ORDERED, the House concurring, that a special commission shall be constituted and appointed study the subject area of "An Legislative Document 1523. Act Establishing a Comprehensive Health Insurance Program for the Maine." which was introduced before the 106th Legislature, and to report results and recommendations of said study to the regular session 107th Legislature. Such the commission shall employ such counsel as may be required to perform the necessary research and drafting and shall perform such other duties as the commission may require. Such commission shall hold such public hearings as be deemed necessary to may acquaint the public.

The membership of the commission shall consist of 16 persons: members of the Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate; 3 members of the House, appointed by the Speaker of the House; and 11 members from the public, appointed by the Governor.

Provided. however, that the Governor shall appoint as 6 public members those persons nominated by the Maine Hospital Association, Maine-domiciled mutual insurance company providing health insurance to residents of Maine, Maine Medical Association, Comprehensive Health Planning Agency of the Department of Health and Welfare, Maine Blue Cross and Blue Shield and Medical Care Development, Inc., and each of the aforementioned organizations shall be entitled to nominate one individual.

The said commission shall be promptly appointed enactment hereof and the Governor shall notify all members of the time and place of the first meeting. At that time, the commission shall organize, elect a chairman, vicechairman and secretary-treasurer and adopt rules as to the administration of the commission and its The commission affairs. shall maintain minutes of meetings.

The commission shall contract such counsel as is deemed necessary, who shall be a resident of this State, who shall have the responsibility for legal research, under the direction and supervision of the commission. No person shall be employed as counsel who shall not, by virtue of prior training, experience, ability and reputation have clearly demonstrated the ability to perform the tasks to be assigned to him by the commission.

The members of the commission shall serve without compensation, but may be reimbursed for their reasonable expenses in connection with attending meetings, procuring supplies, correspondence and other related and necessary expenditures.

There is allocated from the Legislative Account the sum of \$15,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1974 to carry out the purposes of this Act. Any unexpended balance shall not lapse but shall remain a continuing carrying account until June 30, 1975. (S. P. 658)

Mr. SPEERS: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I feel that this particular piece of legislation should not go by without calling the Senate's attention to what I think is one of the more major pieces of legislation that will be coming before this body this year.

Senator Tanous introduced a bill which would have re-established the Commission on Drug Abuse. Senator Brennan from Cumberland introduced a bill which dealt with alternative sentencing for drug abuse offenders. The Committee on State Government. working through the staff which the legislature, in its great wisdom, saw fit at the beginning of this session to provide for itself, put these two bills together and came out with a new draft which would combine the Maine Commission on Drug Abuse and the Division o f Alcoholism Services, which is now a part of the Department of Health and Welfare, the Bureau Rehabilitation. By so doing, we are creating a new office of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Prevention within the Department of Health and Wel-

By putting these two similar problems together, we are merging three citizen panels, with a total membership of 56 people, into one

advisory council with a membership of 17. We are abolishing the titles of Director of the Division of Alcoholism and Executive Director in the Maine Commission on Drug Abuse, and replacing both of these with one director for the new office.

Ιt contemplated that putting these two together and combining the efforts under one office at a high level within the Department of Health and Welfare that the potential for federal funds to attack these two problems will be greatly increased.

As I mentioned, we have included within this new draft the provisions by the good Senator from Cumberland, Senator Brennan, for alternative sentencing for violators of drug laws. By that, we mean that at the discretion of the court these individuals may be sentenced to drug abuse treatment centers instead of to long jail sentences.

These are the primary provisions of this particular bill and, Mr. President, I could not speak highly enough of the legislative staff that worked on this new draft. It demonstrates once again the great worth to the legislature, and ultimately to the people of the State of Maine, that the legislature has brought about by hiring the staff members who are able to spend their full time working on matters such as this.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Tanous.

Mr. TANOUS: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I wish to commend Senator Speers from Kennebec and the Committee on State Government for coming out with such a comprehensive bill which, in my opinion, certainly is an answer to the problems that we presently have in the area of trying to solve the problem of drugs and alcoholism. They certainly should be commended for the tremendous amount of effort put into this bill. Thank you.

Mr. SPEERS: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: Yesterday I made reference to the efforts on behalf of many to try and come up with some solution to this particular bill that would at least satisfy or bring the two sides closer together in what many were considering to be definite problems and real hardships in the bill as it presently stands.

Yesterday afternoon. after offering this amendment, many of us met in the offices of the good Senator from Cumberland, Senator Richardson, who took a very active interest in this particular bill and in the amendments that were offered to it, in an attempt to thoroughly understand the problems that had been raised and in an attempt to arrive at some kind of compromise and agreement on behalf of the two sides as to what might be done with this bill, and with the amendments, so that we could come up with a bill that all of us, I hope, could support very enthusiastically.

I would like to commend the good Senator from Cumberland, Senator Richardson, and the good Senator from Aroostook, Senator Cyr, who was at that meeting as well, for their interest and for the lengthy discussion that took place. I feel it was quite a productive session, and I am very hopeful that we can come up with an amendment which will satisfy all parties to this bill. I think that was the of that meeting. Unfortunately, that amendment cannot be ready this quickly for this morning's session, but I am quite confident that we will produce the amendment which all sides will be able to enthusiastically support.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Aroostook, Senator Cyr.

Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Cyr of Aroostook, retabled and Tomorrow Assigned, pending the motion by that Senator to Indefinitely Postpone Senate Amendment "B".

The President laid before the Senate the ninth tabled and specially assigned matter:

Bill, "An Act Clarifying Interest Charges on Personal Loans in Excess of \$2,000." (S. P. 383) (L. D. 1129)

Tabled — June 6, 1973 by Senator Cox of Penobscot.

Pending — Passage to be Engrossed. (Committee Amendment "A" (S-192).

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Brennan.

Mr. BRENNAN: Mr. President, an inquiry: is Committee Amendment "A" on the bill now?

The PRESIDENT: The Chair would answer in the affirmative, Committee Amendment "A" has been adopted.

Mr. BRENNAN: Mr. President, under suspension of the rules, I would move we reconsider our action whereby the Senate adopted Committee Amendment "A".

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from Cumberland, Senator Brennan, now moves that, under suspension of the rules, the Senate reconsider its action whereby it adopted Committee Amendment "A". Is this the pleasure of the Senate?

The motion prevailed.

On further motion by the same Senator, Committee Amendment "A" was Indefinitely Postponed and the Bill Passed to be Engrossed.

Sent down for concurrence.

The President laid before the Senate the tenth tabled and specially assigned matter:

Bill, "An Act to Amend the Land Use Regulation Commission Law." (H. P. 627) (L. D. 851)

Tabled — June 6, 1973 by Senator Berry of Cumberland.

Pending — Passage to be Engrossed. (Committee Amendment "A" (H-471).)

On motion by Mr. Berry of Cumberland, retabled and Tomorrow Assigned, pending Passage to be Engrossed.

The President laid before the Senate the matter tabled earlier in today's session at the request of Mr. Wyman of Washington:

Bill, "An Act Exempting Gas for Cooking and Heating in Homes from Sales Tax." (H. P. 379) (L. D. 508)

Pending — Passage to be Engrossed.

Mr. Anderson of Hancock then moved that the Bill and all accompanying papers be Indefinitely Postponed.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from Hancock, Senator Anderson, now moves that Bill, "An Act Exempting Gas for Cooking and Heating in Homes from Sales Tax," be indefinitely postponed.

The Senator has the floor.

Mr. ANDERSON: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I am in full accord with the remarks made yesterday by the Senator from Oxford, Senator Fortier, regarding exemption of gas for cooking and heating. If we don't stop continually whitling away our tax program, we will soon be faced with a major tax that will stagger the imagination.

I use gas in my own home and I am perfectly willing to pay the tax. My neighbor doesn't use gas, and should he be required to help make up this \$500,000 deficit? I don't think so. So, I ask my colleagues to go along with me this morning on my motion to indefinitely postpone this measure. We have got to stop this continual erosion of our tax program. Mr. President, when the vote is taken, I move it be taken by the yeas and nays.

The PRESIDENT: A roll call has been requested.

The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Hichens.

Mr. HICHENS: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I am reluctant to get up in opposition to my good friend, the Senator from Hancock, Senator Anderson, but I think this is a most discriminatory law that we have at the present time, where people who heat their homes with oil do not have to pay a tax, yet people who heat their homes with gas do.

As I was talking with the Senator from Oxford, Senator Fortier, yesterday, he said well probably the best thing to do would be to make the people who buy oil pay the tax rather than exempt those who burn gas from paying the tax. Perhaps this is the way that we should handle this, but this is a very discriminatory thing.

I did not argue it two years ago because I at that time used gas for heating my home. Having moved to another home where I burn oil now, I do not have to pay a tax, but I still am in great

sympathy with those people that do. Even though the state may lose \$500,000, I think it is just as well it go to those people as it is when we give \$500,000 to the horse racing people to help them out.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Washington, Senator Wyman.
Mr. WYMAN: Mr. President and

Members of the Senate: We talk about the income tax being a fair tax because it lays the burden on those who earn larger incomes. At one time gas was sort of a luxury to use in the home and very few people used it. Now a great many of the lower income people do use and, along with the same thinking under which we have a progressive income tax, it seems to me that so many people use gas now for heating that it too should be exempted along with oil and wood. I oppose the motion of the good Senator from Hancock, Senator Anderson.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Ox-

ford, Senator Fortier.

Mr. FORTIER: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I appreciate that there is not a single tax that we can discuss here but what is not going to hurt somebody. I also appreciate that there may be certain inequities in this tax, but I would like to point out that the cure for all our ills is not always to take the tax off from the individual that is paying a fair tax in order to equalize him with some one who is getting away with something. I really believe that eventually the better solution, if we could ever get it through the legislature, would be to assess a tax on all methods of heating our homes, but to cause another injustice in order to try and correct an injustice which now exists does not seem to be the way. This is the way we are eroding our tax base. This is the way we are increasing all our taxes. This is one of the many reasons people have had it on taxes.

The PRESIDENT: The pending question before the Senate is the motion of the Senator from Hancock, Senator Anderson, that Bill, "An Act Exempting Gas for Cooking and Heating in Homes

from Sales Tax", be indefinitely postponed. A roll call has been requested. Under the Constitution, in order for the Chair to order a roll call, it requires the affirmative vote of at least one-fifth of those Senators present and voting. Will all those Senators in favor of ordering a roll call please rise and remain standing until counted.

Obviously more than one-fifth having arisen, a roll call is ordered. The pending motion before the Senate is the motion of the Senator from Hancock, Senator Anderson, that Bill, "An Act Exempting Gas for Cooking and Heating in Homes from Sales Tax", be indefinitely postponed. A "Yes" vote will be in favor of indefinite postponement; a "No" vote will be opposed.

The Secretary will call the roll.

Such report shall be of substantially the same form and content as that required by federal candidates by federal law, and as this Legislature has recently voted to require of gubernatorial candidates. (H. P. 1583)

Comes from the House, Read and Passed.

On motion by Mr. Berry of Cumberland, tabled pending Passage.

On motion by Mr. Sewall of Penobscot the Senate voted to take from the Special Appropriations Table, An Act Providing Additional Funds for Maine State American Revolution Bicentennial Commission. (H. P. 484) (L. D. 628)

Pending — Enactment.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator has the floor.

Mr. SEWALL: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I have been advised by the Legislative Finance Office that there is no cost on this legislative document. Therefore, Mr. President, I move the pending question.

The PRESIDENT: Is the Senate

ready for the question?

Thereupon, the Bill was Passed to be Enacted and, having been signed by the President, was by the Secretary presented to the Governor for his approval.

On motion by Mr. Sewall of Penobscot, the Senate voted to take from the Special Appropriations Table, An Act Authorizing Use of Maine Turnpike by Legislators. (H. P. 1281) (L. D. 1668)

Pending — Enactment.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator has the floor.

Mr. SEWALL: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: Again, I confused a statement made by the Legislative Finance Office on my journal today, which indicated that there was no cost on this legislative document. Therefore, Mr. President, I move the pending question.

The PRESIDENT: Is the Senate

ready for the question?

Thereupon, the Bill was Passed to be Enacted and, having been signed by the President, was by the Secretary presented to the Governor for his approval.

On motion by Mr. Sewall of Penobscot,
