Senator HARRIMAN: Thank you, Mr. President. Before we go on to accept the Report, I just wanted to take a minute to share with the members of the Chamber that this bill is probably one of the best examples of ways that we have tried to work with, and not against, people who take the risk of creating jobs in Maine. As you may be aware, in the past, in the areas of international trade, we had three separate, sometimes cross purposes, activities going on in international trade. This bill will now combine the resources of approximately \$500,000 that is currently being spent on international trade; and they will now be focusing to one effort and joined in a public/private partnership so that Maine can focus its international trade activities in a way that consistently, responsibly, and enthusiastically. Also, part of this legislation is what I think is unique to our past legislative decisions, and that is that we, for the first time, will appoint, or the Governor will appoint and the legislature will confirm, a president of this Legislature will contirm, a president of this international trade organization, who will have the statutory ability to act as Maine's ambassador in other countries, and speak on behalf of the Maine government in the international trade arenas. I think it is a step in the right direction. It think it is a step in the right direction. It focuses taxpayer money in a way in which we can join with the private sector. I am confident that we will be able to show positive, measurable results as a result of this legislation. Thank you. Committee Amendment "A" (H-789) READ and ADOPTED,

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator

from Oxford, Senator Hanley.
Senator HANLEY: Thank you, Mr. President, Men
and Women of the Senate. I rise late this afternoon to let you know that, finally, if this body chooses to enact this legislation, the charge of the Productivity Task Force, and the savings of \$45.2 million over the course of this biennium, will have been met. This task has not been an easy one; and as I had stated earlier, I akinned it to a relay race, where the Task Force started the first leg of this relay race. Then they passed of the baton to the Governor who then made his changes to their recommendations, submitted that draft L.R. to the Legislature, which is running the third leg of this relay. As I told the Governor, you don't celebrate at the passing of the baton, you celebrate when the final runner crosses the line. In this case, by enacting this legislation, we will be passing off the baton to the State employees of the great State of

Maine. It is incumbent upon the employees of the State of Maine to make this work. We are putting a lot of faith and trust in them, and we are putting a lot of responsibilities on them, as well. We are asking them to change, in some instances, the way they have done business in the past, significantly in some areas, not so significantly in others. But, we are asking a lot of our State workforce. It's common knowledge that there will be less State workers after this Productivity Task Force legislation is adopted and signed into law by the Governor. How many? are not quite sure, as to how many through attrition, how many have got other jobs in State government, how many have got jobs now in the private sector, contracting with State government, and how many have contracting with State government, and how many have pursued other vocations. The bottom line is we have made technological advances; and as the good Senator from Kennebec pointed out earlier, these are not without glitches. In fact, in the Bureau of Taxation, with their optical scanning, which has increased their ability to process returns, that is making the process more efficient and we are realizing new technology. That I support. That I acknowledge. That I applaud. The bottom line comes down to the front-line workers who still have to answer for the kids who are being abused and answer for the kids who are being abused and neglected throughout the State, for the most needy of our citizens, the mentally ill. The work load is going to change on them. The requirements are going to change. So, as I said, I don't think it's appropriate for the Legislature to celebrate after we enact this, because it is only after we have allowed the State workforce to utilize the changes before we really know whether or not we really have cause to celebrate. That notwithstanding, the Legislature and the Executive Branch entered into a collective charge to save \$45.2 million over the course of the biennium through increasing productivity and efficiency.

If you will allow me, for just a minute, to take you back to November 1995, when we gathered here and we enacted \$23 million worth of savings. This is the final piece. As the Governor presented this bill to us and the Appropriations Committee held hearings, consulted with the policy committees, as far as recommendations that they would have towards amending the bill, we have come forward with a bill unanimously approved by the Committee which meets the final \$45.2 million, which separates productivity from non-productivity, which has verifiable dollars in here, uses additional supplemental appropriations to meet the final mark, re-invests in technology, and re-invests in our State workforce. As is always said, no document is perfect. I believe the document before you will close the productivity chapter and allow the State to move forward. I would like to take a moment just to publicly thank the Productivity Task Force, specifically, the members of this Chamber who participated in it, Senator Michaud and Senator Pendexter, for their diligent and untiring efforts to try and bring forward creative solutions, creative options in making our State government more productive and more efficient. I'm happy to say that this chapter is finally closed, that we can move on now to other charges that are before this legislative body. As I know it will be clear that some people will have some problems with it, I just hope that when viewed in the whole that this bill will be embraced by this Chamber, by the other Chamber, and, hopefully, by the State employees as we move forward,

hopefully, into a new era for State government. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Carey.

Thank Senator CAREY: Mr. President. you, Bringing the Task Force to a close is probably one of the happier moments that I have had since this session started. I do have a problem, among others, because this bill was printed on the twentieth of March. We are currently at the twenty-first of March, and it has 320 pages, so it makes it a little difficult to try and read through it in that amount of time and still try to pay attention to the other business of this body. On page 307, for instance, they take \$500,000 away from liquor. To say that this goes into productivity and efficiency, when in fact it is money that is loaned by the general fund to the liquor people so that they can keep their inventory up. Whether or not the inventory will stay up with the million dollars that's left, it probably will, but I don't believe that that is a productivity measure. I have voted against this thing in the past. I will continue to do that because one of the things I think the people of Maine should come to realize is in a \$3.5 billion budget. The Productivity Task Force has struggled many days, many hours, many weeks to try to come up with \$45 million in total. So, anybody that campaigns with the idea that they are going to be taking the waste out of government has absolutely no idea where the waste is, because these people have been spending months at it and that is all they have been able to find, and all of it is not waste. Some people are really getting hurt by this. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator

from Kennebec, Senator Bustin.

Senator BUSTIN: Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I, too, am glad to get rid of this abomination. I am one of those who voted against the Task Force in the first place, as did the against the Task Force in the first place, as did the other good Senator from Kennebec, Senator Carey, so I feel privileged to be able to say that. I do have an amendment prepared that I was going to put on. I understand the time constraints of the good Senator from Oxford, Senator Hanley; and so, I am letting that go through, hoping that I will be able, if I need to put this amendment on to have the courtesy need to put this amendment on, to have the courtesy of backing up the bill on enactment in order to put that amendment on. So, because I do honor the process, and because I know that if we don't vote on it this will be implemented in any case, other than the statutory issues, and we need to move the State forward. Also, I understand that there will be some opportunities on the supplemental budget to do some action, so I am doing that, but I do want to talk about a couple of issues that are encompassed in this bill. One is the Bath Children's Home. I have been around the horn on this for time and time again; and I just want it to be a matter of record on this bill that what we are doing is asking for a private contractor to come into the same building, on the same land, with the same children and the same workers. The only difference is the State is going to let the private contractor have the building, which is not adequate, nor will it ever be adequate to house these children. We have, in the past, put over \$1.5 million into that building. There will be a supplemental budget item that will ask for another \$400,000 of State money in order to get the building ready for the private contractor to come in. If that

makes some sense to you, I would like to hear it; because it doesn't make an ounce of sense to me. So, I just want to make a point that we ought to be doing something about the home and we ought to be doing something about the services delivered to those children; but this, folks, is not it. It should not be in this budget bill. It should be out of the bill and that's what the amendment does; but because I want to honor what we are doing here today, I am going to let that go. I am, in fact, working with both the Department of Human Services and Mental Health and Mental Retardation; and, hopefully, we can come up with something that is more reasonable.

The other thing that I would like to note that is in this bill, you have heard many, many times that there is no downsizing for AMHI and BMHI, that it does not shut down the institutions, any of the institutions. But, in fact, there are at least three positions there that you still have in this document, that you are taking out. One is your personnel manager over at AMHI. You are taking that out so you are only going to be left with a person who is the assistant to that manager. However, at BMHI, you are keeping the manager in. Where are we here? Are we downsizing or not? Are we closing an institution or not? You also, at AMHI, are taking out a position that is the deputy of the second in command to the superintendant, who is, in fact, the expert at carrying out the consent decree. The expert has a whole body of knowlege, years of knowledge, and you are replacing him with five people over at the department who know literally nothing about this. Does that make sense to you? It doesn't to me. I could go on and on, but we really ought to look at what we are doing before we do these things. I know the pressure of time, and all of that comes honestly, but it does not excuse us from making stupid decisions. And these are stupid decisions. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator

from Hancock, Senator Goldthwait.

Senator GOLDTHWAIT: Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This bill is a bill which makes so-called housekeeping changes. In the course of last winter I was contacted by some boatyards in the State of Maine, asking if we could extend the existing sales tax exemption on boats to cover a temporary period of storage in the State of Maine. Right now the sale of boats is exempted from the sales tax, presuming that you immediately remove the boat from the State. This amendment would provide for continuing that exemption for purposes of temporary storage in Maine. The significance of this to the boatyards is that people who are buying rather expensive vessels, would prefer to have them serviced, repaired, refitted, stored at the yard at which they are purchased. To do so now triggers that sales tax, which in the case of a \$300,000 boat would mean \$18,000. So, in some cases, that repair, storage, or refitting is lost to other states. In other cases the actual sale of the boat is lost. This is an amendment that has no fiscal impact because the current law exempts boat sales from the sales tax. So, we are not losing any revenue by making this change. Unfortunately, there seems to be an issue about what is a substantive change and what isn't. This was a piece of that bill that was caught in that issue. The boatyard owners, and the industry, including the Maine Marine Trade Association, are working on an industry growth strategy that includes the addition of as many as 2,000 new jobs in the industry by the year 2001. Extending this exemption would be significant in that the State of Rhode Island has no tax on this now, the State of Florida has just extended their exemption from ten days to ninety days, so we are rapidly losing our competitive advantage by triggering the tax with the storage of these boats in Maine. This amendment now is to rectify a situation that has developed over the past couple of weeks. I suggested this change in the proposed law last winter and the Bureau of Taxation advised me that it was a good idea, that it shouldn't be a problem, and that this was the proper vehicle. It was put into that bill at that time. It was sponsored by a number of members of the Committee at that time, without objection. It went to a public hearing where it had no objection. Subsequently, in a work session, this, and apparently some other pieces which I am unfamiliar with, were removed from this bill. The Bureau of Taxation continues to advise me that this is a positive thing to do for Maine's economy. A letter that I have from one Maine boatyard gives me some information. On a \$600,000, forty-six foot boat out of this particular yard, that includes \$372,000 of labor, or 8,651 hours, which is the equivalent of five workers for a year. So, this is not a small issue for the yards. It would be a great help to them to include this in this bill at this time. All I have done is simply added back in to this bill the exact language that appeared in the bill as it was originally drafted and heard without objection, and now replaces that ability to exempt boats from the sales tax when they would urge you to support this amendment. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator

from Kennebec, Senator Carey.

Senator CAREY: Thank you, Mr. President. One of the reasons that it was taken out of the bill is that there were about eight different areas within the bill that were not technical changes. They were, in fact, very substantive changes. The Senator from Hancock, Senator Goldthwait, has taken, I think, the proper method so that, in fact, it would be heard. That substantive change would be heard by the members of this body, and they can base their decision on her testimony. I personally will be supporting that change, but I didn't feel, and neither did the members of the Committee, that the many changes that were being proposed in that bill; we had, for instance, a little technical change where the assessor would be able to name his own assistant and take him out of classified service. That was one of the more minor ones, if you will.

That is simply the only difference between the two thoughts. There may be some schools, for instance, that didn't have an association with the State of Maine, and would teach some particular skill that is needed by the person who wants to go on to that college, and therefore, would be unable to get the \$500 credit. a bill, and we aren't here, or we put a note on the door that says "Sorry, we were just fooling. We adjourned." That doesn't sound very smart to me. We thought maybe we could get special permission and advertise this bill in a daily paper. Knowing that Friday would be a poor day to do it, we could do it on Monday and maybe hold a hearing on Thursday. still did not seem the right thing to do. afraid that notice would not be given out. I grant you that everyone of you, as I have, have received complaints. It says "personal watercraft". That's a That's what they are talking about. ski. Something needs to be done. I am the first to admit that something needs to be done. We need to review it. We need to look at it. We need to have a good, full, public hearing. We need to hear both sides of the issue and then decide what to do. We can't do that at the eleventh hour and do it fairly and properly, for this bill or any other bill, at this particular time. I was a little concerned because it is a Governor's bill. I went and talked with the Governor. He said he had reservations about sending it up this late. His intention was to let the Task Force work as long as they needed to and we would be coming in in January with some good, solid legislation recommendations. I appreciated his I appreciated his candor. I told him my feelings, that in order to be fair to the public, I wanted to indefinitely postpone the bill and wait, knowing full well we will all receive complaints that come in the summer. So be it. If we are going to err, let's err on the side of fair and justice for all. Thank you.
