Sunday, June 1, 1997

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by Honorable June C. Meres, Norridgewock. Pledge of Allegiance.

The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.

Bill "An Act to Discourage Smoking by Maine's Youth" (H.P. 1352) (L.D. 1898) (Presented by Representative CAMERON of Rumford)(Governor's Bill)

Committee on Health and Human Services suggested.

On motion of Representative BOUFFARD of Lewiston, tabled pending reference and later today assigned.

This is abuse of a woman bill. All you people that are in the south that are concerned with the woman getting abused, would vote against the Recede and Concur and I hope you will do so today. Thank you.

An Act to Amend the Off-track Betting Laws as They Pertain to Reduced Payments for Small Market Licensees (S.P. 188) (L.D. 606) (S. "A" S-348) which was tabled by Representative MAYO of Bath pending passage to be enacted.

Representative MAYO of Bath moved that the Bill and all accompanying papers be indefinitely postponed.

Representative DONNELLY of Presque Isle requested a division on the motion to indefinitely postpone the Bill and all accompanying papers.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bridgewater, Representative Wheeler.

Representative WHEELER: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I would ask that you vote against the pending motion because, in affect, it will lose 13 jobs in Aroostook County. I kind of wish that the Representative from Bath would have put an amendment on the bill to include Bath in the legislation. What is happening in Aroostook, and I can only speak for Aroostook, is that the bill would allow them to have 20 percent reduction in the money that they send in, which amounts to about \$45,000 over the year. In a small business, \$45,000 is

quite a sum of money. If you Indefinitely Postpone this bill, the state will realize a loss of a quarter of a million dollars. I don't think that is something that we want to do. Ordinarily I wouldn't be standing up here for any gambling. I am not for gambling in the State of Maine, but gambling is here and this is one business. If we don't pass this bill, 13 more people in Aroostook County are going to be out of a job. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bath. Representative Mayo.

Representative MAYO: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I completely agree with the previous speaker, the good Representative from Bridgewater, on this matter. We have been trying for six weeks to work out a situation that would be of benefit to both the off track betting parlor in Presque Isle and the one in Bath, which have similar problems. It is entirely conceivable that there will be 13 to 15 people out of work in the Bath area as a result of that off track betting parlor not succeeding. However, we have been unsuccessful in working with members of the committee and some members of the Aroostook County Delegation on this matter. We had a previous motion made by the Chair of the committee involved that this be Indefinitely Postponed. It has been floating back and forth between the two houses and I think that, personally, is what should happen. I feel sorry for Presque Isle and I also feel sorry for Bath in this matter, but some things are not able to be worked out in this body.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Presque Isle, Representative Donnelly.

Representative DONNELLY: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I try not to be very parochial. In the leadership position it is very difficult not to be. You try to do what is best for all. I am so incredibly offended at the motion on the floor right now that I must share it with you. Yesterday, we passed a \$113 million tax break for Bath. Today, the same individual who we supported yesterday is willing to attack a small business in a small community that is having a difficult time. I have never been this angry. It is inconceivable that that would happen, but it is. I wish you would join me in rejecting this outrage and voting against the pending motion. Thank you.

Representative WHEELER of Bridgewater requested a roll call on the motion to indefinitely postpone the Bill and all accompanying papers.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Cumberland, Representative Taylor.

Representative TAYLOR: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. For those of us who don't have our books before us, could you further identify LD 848. I think I know what bill it is, but I am not sure.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Eliot, Representative Wheeler.

Representative WHEELER: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. LD 848 is the moratorium on municipalities to stop them from setting up their own ordinances to keep fine monies locally, which is sent to the state. What this was, just to refresh your memory, was a bill that was tied in with another bill, LD 549, that was in front of Appropriations. That there would have funded court time for police officers that went to court from \$10 to \$30. They presently receive \$10. Judiciary had LD 549 and passed that unanimously. Transportation had LD 848 and passed that unanimously to set up a moratorium.

I will say, personally, as a member of Transportation and I was on the subcommittee that worked together with Judiciary to come up with this compromise that the only reason I voted for the moratorium was because I was believing that LD 549 was going to be funded. When it did not get funded to Appropriations, I felt it necessary to recall this from the Governor's desk and to try to carry it over until January. If we can recall it, we will carry it over to January. In LD 848 there is still language that will allow us to work on some funding for the municipalities. This is, what I consider, a compromise. You are going to have other people stand up and talk against this that are on the committee, but being an ex municipal official, I understand the system very well and what this does to the municipalities. I feel that if we could recall this and bring it back in January and work on it, it is a compromise and I am sure the

municipalities will hold off on setting up their ordinances and not be writing warnings instead of tickets and all kinds of other games that will come out of this. The only one is going to hurt out of this is the state's general fund. I urge you, if you would please, to support us so we can recall it and work on this. We will need a two-thirds, so I am urging everybody to help support me, if they would. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Naples, Representative Thompson.

Representative THOMPSON: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I would ask that you vote against the passage of this Joint Order. There were a number of bills pertaining to reimbursement of court officers and municipal officers when they testified in court as well as the issue that is present in this bill, which is to have a moratorium on cities and towns and act in their own traffic ordinances.

Some of them had been referred to Transportation and some had been referred to Judiciary. All of us agreed there was a problem. We got together and we agreed to support both bills, one through one committee and one through the other committee. They both came out with unanimous reports. They both went through both bodies and were enacted. This bill was sent to the Governor's desk for signature and the other bill went on the Appropriations Table. I supported both bills, but I support them independently. I think they were both good bills, but I think this one is necessary. Because there was a bad result on the Appropriations Table on the other bill, I do not feel is a reason to recall this bill. I would ask that you join me in voting against passage of this Joint Order.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Rockland, Representative Chartrand.

Representative CHARTRAND: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I would urge you also to vote against this Joint Order. I concur with the description from the good Chair of Judiciary. In Transportation we voted out this bill unanimously. It is true. Personally, as a member of the committee, I wanted this bill to pass, with or without the other one. I did want the other one to pass and supported it, but unfortunately it had a fiscal note and didn't get funded at this time. The moratorium is necessary to avoid a hodge podge of many communities around the state issuing their own traffic tickets. The records from those tickets won't be always forwarded to the Secretary of State's Office, so there will be one problem with the point system being usable with any of these municipal traffic fines.

In addition, we have a hole in the general fund that will come out of these municipal traffic tickets being used instead of the current state system. We all agreed something has to be done about this and we are impacting municipalities by the current system. I think we need to work on this in the next session. That is all this bill does is enact a moratorium on municipalities doing their own ticketing so that we can work on it in the next session. I am sure the fiscal end of it can be addressed in the next session, but if we pull this bill back and allow municipalities to go forward with their own ordinances, we are going to have an awful mess even before we begin to work on it the next session. I would urge patience on this matter to any of the communities that are feeling the impact of not getting enough reimbursement for court appearances and allow us to work on it in the next session.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Kittery, Representative Lemont.

Representative LEMONT: Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I appreciate the good Representative Chartrand saying there ought to be some patience on this issue,

but I had the unfortunate or maybe fortunate chance to have worked on this issue for five years. I think politically, I have really been sent down the river here. I not only am not going to get any funding to address this issue, it should have been addressed in the 1990 and 1991 budget. We are going to go down and deal with local control. We are going to tell the towns once again what they can do. This bill needs to be backed up and it need to be married with LD 549. I am sure all of you have heard from your municipal officers and your local police officers. This is a very important issue. Putting it off will give us an opportunity to work on this. To put the moratorium in, you can argue anyway you want, but it will create a hole in the general fund. It will create problems with your local municipalities and it is going to create a general fund problem here in the State of Maine. I hope you will follow the good Representative from Eliot's light. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Northport, Representative Lindahl.

Representative LINDAHL: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. The stakeholders are getting together on this and they will be coming back with a solution to the Second Regular Session. Currently, Fairfield uses this municipal summons to enforce traffic infractions. They can keep expending their program beyond just speeding and enforce all traffic infractions and keep the fine money for themselves. 1 think this is going to create a huge problem as more communities join in this plan. Portland is getting ready to do it. Kittery is getting ready to do it and possibly Eliot. I don't know how many other communities are getting ready to do this. The best place to be caught speeding right now is in Fairfield. They assess their own fines and there is a good chance that this may not come on your driving record. The Secretary of State won't get to assess points. Insurance rates won't go up for those that are causing the largest risks. As all these communities, say we have 20 communities that adopt this policy throughout this state, how are we going to keep track of driving records, the Secretary of State to assess points and suspend licenses of those repeat violators. Secretary of State Gwadosky states that lifting the moratorium would be wrong and he is right. Let the stakeholders meet now and through the fall and come up with a solution and see if we can fund it in the Second Regular Session. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Union, Representative Savage.

Representative SAVAGE: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I speak to you this afternoon as another member of the Transportation Committee who also has municipal experience. Although I do respect Representative Wheeler's position on this and we agree on most all of the municipal issues that came before our committee, I can't accept bringing this back from the Governor's desk. I think the moratorium is important. I have seen the inequities. I worked in Camden with those \$10 checks when they came across the desk. They didn't do much. I do think that we do have to have a moratorium until the stakeholders group can get together and resolve it. I promise that I will support any effort that Representative Wheeler makes to go after this next January. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Fairfield. Representative Tessier.

Representative TESSIER: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. This is an inequity that has been existing for a number of years as you have heard previously. There have been a number of years for this to have been addressed. It

hasn't been addressed. We are now asking that we recall LD 848, hold it over so that maybe it will get addressed. If it isn't held over, then perhaps we are going to hear for the next few year, we are working on it. I think it is time that we begin truly working on it and one way to get that done is to have LD 848 sitting and waiting for the work to be done. I urge you to vote for passage of this motion.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Eliot, Representative Wheeler.

Representative WHEELER: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I apologize for rising again, but I just want to point out one more problem that will be created if we do implement this moratorium immediately. I am not sure if it is an emergency enactor or not, but if it is not, 90 days before it goes into law will be 90 days from then, we will right back here and it will be January. We are just talking three months. If we do enact this moratorium, what a lot of municipalities will do is they will start writing warnings. How are we going to address that? If we have this, it is a compromise and we can gain some respect from the municipalities, which we really need up here in Augusta. I urge you to support this. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Houlton, Representative Clukey.

Representative CLUKEY: Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This was passed as an emergency so when the Governor signs it, it will become law. If we withdraw this or recall this from the Governor's desk and carry it over, it is going to give other municipalities six months to jump into this program and you are apt to end up with enhancing revenue with radar, which I don't think is good public policy. I hope that you will vote to not recall this bill. Thank you.

Representative DRISCOLL: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I think we have discussed this thoroughly. I hope we don't take too much time today. I know it is going to be a long day. Representative CAMERON: Madam Speaker, May I pose a question through the Chair?

The SPEAKER: The Representative may pose his question. Representative CAMERON: Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I just want to ask what it does.

The SPEAKER: The Representative from Rumford, Representative Cameron has posed a question through the Chair to anyone who may care to respond. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Old Town, Representative Dunlap.

Representative DUNLAP: Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. This actually turned out to be a fairly complicated problem. We were presented with three bills dealing with personal watercraft, otherwise known as jet skis or wet bikes. They pose various problems to the committee. We drafted an amendment, which was unanimously accepted by the committee, which was then amended in the Senate, which basically took the guts out of that particular bill. That is where the Committee of Conference came in. The Committee of Conference and I would like to take leave at this point to thank the members of that committee including the Representative from Pembroke, Representative Goodwin and Representative from Oxford, Representative Underwood for their participation, they really helped with that a lot and also those from the other body.

What this amendment does, if I can find it, is it defines what a personal watercraft is, essentially. We have included the

length of that to 14 feet. The reason why we did that changing from the previous 13 feet was that they have some new ones now that are longer and it defines how it is powered, how many people it can carry. It defines, again, the personal watercraft issue. The meat of it is an imprudent operation of a watercraft line in there, which basically provides a nuisance clause. The bills that we were presented with were prohibiting certain activities. Rather than prohibit an activity, what we decided to do was to simply prohibit a prolongation of those activities that annoy people and basically to define it as a public nuisance and then cross reference it into Title 17 from Title 12, which has an immense body of law dealing with public nuisances. It also allows for the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to come back to the committee with a report on nuisance civil actions and enforcement actions. It allows for either enforcement or civil action. This was the concern in the Senate, the other body rather, which is why they amended it. They were afraid it would overload the courts with civil actions. Rather than create a whole new body of law, we simply referred back to the old nuisance laws and it actually makes it fairly simple and they are very satisfied with it. I am very satisfied with it. I hope you will accept the report.

The House voted to Recede.
