Dear President Pray:

Please find enclosed a copy of the 3rd Annual Fee Review prepared by the Department's Bureau of Medical Services staff in compliance with 22 M.R.S.A., Subsection 3173. The primary objectives of the review were to consider, in consultation with providers and their representative associations, the cost of pro-

viding specific services, the effect of various economic factors on the adequacy of existing fee schedules, and the Department's obligation to ensure sufficient provider participation in the Medical Assistance Program.

As you will note in the attached summary. the major conclusions reached as a result of the 3rd Annual Fee Review are:

1. The Department of Human Services has fulfilled its obligation under 22 M.R.S.A., Subsection 3173 – AN ACT Concerning Review of Fees for Providers Under the Medical Assistance Program.

2. The Department of Human Services has, as a result of the review, made some changes in fee schedules. Oral surgery fees have been increased with special attention given to orthognathic procedures. Durable Medical Equipment and Supplies percentage mark-up allowance have been increased and, with a special appropriation from the Legislature, the ambulance fee schedule has been increased. An increase in orthodontia fees is planned for the Spring of 1985, and the Department of Human Services is working with the Department of Mental Health and Retardation's Bureau of Mental Health toward increasing reimbursement for Mental Health Clinic services

Medicaid coverage has also been expanded to include specific services provided in freestanding Substance Abuse Treatment Facilities.

Details of these and other Medicaid fee schedule adjustments which have been made since the enactment of P.L. 1981, C. 329 are noted in Table G of the summary

3. The Department acknowledges the existence of certain problem areas and the necessity of addressing these areas with specific fee increases. However, the Department also recognizes that such action is not feasible within existing fiscal constraints.

As indicated in the attached document, copies of the review are also being shared with representative health care provider associations and, upon request, individual providers.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Hichens.

Senator HICHENS: Mr. President, I would request that this Bill and all of its attached papers be Indefinitely Postponed and I would like to

speak on my motion. THE PRESIDENT: The Senator from York Senator Hichens moves that L.D. 669 and all accompanying papers be INDEFINITELY POSTPONED.

The Senator has the floor.

Senator HICHENS: Thank you, Mr. Presi-

dent. Although this is not an earthshaking Bill, I think that it is significant in line with other bills that you will be presented with during this Legislative Session.

This Bill allows the playing of beano on Sunday after noon. According to the Chairman of the Committee there were five people who spoke mostly in favor of it. The State Police were sort of noncommittal, commenting that the Bill could be clarified as far as holidays were concerned more than as far as Sunday playing was concerned. It was opposed by a speaker for the Diocese of the State of Maine, who said that they were going to recommend to the parishioners that they do not participate in Sunday beano

Even though the Civic League was present at that time, the speaker for the Civic League, I have a letter which I would like to share with you: "Dear Senator Hichens: Please be advised that the Christian Civic League of Maine is strongly opposed to L.D. #669, legislation to permit the playing of Beano on Sundays.

The Christian Civic League has always held the day of Sunday in high and special regard as a day of rest, worship and family fellowship. Conversely, the League has always taken a very dim view toward gambling on any day of the week. Therefore, we oppose L.D. #669 on two important counts.

Since the League was unable to send representation we wish to share this with members of the Senate.

As I said, this is not an earthshaking Bill, but it is just another "foot in the door" to allow more liberation of Sunday. It says, that it starts at 12 noon and on, so that a lot of services wouldn't even be out and people would have to make a decisions as to whether they were going to stay for the end of the service or not even go to church in order to participate in beano

I have not had anyone speak to me personally in favor. None of the elderly people who like to play beano and go around to the different games have said that they would like to have Sunday included. I take the position that maybe people would like to have Sunday included. I take the position that maybe people would like to have Sunday off and enjoy it at home, in the fellowship of their family, rather than some of them going off to participate in beano.

When the vote is taken I would ask for a Roll Call

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator from York, Senator Hichens requests a Roll Call.

The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Danton.

Senator DANTON: Mr. President, would the Sescretary please read the Committee Report on this L.D.?

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator from York, Senator Danton has requested the Secretary read the Committee Report.

The Committee Report was READ

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Kany.

Senator KANY: Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I ask you to vote against the pending motion, I would suggest that the good Senator from York, Senator Hichens could choose to stay home or to do something else on Sunday instead of playing beano. I choose not to play beano on Sunday, also. I choose not to play beano at all to be perfectly frank, even though I sponsored this Bill.

I sponsored it on behalf of a constituent. Clifford Fortier of Oakland, who approached me last summer saying that there were hundreds of people who often go to New Hampshire to play beano on Sundays, and that he would like me to look into changing the law so that people could play beano on Sunday's in Maine also. did look into it because I was entirely unfamiliar with beano or bingo, having never played. I did look into it and his suggestion made sense to me. By the way, he did get petitions on which hundreds and hundreds of people did sign urging this change in the law.

I believe that if they wish to have this inexpensive form of entertainment, and generally elderly people do play, that I would certainly not deny them that wish, if at all possible.

I would like to point out that I think one reason that the Committee unanimously voted in favor of this Bill, which really just permits the playing of beano and bingo after noon on Sunday, was because they saw it as discriminatory in the law presently. For instance, all other games of chance can be played on Sunday. Under the law horse racing occurs on Sunday, you can play beano and bingo at Agricultural Fairs on Sunday now. So it was just beano and bingo that was being discriminated against under the law. I do believe that, that was why there was such support in Committee.

I could go at on at length, as I've learned quite a bit about it, but I won't, I'll sit down. I urge you to vote against the pending motion.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Trafton. Senator TRAFTON: Thank you, Mr. Presi-

dent. As Chair of the Joint Standing Committee on Legal Affairs, I raise to support the good Senator from Kennebec, Senator Kany, who's Bill we are debating currently.

I would like to add some information to this debate, because I think it is an interesting Bill. First, I would say that Mr. Fortier of Oakland, to whom Senator Kany referred, pointed out an interesting effect that this Bill may have. He said: "Currently many husbands and wives sit home on Sunday afternoon with nothing to do, and that if this Bill were to pass these people would have something to do and this might reduce our divorce rate in the State of Maine." This certainly had a great deal of interest from the Committee on Legal Affairs. So that certainly was one of the motives behind the Committee reporting this Bill out unanimously.

More importantly, I think, the State Police testified in favor of this particular measure. Lieutenant Colonel John Clark, who is a deputy chief in the State Police, indicated that there was some confusion in the area of enforcement. Games of chance in our State are currently issued a seven day license while beano is only issued a six day license. There are organizations in the State of Maine who are confused by the difference in time periods for these licenses. It was his recommendation that these nonprofit organizations, that are service organizations and help our State considerably, would be assisted by this particular measure.

Now the only person who testified in opposi-tion to the Bill, in Committee, was Mr. Smaha, who represents the Roman Catholic Diocese of Portland. He indicated that although the Diocese opposed the Bill even if this Bill were to pass it would be the recommendation of the Diocese that their churches not host beano games on Sunday. Perhaps that is the best enforcement meaure that the State can have. The nonprofit organizations, and churches can simply choose when to play beano and when not to.

It is interesting to note that bus load after bus load of Maine residents move to New Hampshire on Sunday afternoon to play beano. The State Police indicate that substantial revenues are lost from the State of Maine to the State of New Hampshire for this Sunday after noon heano.

So I urge you to vote against the pending motion and support the unanimous report from the Joint Standing Committee on Legal Affairs.

THE PRESIDENT: A Roll Call has bee requested. Under the Constitution in order for the Chair to order a Roll Call it requires the affirmative vote of at least one-fifth of the members present and voting.

Will those in favor of ordering a Roll Call, please rise and stand until counted.

Obviously more that one-fifth having risen a Roll Call is ordered.

The pending question before the Senate is the motion of the Senator from York, Senator Hichens to **INDEFINITELY POSTPONE** the Bill and accompanying papers.

A Yes vote will be in favor of INDEFINITE POSTPONEMENT.

A no vote will be opposed.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Erwin. Senator ERWIN: Mr. President and Ladies

Senator **ERWIN**: Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I am sure each and everyone of us are fully aware that this Bill came about because of a ruling of the Maine Milk Commission concerning volume discount prices which would have hurt the small Mom and Pop stores.

The courts have taken care of this measure, however I would like to point out to you that in the Bill on page 2, line 1, and I'll read to you: "Shall not set the different minimum wholesale prices for different retail delivery volumes of milk." This will make clear-cut to the the Milk Commission and to the Court the intent of the Legislature in case there are further court actions taken.

I would now like to respond to some of the comments that I am concerned about as to: "why have a study on something that has been studied to death?" Having only been here two years I asked for assistance in Research and on what studies had been made? I asked Helen Ginder, who is the Director of the Legislative Assistants; Christos Gianopoulos, who is the Legislative Assistant for the Agriculture Committee; Wayne Thurston, who is the Director of the Maine Milk program; and Commissioner Stewart Smith, who is Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture. Helen Ginder's reply is that there has been no Legislative Study of the Maine Milk Commission.

As far as the other studies are concerned I would like to read to you a memo that I got from the Commissioner of Argriculture, Commissioner Smith, that I think will perhaps sum up what the other people have told me. It is: "To Edgar E. Erwin, from Stewart N. Smith, Commissioner of Agriculture, concerning Milk Marketing Studies.

It is important to clarify a misperception concerning L.D. 431, AN ACT to Eliminate Volume Determined Delivery Prices of Milk. It has been suggested that the milk market study proposed in that bill is unnecessary because there have been many studies relative to milk marketing in the State of Maine. Please understand that the study proposed in L.D. 431 is substantively and entirely different then any other study done on Maine milk marketing in recent years. The proposal in L.D. 431 answers the question: 'What is the most appropriate role for the State in marketing of milk in Maine?' The study will be done by a panel of recognized professional experts in the areas of marketing and regulations. Minimum wholesale and retail prices currently used by the State will only be one of the options analyzed.

The panel will look at a number of other options. One will be the use of minimum producer prices only, with no authority to establish wholesale and retail minimum prices. Another option will be for the State to adopt a below cost sales statute for milk pricing, sometimes referred to as a predatory pricing statute. Many other states have replaced minium wholesale and retail pricing with a below cost sales procedure. The third option is the use of presumptive pricing, a procedure the Commonwealth of Massachusetts is now adopting. Massachusetts has been without minimum wholesale and retail pricing for a number of years. The panel will also analyze the impact of using current Maine statutes relating to price regulations in general.

The purpose of the study in L.D. 431 is to provide the next session of the Legislature an analysis of the various procedures that could be used in marketing milk in the State of Maine.

The existing studies that are referred to do not address those issues. They are of two categories. Most of the studies are designed to determine the proper cost and related price of milk in Maine. The Milk Commission develops its price orders based upon those kinds of studies. Although there are hundreds of papers of studies to determine the cost of processing, packaging, and delivering milk in the State, none addresses, the issues delineated in L.D. 431.

The other kind of studies that have been done in the State are those that evaluate the impact of the current regulatory procedure of establishing minium wholesale and retail pricing. Generally those studies attempt to show the impact of that procedure compared to the impact of not having that procedure. The State Planning Office under the authorship of State Economist Lloyd Irland, conducted such a study in 1982. This Department did a similar analysis in 1981. Other researchers have done similar work, but none of those studies address the questions proposed in L.D. 431.

It is quite clear, because of the extraordinary changes in the milk producing and processing industries over the past few years, that this Legislature should determine whether or not the current system of milk price regulations is the proper one to use. There are several other procedures to choose from. An analysis needs to be made of which procedure would serve the people of the State the best. The analysis proposed in L.D. 431 evaluates the impact of these various alternatives on producers, processors and consumers.

With that information, this Legislature in the next regular session, should be able to make a rational choice as to the proper role of the State in the marketing and pricing of milk from Maine producers to Maine consumers.

I can provide to any Member that wishes a copy of the Commissioner's memo, also copies listing by category all the studies that have been made. I haven't gone to the cost of duplicating this because I don't want to waste any money on this unless there is someone who wishes it. If you do, if you contract me I will see that you are provided with this study.

Now, as to controlling the cost of this study. This has been raised and I can understand your concerns because they are mine also. I discussed this with Commissioner Smith and with the Assistant Commissioner, Dan Harlan. If I may, I'll read part of a memo that Dan Harlan, the Deputy Commissioner wrote me: "L.D. 431, as amended by House Amendment "A" (H-7), directs the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources to provide for a study of milk pricing 'by a panel of recognized experts in the economics of regulation and pricing.'

In order to do this we must enter into contracts with those experts the Commissioner, after consultation with your committee, has named. Under State rules each contract must be specific as to the work to be performed, the amount to be expended and the date by which the work is to be completed. The contract must the be approved by the Contract Review Committee, of the Department of Finance and Administration and by the Attorney General's Office, as to the legality and form. Upon such approval the money appropriated must be encumbered before any work begins.

The usual State process by which Departments may enter into contracts assures that the funds encumbered will be spent only as approved and that no amounts are expended beyond those authorized."

There are two sections of this: one, is a study panel which would be under contract, as I have just mention; the second, would be a select committee that would be sort of an overseeing committee to the study panel. This committee would be composed of: three Members of the House appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, at least one member would be from each party; one shall be a member of the Republican party and at least one shall be a member of the Democratic party; in the Senate there shall be two members appointed by the President of the Senate, one must be a member of the Republican party and one must be a member of the Democratic party; three members named by the Governor, one shall be knowledgeable in the dairy processing industry, one shall be knowledgeable in milk retailing, and one milk producer who is knowledgeable in the marketing system; the Public Advocate or his designee shall also serve on the committee representating the consumer interest; the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resoursces shall serve as ex of ficio chairman of the committee.

I've checked with leadership and I have been assured that the Legislative Council can keep close check and reign on this special committee. Thank you.
