care to handle and I am sure that we are going to give them a little more red tape in this legislature.

Furthermore, I wonder, if this particular measure might not be a lawyer's dream, in that should a town fail to register their land use ordinance at the registry of deeds, would that then hold it invalid, or at least invalid in a case where someone was unable to find it listed at the registry?

So, I am going to make the motion that this bill be indefinitely postponed. I am going to ask that the vote be taken by the yeas and nays, and I sincerely hope that we can defeat this measure and not saddle our towns with it and not jeopardize the local ordinances that our towns labored to pass and update year after year.

The SPEAKER: The pending question is on the motion of the gentleman from Sabattus, Mr. Cooney, that item 19, the Bill and all its papers be in d e f in it e l y postponed.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Ellsworth, Mr. McNally.

Mr. McNALLY: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: This bill is a bill that will help the poor fellow, the little fellow, more than it is a lawyer's bill. At the present time, if you are a small fellow, not too much money, and you want to sell a piece of property, and somebody decides they want to buy it, then an attorney must, of course. execute a deed from you to them. They must also, search the title and see what there is that is outstanding against it for ordinances and so forth, according to whatever the person who is going to buy it needs it for.

Now, take down in our little county of Hancock. We have a lady who works in the mill, and she is the Town Clerk of the Town of Eastbrook. Now supposing the attorneys that are in our building have a deed that they have to execute for somebody up there in Eastbrook and they might be a poor blueberry grower too, and it is possible that the only place that

there is any record of a ny ordinance or anything against the owner, the new owner, using it for what he wants to, is in the Town Clerk's office. Now the only time the attorney can find that out will be at night when she is home, or Saturday or Sunday, if she is not working. I just cite that as one instance in Hancock County. And I am sure that we are not alone as a county in having people in small towns who are town clerks and have to work besides being the town clerk for a living.

So the bill itself is to save perhaps a \$75 charge to the people that are selling the land or buying the land or whoever has to buy it for an attorney to go up there at night out of hours and find out what there is against the property as to ordinances or anything else according to the town of Eastbrook.

Now that is what the bill is for. It was changed a little bit by the committee, which I think was correct for them to in that instead of it being put in the registry, it would be kept in a file in the registry of deeds and it seems to me that it just simply means that any ordinance that a town passes in a town meeting, especially in a small town and that is what the bill is supposed to help as much as anything is the small town, they only need to make an extra copy and send it to the registry of deeds and there are files on it. Now, that is my understanding of the bill and I cannot see why it is not an economy measure for the poor fellow as well as for the small town.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lewiston, Mr. Jalbert.

Mr. JALBERT: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I don't think I was here when this bill came out of committee. Would the Clerk tell me how this bill — what was the report of the committee on this item?

The Bill was read by the Clerk.

The SPEAKER: It was a unanimous "Ought to pass" Report in New Draft.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Waterville, Mr. Carey. Mr. CAREY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: In answer to Mr. Cooney of Sabattus, I am not an attorney, however, I do serve as a municipal officer. The City of Waterville has housing codes, has zoning laws. The Planning Board has put out subdivision ordinances and if anyone should be concerned with the passage of this bill, it should be the people, obviously, of the City of Waterville.

We have ruled out the objectionable part to the city which would have had us record the instrument. This would have been fairly costly under the new draft as the sponsor, Mr. McNally, has pointed out. We have changed it to filing, so that all the clerk has to do is testify that this is, in fact, something that has been passed by the municipal officers, certify it, pass it on. This would be of tremendous help to those people who want to do some work in a particular community.

The lawyers have a famous phrase: "Let the buyer beware" so that the buyer himself has to get an attorney to search title and what have you. While he is at the registry searching title, he can also check on the restrictions on land so that his client, the person who he has been hired to represent, can be sure that whatever he is buying the land for can be done in that particular municipality by any of the zoning laws or restrictions that have been laid down by a municipality.

I would certainly urge you to vote against the motion to indefinitely postpone this bill. I feel it is an extremely good piece of legislation.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Skowhegan, Mr. Dam.

Mr. DAM: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I rise to support the motion of Mr. Cooney, because this has been the first session that I have had a chance to serve on the Committee on County Government. I haven't been able to attend all of the meetings because it happens to meet on the same day the Taxation Committee meets, but I have attended quite a few. And the one thing that I have heard continually over and over by the county officers coming in asking for pay raises or salary adjustments or whatever you want to call them, is that we are being loaded up with work, new duties are being put onto us. We have got to expand our office and we have to have more pay.

Now if we allow this to pass today, at the next session, whoever is on that committee will hear the same story, only this time the raises being asked for will be larger. And this, again, is not helping the taxpayer. This is putting a burden on the taxpayer because the county government tax comes right out of their pocket too and to load them up more. All we are doing here is creating another agency within an agency. I don't think this is a good bill and I strongly would urge that we pass the motion to indefinitely postpone.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Rockland, Mr. Emery.

Mr. EMERY: Mr. S p e a k e r, Members of the House: To clear up what might be a little confusing, this was a Legal Affairs bill, not a County Government bill. The committee felt, unanimously I might add, that this would be a covenience not only to the lawyers but to the landowners whose own property might be involved in transfer actions.

Another thing to consider is that with all the new environmental laws we have on the books and all the land use regulation laws, it may become a little confusing for anyone who is trying to buy or sell a piece of property. And unless all the laws and regulations pertaining to a particular town are in one place where a lawyer can find them and check them thoroughly, it is entirely possible that a person might buy a piece of property intending to do something with it when, in fact, under a regulation he never heard of before he might not be able to.

So this is an opportunity for this legislature to help a person and to make something a little bit more convenient. It is not often that we get a chance to do that in this

body without spending a lot of money. The only thing this requires is a looseleaf notebook like you keep your roll calls in at the county seat in the registry, keep a copy of all these different ordinances from each town - some towns don't have very many, only the larger towns and the cities have very many that have to do with zoning and land control and I just can't envision anything any simpler than a town clerk at her own leisure taking a copy of these ordinances, running them off on a Xerox machine, dropping them in the mail and two days later they end up in the county seat. For this little expenditure in money and time, I can't envision a way to make life a lot easier for both the lawyers and individuals who are buying and selling property.

So I certainly hope you will vote against the motion to indefinitely postpone and pass this good bill.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Skowhegan, Mr. Dam.

DAM: Mr. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: To clear up one thing, I am sure if you read your horseblanket tomorrow, you will see that I did not say that this bill had come before the Committee on County Government. I said that we have had many bills before the Committee on County Government and every bill was asking for a pay raise or a salary adjustment. The argument used in 99 out of 100 is that we are having more work put on us, our duties have increased and, therefore, we should have more pay. This is what I said and this is why I make the statement now to clarify it in the gentleman, Mr. Emery's good mind.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Oakland, Mr. Brawn.

Mr. BRAWN: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I served on this committee and I think this is one of the best bills that we have had and I hope you don't go along with indefinite postponement.

In the little town I live in, we record all our deeds there. If we

have to hire another girl to file all of these and control resolves, which is going to have to happen, all she has got to do is send them down here. Then if you want to sell a piece of property, you have not got to pay a lawyer to go to two places to check. He has got it right here and everyone on that committee agreed unanimously this was a good bill and I hope you go along and don't indefinitely postpone this bill.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Sabattus, Mr. Cooney.

Mr. COONEY: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: Just a couple of quick points. Right now I think attorneys are able to write letters to the municipal offices if they cannot get a clerk or selectman by telephone to get the information. It is available. It is public record and I think that the present procedure probably is adequate.

The other point simply has not been spoken to and I would like perhaps some lawyer to tell me if he wouldn't be delighted to run one of these cases through court where a town perhaps has a municipal ordinance concerning lot size. Perhaps they fail to amend They fail to record that it. document and someone purchases a piece of land, subdivides it in violation of the ordinance and the town then tells him, look, we have an ordinance on our books and you are not following it. They say, well you did not register this in the registry of deeds, therefore you cannot make me follow your ordinance. It seems to me that our small towns have enough trouble already enforcing their ordinances without having an added technicality here and a potential cost for legal problems because certainly a developer is going to be delighted to run something like this through court if he is going to be able to gain an advantage, whereas a small town simply does not have the funds or the time or the wherewithal to through this go procedure.

So, once again, I have not heard an answer to that and I still strongly oppose this bill. The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Eastport, Mr. Mills.

Mr. MILLS: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I have been very interested listening to the debate on the floor here and as far as this bill is concerned, I am in favor of it. The reason is, I have spent a year and one month chasing down these titles where there was no record neither in the county or down here in the law library. This way we will have a record in the future which we did not have for the last hundred years.

The SPEAKER: A roll call has been requested. For the Chair to order a roll call, it must have the expressed desire of one fifth of the members present and voting. All those desiring a roll call vote will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.

A vote of the House was taken, and more than one fifth of the members present having expressed a desire for a roll call, a roll call was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The pending question is on the motion of the gentleman from Sabattus, Mr. Cooney, that L. D. 1001, An Act Relating to Recording Municipal Ordinances Relating to Land Control be indefinitely postponed. All those in favor will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.
