Obviously more than one-fifth having arisen a Roll Call is ordered

The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cum-

berland, Senator Conley. Senator CONLEY: Mr. President, to just very briefly wrap this item up, I would state that to vote against the motion to Recede and Concur, kills this Bill. All this Bill does is requests an additional \$5 in fees, which will allow inspectors from the Department of Human Services to be able to inspect the eating places throughout the State. A denial of this \$5 is going to mean a loss of perhaps as many as six in-spectors. I think it's extremely important that the people of this State are guaranteed the inspection of these restaurants.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Bustin.

Senator BUSTIN: I would like to call the members' attention to a letter that has been put on their desks. They should all have it, they may not have had a chance to read it, from Governor Joseph E. Brennan, addressing the issue. I would hope that they would go along

with Senator Conley's motion. The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Gill.

Senator GILL: Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I also would like to call your attention to the letter by the Governor. I think this is such an important piece of legislation that the Governor has chosen to take his time to send each and every one of us a letter in regard to it. He does state in the letter that before President Carter left office, he had proposed to rescind the appropriation of the 314D funds that are being used by the Department of Human Services to supplement their sanitari-ans. It says here, while, President Reagan has deferred action on that proposal, there is every reason to believe that the Federal funds will not be available beyond September 30th of 1981.

I have before me part of the budget of the Department of Human Services in that regard. It says, that at the ending balance of fiscal year '81, they will still have in that account \$25,876. Since the Performance Audit Committee is dealing with this issue, they will be coming out with a report as to the needs of the sanitarians, how many we need, what functions they perform, what they're doing for their money. I think that we should defer this, let this Bill

die right now, wait for a report from Perfor-mance Audit Committee. We will have from September 30, if it's true that these funds will be rescinded on that day, until January 1. I maintain that the Department, within the policy of the Department, can use their sanitarians to examine the restaurants that are in jeopardy, are in trouble. Nobody is going to be hurt. If I felt for one minute that there would be someone hurt in the State, I would vote for a fee increase at this time. I don't feel for one minute that anyone will. I would suggest that we wait for the Performance Audit, and let this Bill die

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Bustin. Senator BUSTIN: Thank you. I have that

report also, from the Department, about the \$25,000 that the good Senator from Cumber-land, Senator Gill, has. I would like to just draw your attention to the fact that when you're talking about dedicated revenues, and you're talking about fees, you have to collect those fees. Those fees are collected at different times during the year when those inspections and the licenses are issued. That means that you have to carry some kind of a balance. I think \$25,000 is little enough of a balance to carry

The other point that I would like to make, without belaboring the issue, because I think we've heard it long and hard enough, is the fact that 314D monies, no matter how you cut it, are still taxpayers' dollars. When we're talking about dedicated revenues, as I understand it, it's supposed to be the industry, or the person that's benefiting that's supposed to pay that fee. If the taxpayers are paying the fee on 314D monies, then the restaurants and the eating establishments are not paying it. Therefore, if we need those monies, which I sincerely believe that we do, to have adequate inspections, then we should increase the fee, and not ask the taxpayers to also foot the bill.

The PRESIDENT: Is the Senate ready for the question?

Senator O'LEARY: Mr. President, I now present Senate Amendment "B" to House Amendment "A" to L. D. 312, under filing S-43 and mean its adoption and move its adoption.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from Oxford, Senator O'Leary now offers Senate Amend-ment "B" to House Amendment "A" and move its adoption.

Senate Amendment (S-43) was Read. The PRESIDENT: The Senator has the floor. Senator O'LEARY: Mr. President and Mem-bers of the Senate, House Amendment "A" places a prohibition on the erection of any structure on wood lots of between 20 and 40 acreas for a period of 5 years. It also prohibits the subdividing of these wood lots for the same period of time.

Senate Amendment "B" to House Amend-ment "A" would restrict the dividing of these wood lots or the erection of any building unless approval was granted under the LURC's sub-division laws. The last sentence of Senate Amendment "B" is necessary so that the deed would show that these wood lots were created under this exemption.

Let us keep in mind that we are talking about large parcels of land. The average city house lot is approximately 100 x 100, or 10,000 square feet. 20 acres of land is equivalent to 3 football fields, in depths and a rectangle of 900 feet on each side. That is still not 20 acres. It would be an additional 60,000 square feet over

The restrictions in this amendment which would require sub-division approval if any change is made in the use of the land, provides adequate safeguards while at the same time it eliminates unnecessary restrictions on these woodlots.

The adoption of this amendment will allow many Maine families, who have been forced to use wood to heat their homes, to buy a wood lot at a reasonable cost for their own wood. If they had to apply under the sub-division laws it would increase the cost at least another 33% and these figures came from the Department of Conservation this morning. The Senate members of the committee all

voted for the original Bill which simply said, any piece of land over 20 acres was not a lot for sub-division purposes. This amendment with its additional restrictions will hopefully eliminate the objections that some Legislators had expressed about the original Bill. Thank you, Mr. President.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Conley. Senator CONLEY: Mr. President, I wonder if I could pose a question through the Chair to the Senator from Oxford, Senator O'Leary with respect to this Amendment. When he more respect to this Amendment. When he mentioned the fact of no structure may be erected, there's a very essential word that he left out, and it says, "no residential structure." I just wonder, when it comes to commercial or industrial development, why this Amendment shouldn't just say, no structure may be erected, rather than zeroing in on, no residential structure.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator O'Leary. Senator O'LEARY: Mr. President, I'm

afraid I don't have all the answers to my good leader's questions, but this was the direction I was taking in this Amendment.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator has the floor. Senator USHER: I move we reconsider our action whereby LD 278 was Passed to be Engrossed.

Is this the pleasure of the Senate?

The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Hichens

Senator HICHENS: I object to Reconsideration, and would like to speak on my motion. The Chair now recognizes the Senator from

York, Senator Hichens.

Senator HICHENS: Thank you, Mr. Presi-dent. Mr. President, and Members of the Senate, a couple of days ago, the good Minority Leader, the Senator from Cumberland. Senator Conley, approached me and expressed his concerns over the amount of expenses which might be reimbursed, because we had taken the limit off. I told him I would go along with Reconsideration, if he wanted to have an Amendment put on, to put back the \$3,500, which it had been asked for. Then today, we have an Amendment, which, if we Reconsider this Bill, not only doesn't do that, it cuts it back to the \$2,500 and takes away the per diem. It makes it almost impossible for the people to serve on this com-mittee or Advisory Council with an added member to it.

I think, rather than go through all the procedures of killing this Amendment, we should stop the Recosideration at this time.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Cumber-

land, Senator Conley. Senator CONLEY: Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I had nothing to do with the drafting of that jewel there that that great Senator from Cumberland, who represents the Joint Standing Committee on Fisheries and Wildlife in such an excellent manner. This is his own concoction of an Amendment, and primarily what it does, it does remove apparently the \$25 per diem.

If anybody's in their right mind in this Senate, they obviously know that these fellows that these fellows that are serving on this commission would gladly pay the Senate, would gladly pay the State, to have that honor of serving on his commission.

The fact is that we're only going to give them \$3,500 in expenses, or \$2,500 in expenses for a commission that only meets, under the statutes, anyway, twice a year, doesn't seem to be too tight, or too close to the buck. \$2,500, I think there's seven of them throughout the state. I think that's ample funds. Again, if the Amendment that's being proposed by the good Senator from Cumberland, Senator Usher, doesn't meet the approval of the majority, I personally feel that we should at least lock in the openness that is the law, as it reads presently before us. To not have a cap on there could very well really bankrupt the financial desperate straits of the Fish and Game Department.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Somerset, Senator Redmond. Senator REDMOND: Mr. President, Mem-

bers of the Senate, this Amendment, I object to this Amendment for the simple reason that I pose a question through the Chair as to the germaneness of this Amendment. We're fooling around with something here, that this Bill has been heard, and we came out in the work session with the report. We don't change that, it's enough that the Legislature itself, the Legislature has had mandated that the council approves all the change in rules. So that the council has met six times last year, and not two times, not twice. Six times they met last year. They have to keep going to all these public hearings, in their area, in the Wildlife Management Area where they live. We have mandated that no change in rules be made unless the commissioner hears the advice and consent of the council. Now we're deciding that we're going to change the per diem. Mr. President, I believe this is ridiculous. I request that you check the germaneness of this Amendment. The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Conley.

Senator CONLEY: Mr. President, I just love that great man from Somerset, Senator Redmond. I'm not going to speak about the ger-maneness of the Amendment, seeing that it is not before us. I'll tell you this. I think there's a good reason for putting some kind of an Amendment on this Bill. Last year this great commission, who under the law, under the statutes tht we passed that limits them to numbers of dollars, \$2,500 expenses is what they were limited to last year. They actually expended \$39,000, and under whose authority

Now if you want leave, just go to the book, your enactors, and take a nice look at the way that currently reads, as we're about to bring the hammer down on it, and we'll have a wide open Fish and Game Committee that can go anywhere it wants to go, and do anything it wants to do. Friday afternoon, I get a little tied up, and I'm going to sit down, but I hope we do Table this Bill and do something worthwhile. The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the

Senator from Kennebec, Senator Pierce. Senator PIERCE: Mr. President, and Mem-

bers of the Senate, I heard earlier this week the good Senator from Cumberland, Senator Conley speak on this Bill. Basically what he said, I agree with. I heard him speak twice more today on this Bill, and I still basically agree with him. It certainly is not in here what he is talking about. If I could be so bold as to suggest that perhaps the Senator could have an Amendment prepared to do what he wants to do, I will be happy to support him on it. In the meantime, perhaps somebody would Table this

Bill for one more day. On motion by Senator Hichens of York, Tabled for 1 Legislative Day, pending the motion be the Senator from Cumberland Senator Usher.
