JOINT RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING CONGRESS TO PROTECT WORKERS AT THE PORTSMOUTH NAVAL

SHIPYARD IN KITTERY, MAINE

WHEREAS, the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, located Kittery, Maine, has received news that the overhaul of the nuclear submarine Sea-Devil, which was to be conducted at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, may now be cancelled; and

WHEREAS, this action may result in the loss of jobs for 1,000 to 3,000 workers, many of them Maine

residents; and

WHEREAS, the seacoast region of Maine and New Hampshire has already sustained a potentially severe economic dislocation with the announced closing of Pease Air Force Base; and

WHEREAS, workers will have to be rehired for future overhauls at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that are already planned and scheduled; and

WHEREAS, there was no advance warning that the United States Navy might take such action and no opportunity to plan for an orderly transition for the displaced workers; and

WHEREAS, no concerted governmental action has been taken to alleviate the effects of defense budget cuts, or to work for conversion of defense industries

to a peacetime economy; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the 114th Legislature of the State of Maine requests that Maine's Congressional Delegation make all diligent efforts to defer the action of the United States Navy in this instance and institute measures that will lessen the impact of defense cuts on industries in the State through planning for alternative use and will provide governmental acceptance. governmental assistance to workers during periods of transition; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this Memorial, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Honorable George H.W. Bush, the President of the United States, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States and to each member of the Maine Congressional Delegation.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes Representative from York, Representative Rolde.

Representative ROLDE: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: Very briefly, the Resolution speaks for itself. However, at the time Resolution was drafted, the Congressional Delegation was meeting with Defense Secretary Cheney and we were hopeful that action would be taken to change the cancellation of the overhaul of the submarine Sea-Devil. Unfortunately, that did not happen and the President's budget does contain the cancellation of this particular overhaul, which would be a very devastating blow to the shipyard. It's all the more important that our Congressional Delegation work on this and that we urge them to take these actions.

Representative HICKEY: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: We honor Harold Irish today in his retirement. He was the first superintendent and developer of the Maine Veterans Cemetery. He started with 60 acres of land and skillfully created the beautiful cemetery that serves Maine veterans today. Our cemetery, which he created, serves as a model for several other states.

Harold Irish was superintendent of the Maine Veterans Cemetery from 1970 to 1989. Harold -- you completely dedicated your knowledge and years of experience to assist and comfort the Maine veterans and their families at a time of their greatest need, the loss of a loved one. For 20 years, you have given Maine veterans your expertise in developing and preparing the ground for the beauty of a proper resting place that they earned while they were defending their country. The devotion you have provided to the families of veterans will be cherished for many years to come.

Representative FARNUM: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I would also like to speak about Harold Irish. To me, he was a very unusual man. Harold Irish is a man who is gifted and dedicated in helping his fellow man in the position that he held at the veterans cemetery here in Augusta.

The first time I met him was as a legislator. I had gone to the veterans cemetery as a member of the Aging, Retirement and Veterans Committee to look at the equipment. We had been told that there was a truck in dire need of replacement and there was no money for it. Harold showed me the truck but with no comment. I examined it and I wondered what kept it running and I could only think that this quiet man who stood beside me breathed life into it for nothing else could have done it. Needless to say, through the efforts of everyone and a new bill, Harold got his truck and the work at the cemetery was able to be continued.

The second time I met this man was as a person grieving over the passing away of their brother, who had chosen this sacred place as his last home. It had only been at the last moment that arrangements had been made to bring him there. Harold arranged everything, the ceremony, the grave readied, as though he had had a week's notice, but more than that, the manner in which this quiet man treated my brother's wife, his sons and me, I will never forget. Words cannot describe the feeling that he left with us. My first thought was that he was doing this because I was a legislator but, in the days to come, I found, I saw and I experienced that this man left a part of himself with every person that came there. He showed that he cared and the people knew it

I also saw this quiet and humble man in a third role in a part at the veterans cemetery director's meetings of which I am a member. His past role as a superintendent was from almost day one until a few weeks ago. This made him valuable and vital to the continuation of the duties set by those who prouded this special cemetery. Decisions that are being made by following his advice will last for years to come.

I wrestled with myself for a week, especially

I wrestled with myself for a week, especially last night, trying to find the right words to say about this most unusual man and I found it difficult to say anything in a short time, but I am trying. I hope that in these few moments I have conveyed to you my personal feelings and the feelings of those who worked with him. I must also thank Dan Hickey for instigating this Sentiment, I think it is wonderful and worthy and I would like to say thank you to him for asking me to say a few words.
