The following Joint Resolution: (S.P. 703)

JOINT RESOLUTION DECLARING FEBRUARY 25, 2010 SPAY DAY MAINE 2010

WHEREAS, more than 20,435 dogs and cats entered the 8 largest animal shelters in Maine, out of 100 licensed shelters, during 2007, the most recent year for which substantial data is available; and

WHEREAS, approximately 40% of these animals were not reclaimed by their owners or were not adopted by new owners and therefore were euthanized; and

WHEREAS, in many instances the animals are young, healthy and friendly creatures that are euthanized simply because there are not enough good homes for them; and

WHEREAS, an additional unknown number of Maine animals die each year due to abandonment, neglect, abuse, starvation or cruelty; and

WHEREAS, the cost to State Government and nonprofit agencies of handling and euthanizing discarded animals is estimated to exceed tens of millions of dollars per year; and

WHEREAS, the spaying or neutering of dogs and cats helps solve this tragic and costly problem by reducing the number of dogs and cats that end up in shelters; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the Legislature to support a strong policy in the State of animal shelters' aggressively promoting spay and neuter programs to reduce pet overpopulation; and

WHEREAS, residents of the State can contribute to this effort by spaying or neutering their own companion animals and by supporting programs in their communities that offer accessible spay and neuter services, including the state-run Help Fix ME program; and

WHEREAS, veterinarians, humane societies, animal control agencies and national and local animal welfare organizations join together to advocate the spaying or neutering of dogs and cats on "Spay Day USA 2010," an annual campaign of the Humane Society of the United States; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-fourth Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to declare that February 25, 2010 is Spay Day Maine 2010 and we request and urge that the people of Maine observe the day by committing to have their dogs or cats spayed or neutered and by contributing to charitable organizations that provide spay and neuter services and we request that Maine veterinarians work with animal shelters and rescue groups to provide accessible spay and neuter services.

Representative **CUSHING**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise respectfully to disagree with the chairman on the Committee

Report. This bill, an Act to Enhance Cooperation between the Workers' Compensation Board's Abuse Investigation Unit and Other State Agencies, has some disturbing consequences in our opinion, the ability to share information, particularly information that typically is held of a confidential nature such as tax information and other pertinent details. Certainly none of us condone intentional abuse and those people who would leave their employees at risk is certainly not acceptable, but it disturbs us when we are facing so many different issues in state government, and particularly with the nature of some information that would be provided here. So we would respectfully disagree and not support this bill. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Sanford, Representative Tuttle.

Representative **TUTTLE**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. As you've heard, this bill clarifies that Workers' Compensation Board's Abuse Investigation Unit may share information with other state agencies to enhance the interagency efforts to ensure compliance with their respective laws and rules. So if the Department of Human Services would need information from the Department of Labor or Workers' Compensation, they could share this information. I believe most other agencies in state government are able to do that, so that's why the bill was submitted this time.

The Workers' Compensation Board voted unanimously to propose the language of the bill. The idea of sharing of information between state agencies grew out of the Governor's Task Force on Misclassified Workers. All business entities should be treated alike with regard to potential penalties for failure to secure workers' compensation coverage, which is a real problem in this state. Without coverage, injured workers bear the burden of having to pay their own medical bills and suffer the loss of income caused by worker injury. Workers who file a compliant about an employer need to know that their information may be shared with other agencies. There was no opposition at the public hearing from either labor or management, and, for that reason, I would ask you to support the Majority Report.

Representative CELLI of Brewer **REQUESTED** a roll call on the motion to **ACCEPT** the Majority **Ought to Pass** Report.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Brewer, Representative Celli.

Representative **CELLI**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This bill has a lot of good intentions but it comes up with the wrong answer. It still needs work. I urge you to vote against it. Thank you.
