Dear President Butland and Speaker Gwadosky: This letter is to notify the Legislature that I have accepted and will implement the recommendations of the Productivity Realization Task Force relative to the Department of Public Safety, excepting those recommendations requiring legislative approval. In this session, I will be introducing legislation necessary to implement these recommendations.

Implementation of this plan will result in a net reduction of 20 positions over this biennium and a corresponding net savings in all funds of \$919,956

over the same period.

In general, this proposal consolidates and centralizes support and administrative functions, enhances the application of technology to operations, reduces overtime costs, and more effectively utilizes sworn law enforcement personnel to perform tasks that require specific law enforcement skills.

Commissioner Skolfield is available to provide additional information requested or respond to any questions you may have. In addition, it is my understanding that Commissioner Skolfield has already briefed the Joint Standing Committees on Criminal Justice and Transportation on the details of the plan. As in the past, I look forward to working with the Task Force and the Legislature in our continuing efforts to improve efficiency and productivity in Maine state government.

The Department's plan includes reducing 13 divisions to four teams with self-directed subteams.

The Department of Education has met its goal of making the Department more efficient and productive while implementing quality assurance measures to improve responsiveness and service to both their internal and external customers.

The enclosed letter from Commissioner Mowatt provides detailed information about the Productivity Realization Task Force recommendations for the Department of Education. Commissioner Mowatt and his staff are available to provide additional information or to respond to questions.

WE, your Memorialists, the Members of the One Hundred and Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Maine now assembled in the Second Regular Session, most respectfully present and petition the President and the members of the Congress of the United States, as follows:

WHEREAS, the United States of America has had a long and friendly relationship with the Government of the Republic of China on Taiwan; and

WHEREAS, in recent years the Republic of China on Taiwan has established a multiparty, democratic political system dedicated to human rights and the pursuit of freedom; and

whereas, commercial interaction with the Republic of China on Taiwan has grown substantially in recent years; and

WHEREAS, the Republic of China on Taiwan is a major trading partner of the United States and has a strong, free-market economy with the largest foreign reserves of any nation in the world; and

WHEREAS, the role of the Republic of China on Taiwan in international development programs and humanitarian relief operations has significantly expanded during the past decade; and

WHEREAS, the return of the Republic of China on Taiwan to the family of nations through membership in the United Nations will help to strengthen mutual cooperation and the bonds of friendship between our nations; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, respectfully request the President and the Congress of the United States to encourage and support full participation by the Republic of China on Taiwan in the United Nations; and be it further

Representative JACQUES: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House: I must first start off by thanking each and every member of this body for agreeing to cosponsor this Joint Resolution. I must also express a gratitude to the citizens of Waterville and the friends of the sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for the many, many well wishes and words of sympathy and support that we have received from the members of this body as well as the other body.

We will bring this Joint Resolution to the remaining sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. Clearly it will be some consolation to them in their time of grief. I must tell you that I have passed the Blessed Sacrament Chapel probably 1,000 times in my life. I have to tell you that I always thought that the sisters were safe and secure and that that little chapel and that little place that they live, that they called home for almost 50 years, would be free

from the bad things from the outside world. The sisters have an awful lot of faith and it would be easy for us to strike out in anger and become mean in the wake of what has happened, but I want to tell you that the sisters have already forgiven the young man that has taken two of their sisters away. They have an awful lot of faith. Faith that most people do not understand and never will.

The sisters have really committed, Sister Edna and Sister Julie Anne, to their God and they firmly believe that no one will be able to harm them any more. I guess my concern is that we continue in their tradition and their beliefs, that we do indeed show compassion for all of those involved. Indeed the two sisters were victims here, but then again so was the young man who was involved in this awful thing and so was his family. They, indeed, are victims here. They are fine people and have been involved in the Waterville community for many, many years. They must be going through an awful lot of torment right now. The friends and the family of the sisters truly have been involved and they are truly victims in this situation.

The sisters were very vulnerable. I don't say that because of their stature or their size. I say that because they always look for the best in everyone. They believe that everyone is good. Their love knew no bounds and much like the children in this state, when you have those qualities you can become vulnerable. You can become victims. The same qualities that made the sister vulnerable also made them great. I guess the best thing we can do today is appreciate them for who they were and recognize there are other victims. They need our support and hopefully they will get it. Thank you.
