State of Maine In The Year Of Our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-Five In Memoriam

Having Learned Of The Death Of Mrs. Minnie E.C. Knapp

The Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Maine do hereby extend their sincere heartfelt condolences and sympathy to the bereaved family and friends of the deceased; and further

While duly assembled in session at the State Capitol in Augusta under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Maine, do herein direct that this official expression of sorrow be forthwith sent to the family of the deceased on behalf of the Legislature and the people of the State of Maine. Mr. GRAHAM: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: Why are we memorializing this person? Because Minnie Knapp was one of the most extraordinary individuals who has made the State of Maine famous for her many talents and her tremendous energy. Not only did she serve in the Legislature for three terms, but she was also very active in town affairs, having served in practically all town offices, including being a member of the school board, a member of the town council, and so forth. In addition, she was a licensed detective, an insurance agent, and for fifty-five years she served as a registered pharmacist. In this capacity she was serving at the time of her death when she was 76 years old. The Town of Yarmouth voted her the most distinguished citizen for 1974. Survived by a son and three daughters, she was loved and respected by all and was a leader in her community and a credit to the State of Maine. I move the passage of this joint resolution.
