Out of order and under suspension of the rules, on motion by Mr. Katz of Kennebec:

WHEREAS, federal support for the operation of the Boothbay Harbor Fisheries Research Station is being withdrawn and the station closed: and

WHEREAS, the future health, prosperity and welfare of the people of Maine is irrevocably tied to the increased development of our marine resources, the pursuit of knowledge of marine biology, and the establishment of improved aquacultural procedures including the improved commercial harvesting of herring, lobster and other commercial fish; and

Whereas, the pressures of foreign fishing off the Maine coast are creating grave new problems for our fishermen and are causing increased concern that Maine must do more rather than less in marine research; and

the University Whereas, Maine, through its Darling Center at Walpole, is pursuing the status of a Sea Grant Institution, and in Boothbay partnership with the Harbor Fisheries Research Station, the Department of Sea and Shore Fisheries, TRIGOM, Southern Maine Vocational-Technical Institute and the thousands of Maine people who earn their livelihood from the sea need to be formed into a cohesive force to bring Maine into the forefront as a national leader in the harvesting of the resources of the sea; and

WHEREAS, the loss of the Boothday Harbor Fisheries search Station would be a serious blow to the realization of the as-pirations of Maine people; and WHEREAS, the Maine Legis-

lature is deeply concerned by the foregoing; now, therefore, be it

ORDERED, the House concurring, that the Commissioner of Sea and Shore Fisheries is directed to forward our concern to the appropriate agencies of Federal Government and to pursue forthwith all avenues which might result in the advantageous leasing of the Boothbay Harbor Fisheries Research Station to the Department of Sea and Shore Fisheries so that the benefits thereof might continue to accrue to the people of Maine, said leasing to provide either for the operation of the facility unilaterally by the Department or in partnership with the Federal Government; and be it further

ORDERED, that all state departments and the University of Maine cooperate fully with the Commissioner of Sea and Shore Fisheries in the implementation of this Order; and be it further

ORDERED, that the Commissioner report back his findings and recommendations with all due haste to the 106th Legislature; and be it further

ORDERED, that suitable copies of this Order be transmitted forth-with to said Commissioner and members of the Maine Congressional Delegation as notice of our request, (S. P. 255)

Mr. KATZ: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: The text of this order may be found on Pages 7 and 8 of today's advance journal, and I ask that under suspension of the rules it be sent forthwith to the other house.

It is my understanding that things are moving rather quickly down in Washington with respect to the disposition of this facility, which apparently is most assuredly going to be closed. This order directs the Commissioner of Sea and Shore Fisheries to enter into negotiations to discover on what basis Maine can either unilaterally or in conjunction with the federal people operate this facility which is such a significant one in the overall needs of the state. And it orders the Commissioner to report back his findings to the legislature so that we may determine then what action to take.

Joint Resolution STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD THOUSAND NINE ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-THREE

JOINT RESOLUTION MEMO-RIALIZING RICHARD M. NIXON, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, TO LIFT UNITED 18-MONTH MORITORIUM FEDERAL HOUSING PRO-GRAMS.

WHEREAS, the housing supply statistics of the United States Bureau of the Census indicate that there exists in the State of Maine housing supply shortage of critical proportions in the general area of reasonably-priced, safe and sanitary housing; and

shortage of WHEREAS, this housing has been felt most by the low income, moderate income and elderly citizens of the State of Maine; and

WHEREAS, the above housing shortage is most critical in the more rural communities of the

State of Maine; and

WHEREAS, the conventional housing market is unable to provide a sufficiently large supply of reasonably priced. safe sanitary housing to fill the just needs of the above-noted citizens of the State of Maine; and

WHEREAS, governmental incentives and subsidies have been provided by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Farmers' Home Administration of the United States Department of Agriculture; and

WHEREAS. the above-noted Federal Governmental Departments have recently declared a moratorium of 18-months' duration on the provision of the above-cited incentives, subsidies and resulting housing production; and

WHEREAS, such an 18-month moratorium will constitute a significant economic and social hard-Maine by ship in eliminating housing starts, and a resultant loss to the Maine economy, and a deprivation to Maine workers of much employment opportunity; now. therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Maine do hereby memoralize the Congress of the United States and the Executive Branch of the United States Government to consider the severe hardships this 18-month Freeze of Federal Subsidies on Housing will cause to the citizens of this State and to propose alternate methods of continuing these programs immediately or to reinstate the suspended services until such time as such alternate methods have been devised.
