> **Senate Papers Joint Resolution**

Mrs. Cummings of Penobscot (Cosponsor: Mr. Pray of Penobscot) presented the following Joint Resolution and moved its adoption:

In the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-five

Joint Resolution Memorializing the Honorable Caspar W. Weinburger, Secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare of the United States to Restore Medicare-Medicaid Funds to the Local Hospitals of the Towns of Dexter, Milo and Similar Communities.

WE, your Memorialists, the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Maine now assembled in Regular Session of the One Hundred and Seventh Legislative Session, most respectfully present and petition the Secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and the United States Congress as follows

WHEREAS, the Plummer Memorial Hospital has served the medical needs of Dexter, Maine continuously and well since

its opening in 1920; and WHEREAS, the townspeople of Dexter have aided and supported this hospital, and have provided an ambulance service for this hospital, serviced by the volunteer fire department; and

WHEREAS, the Plummer Memorial Hospital has been licensed by the State of Maine for the year 1975 to serve the people of Dexter, a license recognized by all major medical insurance companies, including Blue Cross-Blue Shield; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has decided, contrary to the almost unanimous vote of the March, 1974 Dexter town meeting, that the Plummer Memorial Hospital shall be closed and that the people of Dexter shall be forced to use a regional hospital to be built in Dover-Foxcroft, 13 miles to the north; and

WHEREAS, the department has decided, based upon a technical and controversial interpretation of one regulation of the Federal Fire Code, that the hospital, in existence since 1920, is in violation of that fire code and must be closed; and

WHÉREAS, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has, therefore, cut off all but emergency Medicare-Medicaid funds to the Plummer Memorial Hospital, an action intended to close that facility; and

WHEREAS, the people of Dexter have received little cooperation from the regional director of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, who seems unconcerned about the welfare of the people of Dexter when that welfare conflicts with a regionalization plan previously decided upon; and

WHEREAS, the situation in Dexter is too often repeated in other areas of Maine; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of this State sympathizes with the struggle of all people who desire to preserve their own hospital facilities and their independence from the dictates of a huge federal agency; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, hereby record our dissatisfaction with the actions of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and with the actions and uncooperative attitude of certain of its regional representatives, and respectfully urge and petition the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare and the Congress of the United States to take appropriate action to help the people of Dexter, Milo and similar communities to maintain their own hospital facilities as active and useful hospitals serving the local needs of rural areas by restoring the use of all Medicare-Medicaid funds; and be it further

RESOLVED: That a copy of this Memorial, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be immediately transmitted by the Secretary of State to the Secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare of the United States, and to the Members of the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States Congress from this State.

Mrs. CUMMINGS: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I would call attention to the reprint of a newspaper article which I had put on your desks. Some of it is very pertinent to this memorialization. I would read two sentences that are from this:

"The founding fathers of our country perceived that government could indeed be a menace, that instead of serving the people, government could become an officious master ordering the people around.

Perhaps some of you read in the "Letters to the Editor" section of the Sunday Portland Telegram yesterday a protest from a writer who was writing about the flood insurance program which the government is going to force upon us in fact they are in the process right now by saying that you can't have a mortgage, that you can't build, and you can't do lots of things to your own private home unless you pay twenty-five cents per thousand dollar valuation for this insurance. In the meantime, you can't even get that insurance unless the towns belong to an organization that is set up by the federal government. It is just one more way, I think, that we are losing our freedoms, and I would like to hope that we are alive, alert and aware of these things.

The end of this reprint says that "The intrusions upon freedom and federalism would get nowhere if the people took a more vigilant interest in what government is up to." So I think that we should try to keep aware of these things and not just be bemused by what we have been led to believe might be free monies because I do think that, although at one point we were not able to start our cars unless we had seatbelts fastened and somebody put the pressure on the government and they rescinded that order, it is going to take a lot of pressure and a lot of real awareness of what is happening to us.

I would like to move the passage of this

resolution.

Senator Katz.
Mr. KATZ: Mr. President, I notice that within the Senate this is a divided report.

Might I inquire through the Chair as to the rationale of the majority?

The PRESIDENT pro tem: The Senator from Kennebec, Senator Katz, has addressed an inquiry to any member of the Committee on Legal Affairs, who may respond if he cares to.

The Chair recognizes the Senator from

Somerset, Senator Corson.
Mr. CORSON: Mr. President and
Members of the Senate: It is obvious that there was some disagreement on this bill. What the bill provides is that it will no longer be legal for a motor vehicle operator to wear a radio headset in his automobile or on a motorcycle. It was the feeling of the individuals signing the majority report that this does pose a traffic hazard, and that when one is wearing such a device and listening to a stereo set or radio he is unable to hear the audio warning signals, such as a horn or a railroad crossing signal and, therefore, would be posing a traffic hazard.

I think I can also explain that the feeling of the minority was that this was unnecessarily restrictive and it was not necessary to pass such legislation.

We debated it at some length and the results are as you see on the report. I hope that satisfies the Senator's question.

The PRESIDENT pro tem: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Somerset, Senator Cianchette.

Mr. CIANCHETTE: Mr. President, I appreciate the Chairman of the Committee giving the report as requested and I feel that I ought to put in my two cents worth, at least.

The thrust of the bill, I am sure, is well-intended and well-meaning, and that is to stop people from riding motorcycles and driving their automobiles with headsets on, I suppose, with the music or radio turned up so loud that they can't hear signals around them and that might interfere with their driving. It is honorable and I agree with that, and I think it is doggone poor taste and poor judgment for a driver to be doing such a thing.

Then there are all the other kinds of

drivers who may be doing this thing in a perfectly legitimate, respectable and responsible manner, where they may for some reason want to be listening to a radio. And it may be in such a case that they do not have all the outside noise turned off. Compare that, if you would, with an automobile with a tape deck playing in there with the music turned up and the windows closed. That driver can't hear the audible signals that he ought to be hearing, but there is no law that says he can't do that.

I think that here is another place that we are just restricting and taking away little rights from the people of this state in the great and honorable terms of safety and motherhood, and all that sort of thing. I don't think we were sent down here to pass this kind of legislation. I think the people are getting sick of this kind of legislation, and I think that this legislation ought to be defeated.

I had intended to make my stand on the second reading and not today but, since we are talking about it, I would urge you to vote against acceptance of the majority report and put this bill where it belongs.

The PRESIDENT pro tem: The Chair understands the Senator from Somerset, Senator Cianchette, moves that the Senate accept the Minority Ought Not to Pass Report.

Mr. CURTIS: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I would like to speak very briefly in support of the Senator from Somerset, Senator

Cianchette, in his motion.

I would like to read the last two sentences from an editorial in today's Bangor Daily News. It happens to be on the subject of the legislature enacting laws regarding motorcycles and motorcyclists. It doesn't happen to be exactly this particular bill but another similar bill, but at any rate, the editorial writer concludes, "Laws to protect people from themselves should be used very sparingly, if at all. In this case, the motorcyclists prefer to be guardians of their own safety and welfare, and not singled out for protection every time the legislature convenes.

Mr. President, I think perhaps the

editorial writer is correct.
The PRESIDENT pro tem: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Hichens.
