Senator from Penobscot, Senator PRAY.

SENATOR PRAY: Thank you Mr. President. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I have probably just one or maybe a couple of questions on this Bill having decided that how a committee could amend, and the House could amend a Bill which simply changed the name of a fish from one name to another. When I look at the House Amendment to the Committee Amendment, I see that it allows that nothing prohibits the Commissioner from changing the limit on Pacific Salmon that may be taken by hook and a line with a single hook. It seems a little bit different than changing just the name. So then I decided I'd better go back and look at the Committee Amendment to see what that does, since we're talking about a Bill that changes the name of a species of fish, and I find that the Committee Amendment may, if I understand this correctly, establish a different fee system.

Could the Chairman of the Marine Resources Committee respond to basically what the Bill will now do with these two amendments on it verses what it was originally intended to do?

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator from Penobscot, Senator PRAY, has posed a question through the Chair to any member of the Senate who may wish to respond if they so desire.

The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Minkowsky.

SENATOR MINKOWSKY: Mr. President, Members of the Senate, originally the Bill was to address the term Coho Salmon, changing it to Pacific Salmon, since it is a species that's brought in from the West Coast. It is brought in primarily for commercial harvesting in the Casco Bay area, in particularly, around the Cousins Island Station. It has been the term "centered" to zero in when they go out to sea to come back to that particular area.

There was great concern during the segment of time that this Bill was put in that there was many areas in the existing law that refers specifically as to the species of Coho Salmon and we want to be sure all areas were covered to indicate that it would be changed to Pacific Salmon, since it is the same species.

Secondly, there were as the first run came in there were many people in the Casco Bay area that were dragging, that were picking up these fish before they got back to the point for commercial harvesting. The end result was the people who had made such a large investment in this commercial field were rather concerned so that's why the hook and line and a limitation on the fish were placed on this particular Bill.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Pearson.

SENATOR PEARSON: Mr. President, Men and Women of the Senate, when I was first elected to the Maine Legislature, one of the very first acts that I introduced was a resolution on Coho Salmon. At that time there was a real concern in the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife that Coho Salmon should be banned from this State for the introduction into Maine waters because of the voracious appetite that they had and that they were anadromous fish and that they could cause a real difficult situation for the introduction of Atlantic Salmon. I'm really kind of fascinated with this discussion. I did not know that it was going to take place nor that it was a bill of this nature.

I was under the impression that it was State policy not to allow the introduction of Coho Salmon in this State. I am surprised that they have been introduced. Apparently, they are not contained in any commercial type of selfcontained operation and I think from what I was able to gather at that time, this is an ominous sign on the horizon for Atlantic Salmon if Coho Salmon proliferate, because of their voracious appetite.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Minkowsky.

SENATOR MINKOWSKY: Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I can't speak for the previous policy of the Department of Marine Resources regarding the Pacific Salmon or Coho Salmon as to what their original thinking was. But, I guess it bears out a fact that expert opinions do change in time and I guess we look at maybe fifteen or twenty years ago the experts say one thing, today they reverse their decision, which is a very common trend in everything we deal with in America and in the State today.

If that particular problem was prevalent, I'm quite sure the Department would not have taken a positive posture on this particular Bill in endorsing it.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Twitchell.

SENATOR TWITCHELL: I move to accept the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report.

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator from Oxford, Senator TWITCHELL, moves that the Senate accept the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report.

(Off Record Remarks)

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Najarian. SENATOR NAJARIAN: Mr. President, I re-

quest a division on the motion, and Members of the Senate I'd like to speak briefly on this Bill.

It concerns Fort Gorges in Casco Bay which was offered to the State about twenty years ago by the Federal Government and they refused to take it and so it was offered to the City of Portland, I guess under provision that it be kept in the public domain or access to the public for twenty years.

What this Bill does is it provides that if the City plans to have it developed commercially or for private development, that the State would be notified and would again have an opportunity to reasses it's position about this property and have a six month option to decide whether they want to do anything with it or let the City, (City of Portland) do with it what it wishes. Of course they could decide immediately that they didn't want to have anything to do with it or they have that six month period.

The concern is that this is a historic monument, it's built on the design of Fort Sumter in South Carolina which was the first battle of the Civil War. Although it was never used in battle in Maine, they were ready in case they were needed.

It really belongs more to the people of the State of Maine than it does to the citizens of Portland and my concern is that the City, for the last several years, has been obsessed, and I guess obsessed isn't the right word because it has a negative connotation but they've been profoundly concerned with increasing property taxes at the same time that they have to reduce services. So, the pressure is on them to get as much new property on the rolls, tax rolls, as possible. I'm just concerned that this issue being paramount in their minds, they wouldn't be as concerned in keeping this as an historical piece. You know, it needs a lot of work to be restored and it may not even be possible to rehabilitate it, but I think that it ought to stay in the public domain with the State or the City.

It just would provide notice to the State, it requires a written notice to the State that the City is considering letting it go to private development and it gives the State an opportunity to again reassess its position. So I hope that you will reject the Ought not to Pass and accept the Minority Ought to Pass Report as amended.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Twitchell.

SENATOR TWITCHELL: Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the Senate. As you know, I voted with the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report. You probably think I'm standing here today to try and kill this Bill and that's not so. I have been on my feet three times now and I have tried to pass one bill and kill two others and as of today, Mr. President, my batting average is zero. I have changed, Mr. President, I have seen the light, and I think this is a pretty good bill.

Before I sit down and we all vote on this bill, there are a couple of points I think that you should know. The State had a chance to buy this piece of property twenty years ago. They didn't want it then and nor do they want it now. The City of Portland phoned the State two weeks ago and they asked them if they were interested in this piece of property and they said no.

Number two, would you vote for this if you knew what the price tag was? And the price tag on this Bill here right now is approximately two million dollars, one million for the purchase price and one million to fix it up and restore it.

The City Officials of Portland are against this Bill, the sponsors never met with them, nor did they ever discuss the Bill with him, the State can't afford it and the City of Portland can't afford it either. If the State really wanted this piece of property, they could take it over by eminent domain anyway. And Mr. President, whatever happened to home rule? I request a roll call.

THE PRESIDENT: A Roll Call has been requested. Under the Constitution in order for the Chair to order a Roll Call, it requires the affirmative vote of at least one-fifth of those Senators present and voting.

Will all those Senators in favor of ordering a Roll Call, please rise and remain standing until counted.

Obviously more than one-fifth having arisen a Roll Call is ordered.

The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Wood.

SENATOR WOOD: Mr. President and Men and Women of the Senate, I rise today because one of my avocations is history and while many of you write local political columns, I am known from my local history columns.

I think Maine is blessed with a number of historic sites. I think if all of us look within our thirty-three districts we have locations within those districts that are important to our localities and, also, are important State-wide. One can think of the Arcadian Village to the North, the Longfellow House, Two Lights, even in Washington County I've been assured that there are some historic sites. And these sites sometimes are local in nature, such as in the Town of Alfred that's where the first elephant in American history was shot and buried. Well, that's got some local flavor to it, but there are some sites that transcend that and they have a Statewide significance.

I think Fort Gorges is one of those sites that really the City of Portland can't lay claim to, it is a site that belongs to all the people in this State. It is similar, if you considered the Statue of Liberty was completely the domain of New York City, or the Gettysburg Battlefield was simply the domain of Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, or the **Redwood Forest of California simply belonged** to California. These are national treasures they belong to the people of this Country and should be preserved for future generations.

In Maine we, also, have national treasures and we have State-wide treasures and they have to be preserved. So I think the argument of local control rings hollow because these are things that we want future generations, when we visit Portland, to be able to point out to our children and to their children, also.

So I think sometimes we have to move beyond that issue of local control and say "are these sites important to the State and should we take some steps to preserve them?" and I think this is a very modest step. It is simply saying, if the site is going to be sold the State should have an option. Now, there might be a price tag on it but at that point it would be this Legislature's decision whether to buy it or not, but I think we should have that opportunity to make that decision and I think this is simply what this Bill provides.

I think that it's important for our history, for our heritage, and one that comes from York County and Sir Fernando Gorges, the person whom the Fort was named after was the first proprietor of Maine and York County was the first County and the only county. I think if we had seen what some of the other counties had done, we'd stayed the only county, but we didn't have that choice. But anyway, Fort Gorges was the first proprietor from Gorges and he had this fort named after him and I think it's only fitting that the first proprietor of this great State have some kind of lasting monument and I would urge you to vote against the Majority Report and support the Minority Report.

(Off Record Remarks)

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Erwin.

SENATOR ERWIN: Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I don't think there's a person in this room that is against preserving our historical sites or buildings, but at some point in time there will be a price tag on this project. We will have to decide, or someone will have to decide at that point in time, the priorities and the way that we spend the money of our taxpayers. Much as we would like to preserve this site, with the figures that have been mentioned, and with inflation rates, what will those figures be? I predict it will be much larger than this. Plus, if it is owned by the State, than we will have to provide access for wheelchair people, and never having been on the island, only by it. I'm not sure just what that would involve. Ramps, perhaps elevators, what kind of fancy boat landing would be involved. I think that you should consider all these possibilities and think about the priorities and where we are going, or someone, at some point in time, is going to spend the taxpayers money

THE PRESIDENT: Is the Senate ready for the question? The pending question before the Senate is the motion of the Senator from Oxford, Senator Twitchell, that the Senate Accept the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report of the Committee.

A Yes vote will be in favor of Accepting the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report.

A No vote will be opposed.
