special way here in Maine, rests on what has been termed "the hope factor"—a consensus that the future holds promise and that dreams can be realized. The vitality of our educational system has endured, I believe, because ever-broader sectors of our society have been brought into the system, given a stake in democracy, made a part of a social experiment that gives us all a sense of possibility. In our time, perhaps even more than in the past, the quality of our educational system at all levels is the one essential investment in our political system that can turn the dreams of our people into reality.

I began with the establishment of a national center at the University of Maine. Let me close with a single individual—a man who dreamed dreams and is finding them coming true. Buck Janes is a fourth-year graduate student in planetary sciences at the University of Arizona, a candidate for a Ph.D and director of a project that is designing a remote-controlled vehicle to roll across the landscape of the planet Mars. Buck Janes, 20 years ago, was a college drop-out who ended up moving to York, Maine and finding employment as a medical technician at Portsmouth Hospital, where he worked for 10 years.

In 1982, at the age of 33, he decided to return to college and chose USM, where he could attend half-time and, in the company of so many other nontraditional students, not feel out of place. At 36, he graduated with highest honors and earned the Robert Woodward Award for excellence in science.

On Friday, March 10, three weeks from now, Mr. Janes will be honored by the National Space Club in Washington, D.C., as the 1989-1990 winner of the Robert H. Goddard Scholarship—one of the most prestigious awards in the field of space research and exploration.

Buck Janes's success story is unique, of course, but others like his are being written on every one of our campuses. Hope is what our students bring to us, whether they are 18 or 33, and opportunity is what we offer. The combination can be catalytic, and often is: lives are changed, horizons are extended, choices are multiplied, dreams are made real.

All colleges and universities can make this claim, but none can do so for a broader range of students than do the campuses of the University of Maine System. We are a people's university—the Maine people's University—and serving that role is both an honor and a privilege.

Thank you very much. (prolonged applause)

Subsequently, Chancellor Woodbury withdrew amid the applause of the Convention, the audience rising.

Senate at Ease

Senate called to order by the President.

At this time, the HONORABLE JOSEPH E. BRENNAN, CONGRESSMAN of the State of Maine, entered the Senate Chamber and was escorted by the Sergeant-At-Arms, to the Rostrum. (Amid prolonged applause, the Members rising.)

THE PRESIDENT: It has been the tradition in my tenure, that when we have had Representatives from Congress appear and say a few remarks. For those who do not have the same tenure as some of us, I want you to know this has been a bipartisan effort over the years. I would like to have Congressman Brennan share a few words of wisdom and tell us about the good things that are going to happen in Washington.

CONGRESSMAN BRENNAN: Thank you very much Mr. President. I know that from working closely with President Pray over a number of years, if he is nothing else, he is bipartisan at all times.

I do want to say that I had an opportunity to be on the floor of the Congress when President Bush gave his budget address and I was very much inspired by the tone and the symbolism of that address. I truly believe that the President wants a kinder and gentler nation. I think it is so healthy that he has his children and his grandchildren around him and I also think what he says he means. I do believe that if you look at the fine print there are very little resources behind those types of commitments. But, I think it is important that people talk about the kinder and gentler nation as they are divvying up the pie. I think for state governments and local governments it is going to be rough sledding, because I believe he means what he says with, "no new revenues." I think he is probably deeply committed to that. If the Chief Executive does not initiate new revenues, very rarely will Congress or a Legislature initiate new revenues. I think the net result is that state governments and local governments, to the extent that they are assisted by the Federal Government, are going to have a tough time. That is the way it reads to me from making observations I have had a chance to make.

I do want to say that I am delighted to have a chance to say a few words. I spent two years as a member of this Senate. I was the Democratic Floor Leader, I think we had ten or eleven people, and I was many times having to wage a big fight just to get a roll call. It is obviously, from my perspective and the perspective of my party, a much more cheerful place. Thank you very much.
