Senator SCHNEIDER of Penobscot moved the Bill and accompanying papers be COMMITTED to the Committee on BUSINESS, RESEARCH AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Somerset, Senator Mills.

Senator MILLS: Thank you, Madame President. I appreciate the motion of the Chair of the BRED Committee. This is an issue that has direct relevance to our current negotiations over bonding. There are many other states that have, in lieu of bonding for economic development, made use of contingent State guarantees as a way of inducing often private capital to step in and provide venture capital opportunities for businesses that have a likelihood of enhancing the local economy. This bill, and its permutations which exist in an amendment that I can't offer at this juncture. would offer to the Maine State Retirement System, that is still sitting on \$8.1 billion at last report, the opportunity, or an inducement, for the pension system to devote a certain portion of its resources to enhancing opportunities for Maine businesses and ventures. There was a piece on public radio this morning talking about the dearth of venture capital available in the United States today and the absence of risk money or the willingness of investors to take risks in this adverse economy.

My concern about committing this bill to the Committee, or carrying it over, or delaying the implementation of the bill is that it's an issue that's been before the BRED Committee for three years now. There couldn't possibly be a better time to encourage the Retirement System to devote a thin sliver of its resources to enhancing business opportunities in the state of Maine. The risk to the State is minimal. We're under discussion right now about committing actual money, whether it be tax credits or bond money, the Maine taxpayers will have to pay and commit actual dollars to economic development efforts. This bill does not require that. It merely requires that the State step up and quarantee that the investor, in this case the Retirement System. be held harmless in the unlikely event that an entire pool of venture capital investments might fail to produce a return. It's a relatively low risk phenomenon that would put large amounts of capital to work in the Maine economy in a time when such capital is scarce and when the State is in dire need of it. I'm just concerned about the timing, of delaying the implementation of this concept. This very concept, in another form, was passed on the consent calendar a year ago. The bill is L.D. 1, so I can't imagine we haven't had time enough to consider it in this Legislative session. I would urge that the bill remain on the calendar for our further work. I am fully prepared to offer an amendment to the bill to make it palatable and suited to the times. I just think that now is the time to act in this fashion. Many other states have done this. Maine is behind the eight ball in terms of making money available for what we call mid-level venture capital opportunities.

I think the need has never been greater, and I think we had unanimity with both Bodies in the last session of the Legislature to move forward with some venture capital action. This is important and appropriate for us. It is empowering legislation that does not require the Retirement System to take any action. It just empowers them to take this action should they choose to, and we think it's a wise move. Thank you, Madame President.

Senator **DAMON** of Hancock moved the Bill and accompanying papers be **COMMITTED** to the Committee on **MARINE RESOURCES**.

On motion by Senator **RAYE** of Washington, supported by a Division of one-fifth of the members present and voting, a Roll Call was ordered.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Lincoln, Senator Trahan.

Senator **TRAHAN**: Thank you, Madame President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I ask you to defeat this motion to recommit this bill back to the committee. I'm going to give you a couple of reasons why. First, I believe we're making a grave mistake and I believe this will lead to a federal registry that will be a charge to our individual constituency of \$25. I'm going to read from the federal registry a date I don't think people are clear on,

and that is the final rule for the registry requires that 'Anglers and spearfishers who fish recreationally in federal waters be included in a national saltwater angler registry by January 1, 2010.' Not in 2011, but 2010. If this Legislature does not take action, either to make a policy decision or move down the road toward a registry or a license, the federal government will do it for us. The only time that the year 2011 comes into this discussion is that this is the year they can charge \$25 for that service.

The second reason that I would like you to not commit this bill to committee is that I have watched the folks in the halls and in the caucuses that have been going in and giving their sides of the issue. I believe only one side of the issue has been heard by some people in this chamber. The facts that have been brought out have not been challenged by me or anyone else. What I'm asking this chamber to do is to allow me an opportunity to respond to the concerns of members of this chamber and the other. If, at that point, people still have concerns and I can't address them, then I would be willing to support this going back to committee. The second thing that I would do for members is that I've offered to come into the Majority party's caucus to address concerns. I waited over an hour to do that and unfortunately I could not. I apologize for that opportunity missed.

I don't believe we have to act on this today. I've talked to committee members in the Marine Resources Committee and I have assured them that I would be willing to address every one of their concerns in committee, as well as amendments to my bill and the amendment before you, and address them this year. I believe that I offered all of these things in good faith, but the piece that has been missing is that the people of Maine will be robbed of an opportunity to hear all sides of this issue. That is why I ask you to not recommit this, allow me an opportunity to respond to you, and then if I can't answer your concerns I'll support recommitting. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Hancock, Senator Damon.

Senator DAMON: Thank you, Madame President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, if we live long enough we'll see history being made. I have just seen some history being made because I have just learned the admission, for the first time in this debate which I have carried forth in this chamber and in my committee for four years, that we will have a federal registry. That has been denied time and time again as part of the reason not to take this up. We will have a federal registry. This was decided when the Magnuson-Stevens Act was reauthorized, that Magnuson-Stevens Act has re-authorized the so called 200 mile limit, our Exclusive Economic Zone or EEZ. So now we are acknowledging that there will be an implementation. Let me use the other side of the argument. What's the hurry? Instead of trying to put forth a flawed bill, let's work it out. Let's make it the right thing. That's what my motion to recommit this bill to the committee will do. It will make it the right thing. I urge you to support the pending motion. Thank you, Madame President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Lincoln, Senator Trahan.

Senator **TRAHAN**: Thank you, Madame President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I'm just going to buy a few moments with some comments about the handout distributed to you that explains in detail by ex-Congressman Tom Allen the federal

registry requirements. I think this, the piece that you are getting. is probably the clearest explanation of what our State is required to do. You will see in there that we do not have to create a license. We can do a registry and we don't have to charge for it. It's a wonderful explanation and I wanted people to see that before we acted. As far as a flawed piece of legislation, ladies and gentlemen, this bill went through the committee with an extensive public hearing and work sessions. When the amendments that are on your desks now came forward, I took the courtesy of going to the committee with my amendment before it got out of committee. I went over it with the committee. It wasn't just something I brought to the floor. The other amendments, three of them on your desks. I brought forward to try to address concerns that were being brought forward by the opposition. Plain and simple. I believe that I resolved all of them in the amendment, if I could speak to it. There are at least, I believe, a dozen policy changes in that amendment that I think strengthens the bill and addresses the concerns of people who have been on the other side of this issue. Unless I'm given an opportunity to debate it, I can never answer your questions as to why that stuff is before you. Ladies and gentlemen, I will tell you this. The goal post on this issue, for me, has changed many times. Every time I seem to address a concern, there's a new concern that I have to address. That is why there are several amendments on your desks. I have gone out of my way and bent over backwards to address concerns. I feel like no matter what I do on this issue it's never good enough. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The pending question before the Senate is the motion by the Senator from Hancock, Senator Damon to Commit the Bill to the Committee on Marine Resources. A Roll Call has been ordered. Is the Senate ready for the question?

JOINT RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING CERTAIN NATIONAL PRIVATE ENTITIES TO HONOR MAINE BASEBALL GREAT LOUIS SOCKALEXIS AND TO AFFORD APPROPRIATE RESPECT TO NATIVE AMERICAN ATHLETES

WE, your Memorialists, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Maine now assembled in the First Regular Session, most respectfully present and petition the professional American League baseball team, the Cleveland Indians, the National Baseball Hall of Fame and the national magazine *Sports Illustrated* as follows:

WHEREAS, Louis Sockalexis was a Penobscot Indian from the State of Maine, a grandson of a Penobscot chief and the son of a Penobscot tribal governor, and he was a legendary American baseball player in the early 1890s; and

WHEREAS, Louis Sockalexis is a charter member of the College of the Holy Cross Athletic Hall of Fame, a member the Maine Baseball Hall of Fame, a member of the Maine Sports Hall of Fame and the American Indian Hall of Fame for his extraordinary athletic gifts; and

WHEREAS, Louis Sockalexis was so explosive a force on the baseball diamond that he inspired Maine author Gilbert Patten to create a legendary fictional baseball character, Frank Merriwell of Yale, for stories published in a national magazine, and Mr. Sockalexis played in 2 baseball seasons for the College of the Holy Cross in Worcester, Massachusetts; and

WHEREAS, Louis Sockalexis was the first known American Indian to play major league baseball, playing in the 1897 season, and is, without question, the inspiration for the team name Indians, first adopted informally by the Cleveland major league franchise in March 1897 and then officially adopted in 1915; and

WHEREAS, the Cleveland Indians team ignored a petition by the Penobscot Nation in 2000 to cease and desist the use of its caricature mascot "Chief Wahoo," which the Penobscot Nation and many other Americans consider racist and disrespectful to the memory of Louis Sockalexis; and

WHEREAS, in 1963 Baseball Hall of Fame writer Lee Allen declared another player, James Madison Toy, to be the first American Indian major league baseball player, yet there is no proof of the other man's Indian background, while Mr. Sockalexis was continuously identified as an American Indian from the beginning of his career; and

WHEREAS, James Madison Toy was never referred to in his career as an Indian and his death certificate declared him to be "white," and Louis Sockalexis was known nationally as an Indian

and was subjected to racism from the media, the fans and his fellow players; and

WHEREAS, being the first American Indian baseball player who performed under such conditions 50 years before the great Jackie Robinson broke the color barrier, Louis Sockalexis paved the way for the quick ascension of more American Indian baseball players to the sport, such as Charlie Bender, John Meyers and Jim Thorpe; and

WHEREAS, the national magazine *Sports Illustrated* omitted Louis Sockalexis from its "50 Greatest Athletes from the State of Maine" and ignored his place in Maine history, United States history and baseball history; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to honor Louis Sockalexis as one of Maine's greatest athletes, who brought much pride to the Penobscot Nation and to all the people of Maine; and be it further

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, respectfully urge and request that the Cleveland Indians baseball team immediately drop the use of the mascot "Chief Wahoo," which would demonstrate the team understands the disrespect this symbol represents to the Penobscot Nation, the citizens of Maine and the legacy of Louis Sockalexis; and be it further

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, respectfully urge and request the National Baseball Hall of Fame to formally recognize Louis Sockalexis as the first American Indian to play major league baseball, to acknowledge that he was the man who inspired the team name "Indians" for the Cleveland franchise and to acknowledge that Louis Sockalexis endured groundbreaking experiences in baseball and faced major obstacles in his quest to play baseball, paving the way for other great American Indian players like Charlie Bender, John Meyers and Jim Thorpe who followed him into the major leagues; and be it further

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, respectfully urge and request that the magazine *Sports Illustrated* correct the mistake of leaving both Louis Sockalexis and his cousin Andrew Sockalexis, a marathon runner who placed highly in 2 Boston Marathons and the 1912 Olympics, off its list of the "50 Greatest Athletes from the State of Maine," and to apologize for these actions, which would demonstrate its goodwill and respect for these two extraordinary American Indian athletes; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Cleveland Indians baseball team, the National Baseball Hall of Fame and the magazine *Sports Illustrated*.

JOINT RESOLUTION TO HONOR ANDREW SOCKALEXIS

WHEREAS, Andrew Sockalexis, a Penobscot Indian, was the first runner in the State of Maine to make a mark on the national and international scene, and to this day he ranks among the greatest Maine runners of all time because of his notable placings in important races: and

WHEREAS, in 1912, Mr. Sockalexis was one of 123 starters in that year's Boston Marathon, finishing second, which earned him a spot on the United States Olympic team, where he was one of 12 American marathoners who ran in Stockholm; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Sockalexis, at the age of 20, was a member of the prestigious North Dorchester Athletic Club, from the greater Boston area, and he was widely regarded as a serious contender to win the marathon and one Boston newspaper columnist called him the favorite to win a gold medal; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Sockalexis, known for his smooth and effortless running style, felt he waited too long to pick up the pace and finished fourth in the marathon, still a major accomplishment and noteworthy achievement; and

WHEREAS, also in 1912, Mr. Sockalexis finished in second place to the great Clarence DeMar, a 7-time Boston Marathon winner, in a 19-mile race from Old Town, Maine to Bangor's Maplewood Park, now known as Bass Park; and

WHEREAS, he entered the Boston Marathon in 1913 and was considered one of the favorites to win, and he passed runner after runner, but could not close the gap to the leading runner and he placed second in that year's marathon; and

WHEREAS, it was in 1913 that Mr. Sockalexis first developed tuberculosis, or consumption as it was commonly known in that time, and he was sick for many years, dying at the age of 27 in South Paris, Maine in the summer of 1919; and

WHEREAS, Andrew Sockalexis was honored at his passing by the United States Olympic Committee with a headstone that was engraved "A Member of the American Olympic Team at the Fifth Olympiad held in Stockholm, Sweden in July, 1912"; and

WHEREAS, Andrew Sockalexis is a member of the charter class of the Maine Running Hall of Fame, established in 1989, and a member of the Maine Sports Hall of Fame as well as the American Indian Athletic Hall of Fame; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-fourth Legislature now assembled in the First Regular

Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize the memory of Andrew Sockalexis on the 90th anniversary of his untimely death, and to honor him as one of Maine's great athletes, who brought much pride to the Penobscot Nation and to all the people of Maine.

Senator NUTTING: Thank you, Madame President, Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I rise this afternoon to urge you to oppose the pending motion so we can hopefully go on and Indefinitely Postpone this bill and all accompanying papers. This bill was a bill brought before our committee. It is a bill and a position that was dealt with unanimously by the Appropriations Committee. They made this position for one year a half-time position and that is included in the budget that we've already voted on. As part of the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife budget, Appropriations worked with the committee of jurisdiction and hunting and boating fees were increased. Once the budget was passed, then Inland Fisheries and Wildlife came forward and they found \$60,000 to fully fund this position after the budget was negotiated, and the hunting and boating fees were increased. Now we get the bill amended up from the other Body. One of the amendments takes the Emergency Preamble off the bill. This landowner relations position, most of the work is in the Summer, and if this bill did pass with the Emergency Preamble removed from it, this wouldn't even take effect until this Fall. The newest amendment creates a study panel to determine whether or not

this position should be funded and at what level it should be funded, and whether or not it should exist in the future. I really don't have a problem with that, but what they also do in this second amendment from the other Body, is that while they're determining and studying whether or not the position should exist and at what level it should be funded at, they're going to fully fund it at the \$96,000 level while we are studying whether or not it should exist. I can't remember a situation where I've seen that before. I went to my file today and drew out the testimony on this particular L.D. Both the Department of Conservation and the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife testified neither for nor against this bill at the public hearing. I'm aware of the great pressure put on various groups to come and testify to somehow fully fund this position starting in the Fall. Some groups have chosen not to come lobby for this fully funding of this position.

I think the two things that trouble me the most is that I always thought that departments should kind of put all their financial cards on the table while we're trying to deal with a very difficult budget. All of a sudden now we have a department that proposed hiking fees and all of a sudden after the budget's done they found close to \$60,000. The other thing that troubles me the most though, even more than that, is to have this administration work so hard to fully fund this position, to undo what the Appropriations Committee unanimously did, and to put all this effort in it. I've not seen one ounce of effort, for instance, to try to fully fund the \$2 million of cuts we made to children's mental health or dozens of other examples I could give you. Yet we've got to pull out all the stops to try to somehow, for part of a year, fund this position at the full \$96,000, even though the Appropriations Committee has only half-time funded it, which I think was appropriate. It won't take effect until the Fall because of the amendments. There is no Emergency Preamble on this bill any more. I would urge you to oppose the pending motion so we can go on and Indefinitely Postpone this bill and all its accompanying papers. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Bryant.

Senator **BRYANT**: Thank you, Madame President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I would just say that this is a Majority Report from the Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry. We talked about this the other day, about the importance of this position. People that hunt and fish recreate on other people's land. It is paramount that, in fact, we do what we can to make sure that the landowners are happy or satisfied. That they feel like their issues are being heard. This bill allows us to do that. If we don't do that, we risk our activities that we like to do on other people's land. I would encourage you to support this Majority Report.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Nutting.

Senator **NUTTING**: Thank you, Madame President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, during the work session on this particular L.D. we requested examples. I think Appropriations dealt with this position appropriately.
