We are pleased to submit the Audit of the Federal Expenditures Fund and Federal Block Grants Fund for the period ending June 30, 1994. The State of Maine expended nearly \$1.2 billion for various federal during the programs state fiscal year. objectives of the audit were:

To examine the financial statements for these funds and to determine if they were presented fairly and in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

the state's systems for financial accou Ťο assess procedures accounting,

reporting and internal controls;

To assess the state's accountability for federal revenues, allowability of costs, and compliance with applicable laws and regulations including those that pertain to financial reports claims and reimbursements; and

To recommend corrective actions for deficiencies noted.

Although this audit was not intended to serve as an organization-wide audit as described in the Single Audit Act of 1984 and Office and Budget Circular A-128, "Audits of State and Local Governments," it included tests of compliance with applicable federal laws and regulations and consideration of the internal control structure.

During the course of our audit we identified certain weaknesses which we have included in the reports identified below.

Compliance and Internal Control: Includes finding that, in our opinion, represents a material weakness (page 31). of Reportable Schedule

Conditions: Includes fifteen findings that we consider to be reportable conditions (page 41).

Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs: Includes fifty-five findings that describe deficiencies in the administration of federal programs (page 73 to 125).

This report includes responses to findings and recommendations from state management personnel (auditees) who oversee the expenditures of federal funds. We would be pleased to respond to any of your questions or comments about the 1994 Federal Funds Audit.
