Honorable Joseph E. Brennan Governor of Maine State House, Augusta Members, 110th Legislature Dear Governor Brennan and Members of the Legislature:

In accordance with the provisions of 5 MRSA, Section 1005, the Trustees of the Maine State Retirement System submit herewith an annual report showing the fiscal transactions of the Retirement System of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1980, together with the assets and liabilities of the System of the Sys bilities of the System at the end of that year. This report includes the following

Report of the Actuary for the Year Ended June 30, 1980 Report of the Investment Consultant Report of the Executive Director Group Life Insurance Underwriter's Report for the policy year ended June 30, 1980

Membership to the Board of Trustees is comprised of eight persons; seven voting members and the State Treasurer who is an ex-officio non-voting member. Three members of the Board are appointed by the Governor, subject to review and approval by the Joint Standing Committee on Aging, Retirement & Veterans and confirmation by the Legislature, one of whom is named from a list of three persons submitted by the Maine Retired Teachers Association; one member elected by the Maine Teachers Association; one member elected by the Maine State Employees Association, one member appointed by the Maine Municipal Association; and one member who is a recipient of a retirement allowance under the System, selected by the foregoing members.

The value of the System's investments at June 30, 1980, was \$272,523,379. Investments were comprised of bonds (\$117,101,913), common stocks (\$120,126,223), mortgage and mortgage type (\$26,295,241), and other investments (\$9,000,000).

Investment earnings credited to the System totalled \$34,543,688 during the year. The rate of return on these investments, based on book value, was 7.88%

At year end there was cash on deposit with the State Treasurer's office amounting to \$39,-

149,222, which was invested in the State Treasurer's "Cash Pool." Interest is credited on a monthly basis and the average interest earnings credited to these funds during the year was 12.72%.

Investment return from securities under management by investment managers is measured as the "time-weighted rate of return, and is based upon the market value of securities, including market value gains and losses and investment earnings. The time-weighted rate of return for the year ending June 30, 1980, was 14% as compared to 11.1% for the previous fiscal year. The time-weighted rate of return on equity investments was 23% and on fixed income investments 2.1%

The Trustees have held two meetings during the past year with investment managers, for the purpose of reviewing the performance of respective investments under management, and understanding the techniques and strategies used by managers in the past, and plans for the future. Subsequent to the close of the fiscal year the Trustees took an action to authorize the investment of an additional \$6,000,000 for equity management by Merrill Trust Company of Bangor, \$6,000,000 for equity management by Alliance Capital Management Corp., \$6,000,000 for management by The Travelers Insurance Company (real estate equity fund). and the employment of an additional fixed income manager (FMR Investment Service, Inc. of Boston). This investment action was taken after various available investment vehicles were reviewed by the Board at a special Board meeting held in the spring

The Trustees have taken an action to request funding for the so-called "non-contributory" teacher group in the amount of \$12,000,000 in the first year of the biennium, and \$13,200,000 in the second year of the biennium. Expenditures for retirement benefits on this group, together with interest charges, have exceeded appropriations and other credits to the extent of \$141,017,263 as of June 30, 1980. It is believed that funding for this item is essential to maintain the integrity of the total System.

Under date of March 4, 1980, the Joint Select Committee to Study the Maine State Retirement System, appointed by the 109th Legislature, submitted a report to the Legislature with numerous recommendations. This report included a report prepared by The Wyatt Company, an actuarial firm which had been engaged by the Committee. The Wyatt Company recommended actuarial assumptions, which if adopted, would result in significantly higher appropriation funding for the System. After a careful review of The Wyatt Company recommendations as to actuarial assumptions with the System's Actuary (Towne & Associates), it was the Trustees position that the current assumptions continue to be valid until the experience study covering these assumptions, which is currently in progress, is completed and the System's Actuary reports to the Board of Trustees in 1981.

Senator KERRY: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, it gives me great pleasure to speak in favor of Mr. Richard Marshall, to be confirmed as a member of the University of Maine Board of Trustees. Mr. Marshall is a very fine academician. He has spent his last 22 years in public service as a high school teacher at Biddeford High School. He was educated in the State of Maine, at Old Orchard Beach High School. He received his B.A. degree from the University of Maine in Orono. He received his Masters degree from the University of Southern Maine.

Throughout his teaching career, he has spent many years getting additional degrees and taking courses in mathematics, his specialty. Also, he has spent much time working with many young students. Athletes that I have known that have had needs and assistance throughout their young high school career have received many fine recommendations from Mr. Marshall. He has also helped guide them through their postgraduate and graduate school studies.

My main concern for Mr. Marshall is that I think he is a person that will be very able to make many of the very difficult decisions, since he is a businessman, especially as they relate to the economics and the valued judgements that would have to be made by a person who is involved with the University of Maine. He desires this job, and I think the people from the Education Committee could attest to the fact that he is a sincere, somewhat shy person, but well versed in all the issues that are timely for people in the education community today.

I have known Mr. Marshall for over 20 years. He has served on the Town Council in Old Orchard Beach, and many boards in our own town. He has been known to be a very honorable person. He has served the public well in many capacities. I think, it bodes well for the University System, that someone who is so well versed in the educational issues of the day, would take the time and effort to dedicate his time to this.

I might add that Mr. Marshall did not seek out this position. He was requested by the Governor of the State to take this position. I think that is a significant factor. He has made every accommodation with his local school system to accept this. They have also endorsed him highly. Therefore, I would hope that everyone would back the nomination and vote to confirm

Mr. Marshall. Thank you.

Senator PIERCE: Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I would agree basically with the statements of the good Senator from Old Orchard, Senator Kerry. I do plan to vote for

Mr. Marshall today.
As you will note, the Report of the Committee indicates that I did not support him, but I do want the Record to show that it certainly is not because of any of his individual lack of qualifications, but just, I think, probably what I consider to be a flaw in the system.

Our confirmation procedure is something less than ideal. Probably many people would agree with that. It seems to me that we compound that sometimes, when we rush through these nominations, in what, at least in my estimation, is a little bit too quickly. That particular morning, as a member of the Education Committee, I was asked to sit and listen to his confirmation proceedings. I also had a Medical Education Advisory Committee meeting, which, because of the problems with the compact, I felt was very, very important to be at. I had to appear before the Appropriations Committee that morning on something that I also felt was important. To top all of that, as Chair-man of the Election Laws Committee, I had to bring that Committee into session.

I would just prefer that in these nominations, if we could have just a little bit more time, I think it would make more sense. When I go back into a committee room at the end, not having heard any of the testimony, it doesn't give any time to receive any written testimony, it doesn't give any time to discuss with your colleagues at length what may have been the pros and cons of a particular person. I can understand when we're not in Session, why perhaps you might want to do it as quickly as possible, and save the funds. When we are in Session, when a committee is meeting practically on a daily basis, I think it would make some sense, perhaps, to delay those 24 hours or so, to give people a chance to talk them over a little bit.

As I say, I certainly do plan to support Mr. Marshall's nomination and would hope that the rest of the Senate would Concur.
