Tuesday, February 20, 1973 Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by The Honorable Ben-

nett D. Katz of Augusta.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Speers.

Mr. SPEERS: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: This body and that other distinguished body at the other end of the hall will soon have a bill to debate before it which will affect 200 million people, and without further comment on this particular issue I move that the Senate recede and concur with the House.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from Kennebec, Senator Speers, moves that the Senate recede and concur with the House. Is this the pleasure of the Senate?

WHEREAS, effective legislative performance is directly related to the effectiveness of committee performance: and

WHEREAS, the performance of legislative committees would be greatly enhanced with the aid of new staff by providing for interim accounting of legislative appropriations and mandates; and

WHEREAS, only in this fashion can the Legislature equip itself for the necessary independent effort to become the central force in terms of setting policy for the State of Maine; now, therefore, be it

ORDERED, the Senate concurring, that the Joint Standing Committees of the Legislature on Education, Health and Institutional Services and Transportation be authorized to examine the operation of the Departments of: Educational and Cultural Services; Health and Welfare; Mental Health and Corrections and Transportation during periods when the Legislature is not in session to ascertain

the accountability of said departments as to appropriations and statutes and whether the respective programs provided are conducted in an efficient and effective manner or require modification or elimination, and to report the results of such findings to the next special or regular session of the Legislature; and be it further

ORDERED, that each of said Joint Standing Committees shall have at its disposal one of the newly appointed necessary professional legislative staff to properly discharge the purpose of this Order: and be it further

ORDERED, that all departments and agencies of State Government shall cooperate with the respective committees and are directed to provide such technical and other assistance as each committee deems necessary or desirable to carry out the purposes of this Order, including, but not limited to personnel and staff as a part of their regular employment and the study of any subject or matter adjudged by said committees to be relevant or germane to the subject of this accounting or helpful to it in the consummation of their work as ordered, shall be deemed within the scope of said committee's inquiry hereunder: and be further

ORDERED, that the members of these committees shall be compensated at the rate of \$20 per day while engaged in the performance of its duties and shall be reimbursed for all reasonable expenses actually incurred; and be it further

ORDERED, that \$35,000 be appropriated from the Legislative Account to be divided equally among said committees to carry out the purposes of this Order. (H. P. 657)

FORTIER: Mr. President Members of the Senate: Mr. and Tomorrow morning we will have in the lobby on this floor here a display of Maine tourmalines. You are probably aware that the State of Maine is producing some of the finest and some of the most beautiful and most expensive tourmalines in the world.

The history of the tourmaline in Maine goes back to 1820, when the Hamlin boys discovered tourma-lines in the State of M a i n e. More recently in my County of Oxford, in the Town of Newry, they have discovered a quarry of tourmalines which is considered probably the most beautiful and the most expensive in the world.

At this time the State of Maine owns no Maine tourmaline, although in the museum, we do have, I believe, a few South American tourmalines. Later on in the session you will be asked to pass on a bill appropriating money so that the State may acquire some of these tourmalines.

Now, on this display tomorrow, I am not able to give you the description or the monetary value, but suffice it to say that the owners of this display have insisted that it have police protection every moment that it is in the capitol here, and I do hope you will find time to look at this display to appreciate one more of the many beautiful things which the good Lord has given us here in Maine.
