Dear Senator Conley and Representative Martin:

In accordance with the provisions of 5 M.R.S.A., Section 1128, the Board of Trustees of the Maine State Retirement System hereby notifies you that a 4% increase in retirement benefits paid to retired state employees, teachers and retirees of certain participating local districts, was authorized effective September 1, 1983. This was a cost-of-living increase. The Consumer Price Index (CPI-U), published by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, increased 2.6% in the twelve month period ending June

The increase in the cost-of-living allowance paid in excess of 2.6% was paid in accordance with Chapter 529, PL 1983.

If Chapter 529, PL 1983, had not passed, the System would have recognized an actuarial gain of \$12.0 million against its unfunded liability. State contributions, which totalled over \$88.5 million in fiscal year 1983, would have been credited \$1.3 million per year for the System's remaining funding period of 16.7 years.

Whereas, this historic occasion is an integral facet of the City of Portland's history; and

Whereas, this historic occasion will be commemorated in February 1984, by the City of Portland and the State of Maine, upon the arrival of the French naval ship "MALABAR" on February 17, 1984; and

Whereas, the visit of the French naval ship "MALABAR" is an occasion of great significant to Maine and its citizens; now, therefore, be it

Resolved: That We, the Members of the 111th Legislature, take this opportunity, while assembled in regular session at the State Capitol in Augusta, to extend our welcome to the officers and crew of the "MALABAR," upon the occasion of their visit to the State of Maine and the City of Portland; and be it further

Resolved: That a duly authenticated copy of this Resolution of welcome be sent forthwith, on behalf of the Legislature and the people of Maine, to the City of Portland, for appropriate transmittal to the commanding officer of the French naval ship "MALABAR," upon the occasion of that vessel's arrival at Portland Harbor. THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Hichens.

SENATOR HICHENS: Before a motion is made on this, may we have the correct title of the L. D. It says 2005 and that, in our books, is related to Watercraft Taxation, may we have the right number for that, please?

SENATOR HICHENS: 2055, Thank you. I would
now make a motion that we Accept the Minority Ought Not to Pass Report.

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator from York, Senator Hichens, now moves that the Senate Accept the Minority Ought Not to Pass Report of the Committee.

The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Charette.

SENATOR CHARETTE: I would ask for a division, please.  $\_$ 

THE PRESIDENT: A Division has been requested.

The Chair recognizes the Senator from Washington, Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Thank you, Mr. President. There's a couple of concerns that I have about this particular measure and I think maybe this is the time for us to take a look at them, and in this instance I am afraid I have to agree with the good Senator from York, Senator Hichens.

We have a Governor who has come out very strongly in establishing roadblocks to take drunk drivers off the road. We have an effort this year to increase the drinking age, that's coming forth shortly. It is estimated that we have between 25,000 and 75,000 people die each year as a result of drinking and driving, and it seems pretty inconsistent to me that we would pass a bill this year of all years, this year when we've got such a effort started to try to

reduce the amount of drinking on the highways, and here we are going to pass a measure that is going to allow drinking in a public place and people will be leaving that public place, drinking in some fashion, I can assure you, after having spent the afternoon in the stadium and it just seems to me that it is a little inconsistent, of all times, for this year for us to be passing this measure.

So I would support the good Senator from York this morning in that we do not pass the Ought to Pass Report of this committee, that we defeat it. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Charette.

Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Charette. SENATOR CHARETTE: Women and Men of the Senate. If you went to the redraft of this Bill, 2055, you will see that the Committee has made several changes that does give us a lot of safeguards regarding outdoor stadiums. We are just trying to keep in line with everything else that we've enacted here over the years, and that is allowing the sale of beer and wine: in civic auditoriums, airlines, golf clubs, hotels, indoor ice skating rinks, indoor tennis clubs, performing arts centers, restaurants and vessels, and that's probably the only area left that our laws don't cover. That is perhaps because we've never had an outdoor auditorium such as this one that is being built right now. So what we've done from the original Bill is that we've limited this to commercially operated stadiums only with 5,000 or more seats and I am sure with a stadium of this magnitude there will be enough security personnel to supervise the consumption of liquor.

Another that there will be no sales occurring during secondary or school children events. There will be no liquor sold in the stands, it'll have to have a designated area, and also beer will have to be consumed in cups, there will be no cans or bottles. I think we've really ensured, as I said, safeguards to this Bill and it just adds one other area of already what we have going in the State. We've allowed every place to be able to sell some form of liquor and I think with this kind of support I think that we should allow the same thing, I think the supervision will be there and I'm not sure it is going to add any more problems on our streets and I would hope that you vote against the motion.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Hichens.

SENATOR HICHENS: Mr. President, the good Senator from Androscoggin, has stated that the liquor may not be sold in spectator stands but he does not say whether it can be taken back into the stands after they buy it. I have been up to Fenway Park many times and have not seen any beer sold in the stands but I have seen them come back with trays and share it with others and consume it themselves and a great many of them have been in an intoxicated condition before the game was half over. If this case happens down in these outdoor stadiums, how are these people going to leave the stadium sober?

THE PRESIDENT: Is the Senate ready for the question?

Will all those Senators in favor of Accepting the Minority Ought Not to Pass Report of the Committee, please rise in their places to be counted.

13 Senators having voted in the affirmative and 15 Senators in the negative, the motion to Accept the Minority Ought Not to Pass Report of the Committee FAILED.
