In Senate Chamber Thursday March 2, 2006

Senate called to order by President Beth Edmonds of Cumberland County.

Prayer by Reverend Kung-hee Sa of Wayne Community Church, United Methodist Church.

REVEREND KUNG-HEE SA: Where this is Women's History Month I want to tell you one story about a woman named Mary Scranton who was dispatched as one of the first Christian missionaries to Korea in 1889. There is a special cemetery in Seoul, South Korea, where some 100 Americans are buried. When I worked as a reporter back in Seoul before I became a United Methodist Minister I once visited the cemetery to write a story about it. I learned that these Americans came to Korea in the late 1800's and 1900's and worked for the Korean people as officials in the Korean government, as Christian missionaries, as medical doctors, as educators, as businessmen, and so on. They truly loved Korea and wanted to be buried in their adopted country. The first Christian missionaries to Korea are buried in this cemetery. Eun-young Choi, president of the Korean Women's Society of Christian Service, when making a donation to help the victims of Katrina through the United Methodist Women's Division, told about one of these women, Mary Scranton. She was the American missionary who founded Ewha University in Seoul in 1885. It is the largest women's university in the world. Now the work she began has come full circle. The Korean women's organizations, representing 800,000 women, now reaches out to women and children in the West and is an active partner of the United Methodist Women's Division which has helped more than 100 countries around the world with some \$25 million a year. Ms. Choi said that when Mary Scranton came to Korea more than 120 years ago women in Korea lived in total darkness. Women were not given a name but called by the name of her children. If she remained single, she was called sombody's daughter. If she could not bear a son, if she disobeyed her mother-in-law, or if she became ill, all were legal reasons for her husband to divorce her. Each woman had to obey father, husband, and son into their old age. Only boys were educated. It was into this culture that the Methodist women's organization sent Mary Scranton and other missionaries. All these people left deep marks on Korean history. Mary Scranton founded the first regular school for girls. Mrs. Scranton was a 52-year-old widow who arrived with her son, daughter-in-law, and granddaughter intent on educating girls. In those days, because Koreans had never seen a Westerner, she was called a ghost. She wanted to educate girls, but no girls came. The first student was a concubine of a government official sent to learn English so she could be a translator for King Kojong's wife. She stayed only one month. The second student was a starving child whose mother had no place to go. In the community, fearful of outsiders, it was rumored that once a Western Missionary fed the girl and

educated her, she would be taken to the United States as a teenager and 'you don't know what they will do to the girl.' The mother responded by taking her daughter away from the teacher, saying 'even if I die, I will die with my child.' To counter this rumor. Scranton wrote a contractual letter promising that she would never take a child to the United States. After her 24 years mission in Korea, she died in 1909 and was buried there. By the time Japan annexed Korea in 1910, American missionaries had established about 800 schools for 41,000 students. From the educational efforts of the missionaries came pioneers and many leaders in medicine, farming, and education. King Kojong believed that, of the foreign powers present in Korea, the United States was the only nation that had no hidden agenda. As a consequence, he hired a number of Americans to serve as advisors and officials in his court. The Americans, mostly Christian missionaries, effectively and enthusiastically introduced modern education, medicine, public health, technology, public administration, and democratic ideas. I can't imagine Korea's modernization without these missionaries. A recent article in the New York Times indicated that South Korea has rapidly become second only to the United States as a source of Christian missionaries with more than 14,000 abroad in various locations. They have joined their Western counterparts in more than 160 countries, not in their own language but in the local one or English. There is a saying that when Koreans now arrive in a new place they establish a church; the Chinese establish a restaurant; and the Japanese establish a factory. Who would have thought that Mary Scranton's mission, which started with educating a poor child, would issue in the founding of the world's largest women's university, the producer of so many competent national and worldwide leaders in Korea? Each one of us could create such a similar story to hers here and now. The fruits of righteousness which she reaped in Korea greatly inspires me because I believe that God, by joining people in the waters of their own predicaments, demonstrates their importance in His plan to set things right, to bring justice, and right relations to all people.

Please join me in prayer. The ultimate source of our being, we come to seek to be an inclusive community in which every member is given full justice, dignity, and love and to discern what it means for each of us to respond not just to our own needs or those of our family and community, but to those around the world. Now is the time for us to answer the irresistible call to say yes to what is coming to birth to meet the needs of the whole world. Give us courage to act upon the spirit's promptings for righteousness and build on the foundation of faith in a strong past and move with passion into the future. Amen.

Senator DAVIS: Thank you, Madame President. This is a bill that I sponsored. I would like to just briefly go from my memory and explain to the Senate what this is all about. Early last fall I was contacted at my home by a couple of part-time deputy sheriffs who serve civil process for the State of Maine. They told me they could not do it any more because they couldn't make any money out at it. Looking into it, as I told them I would do, I found out that, and I'm going from memory, the last time the fees were increased by the state was in 1981. They were increased in 1989 as to what the attorneys must pay to have civil process served but the part-time deputies received no increase at all. This legislation has been in a number of times before. It's made it to the Appropriations Table a number of times and has been killed there for lack of money. The good Senator from Aroostook, Senator Martin, is eager this morning, I can see, and I would just like to say that the sheriff of Aroostook County told me his father had been serving papers all those years and he didn't think there had been any increase for 40 years. I would hope that everyone could see fit to vote for this. Thank you very much, Madame President.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Aroostook, Senator Martin.

Senator MARTIN: Thank you, Madame President and members of the Senate. I will be supporting the legislation but I do pose a question to the good Senator from Piscataquis, Senator Davis, as to whether or not the Republican Party will be using it as a campaign issue in raising fees?

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Schneider.

Senator SCHNEIDER: Thank you, Madame President. I wish to tell my colleagues in the Senate that I voted in favor of this piece of legislation and I commend the Senator from Piscataquis, Senator Davis, for bringing this to us. It's well needed. The reason I asked for a roll call is because I don't think it's any surprise to anybody that often times we are criticized on our side of the aisle for raising fees and raising taxes. Unfortunately, we've been put in a position in our committee, State and Local Government, where we've felt the need to support such increases because for such a long time they have been neglected. I think it's time for us all to recognize that sometimes you just can't neglect people and neglect these issues any longer and you must address them and you must have the courage to go ahead and stand and address them. We ought not to use them as political footballs either. I do support the good Senator from Piscataquis, Senator Davis' bill, but I do wish to just make that statement for my colleagues. Thank you.
