JOINT RESOLUTION IN HONOR OF POPE JOHN PAUL II

WHEREAS, it is with great sadness that We, the members of the One Hundred and Twenty-second Maine State Legislature, now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, have learned of the death of Pope John Paul II, who was spiritual and titular head of more than a billion Catholics worldwide; and

WHEREAS, his elevation to pope by the College of Cardinals in 1978, the election of the first non-Italian pope in 455 years, stunned the world: and

WHEREAS, Pope John Paul II was born Karol Wojtyla in Wadowice, Poland on May 18, 1920. He was educated in that town and attended university in Cracow until the Nazi occupation of Poland: and

WHEREAS, it was during the war that he had his call to the priesthood and he began his studies in the clandestine seminary in Cracow, and once it officially reopened after the war he continued his studies until his priestly ordination on November 1, 1946; and

WHEREAS, he served the pastoral ministry in France, Belgium and Holland until he returned to Poland to serve various parishes. He was appointed Auxiliary Bishop of Cracow by Pope Pius XII in 1958 and was nominated as Archbishop of Cracow by Pope Paul VI in 1964, who also made him a cardinal in 1967; and

WHEREAS, from the start of his Pontificate in 1978, Pope John Paul II completed 104 pastoral visits outside of Italy and 146 within Italy. During his reign, more than 17,600,000 pilgrims participated in the General Audience with him and millions more met him during his pastoral visits throughout the world; and

WHEREAS, Pope John Paul II fought for justice and peace for all people and fought against poverty, and he served as spiritual leader for millions of Catholics and as an example of faith for people throughout the world, and he reached out to other faiths, as well, during his 26-year papacy; and

WHEREAS, Pope John Paul II was one of the most respected figures of our time, and he exercised great influence throughout the world as a leading voice against poverty and for freedom, human dignity, democratic development and human rights, and he is credited with helping pave the way for the end of communism in his native land and across the Soviet bloc; and

WHEREAS, he will be mourned by those whose lives he touched, and on order of the President of the United States and the Governor of Maine the flags of the United States and the State of Maine are now flying at half-staff in his memory; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-second Legislature, now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to express our sorrow on the death of this great man and to acknowledge our admiration for his life and works; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Bishop of Maine.

Senator STRIMLING of Cumberland moved the Senate ACCEPT the Minority OUGHT TO PASS AS AMENDED BY COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-34) Report, in NON-CONCURRENCE.

On motion by Senator **WESTON** of Waldo, supported by a Division of one-fifth of the members present and voting, a Roll Call was ordered.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Snowe-Mello.

Senator SNOWE-MELLO: Thank you, Madame President. By considering L.D. 423, we are considering legislation that will contribute to the cost of education across the State of Maine without contributing to the education of the students of this state. Maine has a long history of not allowing school year employees. who have assurances of being hired for the next school year, to collect unemployment compensation benefits during summer vacation. To consider this change at a time when the state is attempting to deliver property tax relief and reform school funding is counterproductive. Passing this bill would result in a direct and substantial cost to property taxpayers across the State of Maine. Conservative estimates are that L.D. 423 would increase the cost to operate Maine's schools by at least \$3.7 million per year. This cost covers 8 week periods that schools are not even in operation. Food service workers are allowed the option to have their pay spread out over the entire year if they wish. They are well aware of the seasonal nature of the work when they accept positions within a school system. Furthermore, how would we justify granting unemployment compensation to food service workers in schools without also extending this benefit to other categories of workers employed by our schools; bus drivers, secretaries, and custodians. We could be looking at doubling this \$3.7 million estimated increase previously mentioned. With this knowledge in mind. I urge this Senate to vote ought not to pass on L.D. 423. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Strimling.

Senator STRIMLING: Thank you, Madame President. Lurge my colleagues to vote for the ought to pass motion. What this bill is doing, in sum, is protecting some of the lowest paid workers in our public school system. In the summertime, when they have time off from the school, in an urban area like mine, there is plenty of work available. They can go and find additional jobs because there are lots of food service needs. In our rural communities, there are not as many jobs available. We need to make sure we can take care of them. The cost of \$3.7 million is the maximum cost that this could cost if every food service worker in the state was looking for work all summer long and was not able to find a job. We know, of course, that this is true. As a matter of fact, we could probably estimate maybe 10% to 20% who are looking for work diligently but would not be able to find that work. The exclamations that this is going to cost a tremendous amount of money are just not true. All we are doing today is protecting some of poorest workers in our public school system. I dare say that we can afford it. If we can afford to rebate tax bills on some of our wealthiest corporations, who don't even pay that tax, I think that we can find a way to support some of the poorest workers in this state.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Bartlett.

Senator **BARTLETT**: Thank you, Madame President. I rise in opposition to this bill and find myself agreeing with the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Snowe-Mello, who I sit next to in the Labor Committee and all too often find myself disagreeing with.

Certainly on this issue we are on the same side. Although I certainly understand the concerns raised by the good Senator from Cumberland, Senator Strimling, what this comes down to is another unfunded mandate being passed along to our local schools at a time when they simply can't afford it. Moreover, I think this ultimately comes down to a contract issue, an issue of contract negotiations between the parties. Everybody knows when they enter into it that it is a 9 month contract. I think that this could be much better addressed at that level. For those reasons, I will oppose this piece of legislation. Thank you.
