Much like constitutional bills which have gone to State Government. I feel they should go to Judiciary, but traditionally they have gone to State Government. I am just mentioning

this so you will know what we have done in the past.

Mr. HICHENS: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: The reason this was brought to my attention was the fact that the Health and Institutional Services Committee heard this identical bill during the 105th Legislature, and we are wondering now why it has been referred to Labor instead of that committee.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Berry.

Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Berry of Cumberland, tabled and tomorrow assigned, pending the motion by Mr. Hichens of York to Reconsider.
