In Senate Chamber Wednesday October 21, 1987

In Compliance with a proclamation of His Excellency, Governor JOHN R. MCKERNAN, JR., the Senators will convene in the Senate Chamber. Senate called to Order by the President.

Prayer by the Honorable Georgette B. Berube Androscoggin.

SENATOR BERUBE: I will repeat a prayer that was said before because I think, in my mind, it says it all.

"And someone asked him a question. which is the greatest Commandment in the law? And he said to Him, you shall love the Lord with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and First Commandment. And the second is like It. shall love your neighbor as yourself. depend all laws." Amen. On these two

#### State of Maine **PROCLAMATION**

WHEREAS, there exists in the State of Maine an extraordinary occasion arising out of the State's fundamental social and economic obligation to protect its workers; and

WHEREAS, there is a statutory requirement that all employers in the compensation coverage; and State provide workers'

WHEREAS, most, if not all, of the insurance carriers writing workers' compensation insurance in Maine are withdrawing from the business; and

WHEREAS, comprehensive legislative reform is the only possibility for saving the private insurance market for workers' compensation, without which employers cannot operate;

WHEREAS, a public hearing has been scheduled in conflict with the convening hour set forth in my

October 2nd proclamation;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN R. McKERNAN, JR., Governor of the State of Maine, by virtue of the constitutional power vested in me as Governor, do hereby convene the Legislature of this State, hereby requesting the Senators and Representatives to assemble in their respective chambers at the Capitol in Augusta on Wednesday, the twenty-first (21st) day of October, 1987 at nine (9) o'clock in the morning, in order to receive communications, enact legislation necessary to ensure that employers are able to meet the statutory requirement for providing workers' compensation coverage, and conduct such other legislative business as may be appropriate.

In testimony whereof, I have caused the Great Seal of the State to be hereunto affixed GIVEN under my hand at Augusta this twentieth day of October in the Year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and

Eighty-Seven.
