Off Record Remarks

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair is very pleased to extend a warm welcome to former members who are here with us today for Welcome Back Day at the State House. Today is a day to honor and celebrate the contributions of those who have served Maine in the time honored tradition of our citizen legislature. It's a day to reconnect with old friends, to make new ones, and to share fond memories. It's a day that reminds us of the continuum of life and the traditions of this institution that we all love. Welcome Back Day is also a welcome exception to the rule that there is no such thing as a free lunch. As recently as two decades ago Maine legislators were making public policy and keeping in touch with their constituents under circumstances that were much, much more confined than those under which Maine lawmakers are working today. Today any Mainer connected to the internet can watch and listen to debate in the Senate and House Chambers. They can listen to legislative committee public hearings and work sessions. They can communicate instantaneously with their legislators by e-mail, text chats, and even by video conferencing, all with hand-held devices such as iPhones and Blackberries. Legislators are still asked by constituents about bills and issues, however, thanks to a new technology enabling Maine citizens to glean information on their own, legislators often hear from constituents who know as much or more about bills than we do. Yet new technology notwithstanding, some of the things within these granite walls seem to remain the same. This session, for example, our key issues are jobs, taxes, health reform, energy costs, and regulations. Sound familiar? I don't mean to suggest that we're spinning our wheels. We certainly are not. In fact just last night the Senate acted on landmark health insurance reform legislation and we did so in the finest of Maine's traditions, not only with bi-partisanship but with tri-partisanship. We pride ourselves on that here in Maine because we recognize that while we may come from different regions of Maine and represent different political parties or philosophies we are united in our love for Maine and its people and our respect for the institution of the

legislature. I know that whether you served here decades ago or just months ago your commitment to making Maine a better place to live, work, and raise a family guided your work under this dome. The civility and respect that characterizes the Maine legislature is borne of the knowledge that all who have served here share those goals, regardless of our difference approaches to achieving them. Thank you for being here. Thank you for your part in making history. Those of us serving today honor you and your contributions to Maine. We know that, like you, we will each return to our communities and pass the torch to those who follow us here and when that day comes we know the experiences we've shared here and the friendships we forged here will remain with us for the rest of our lives and one day we will join you in coming back here to reconnect for Welcome Back Day. Thank you and God bless you all.

At this time I would like to recognize some very special guests who are here with us here today. First I would like to invite the Honorable Gerald P. Conley, Sr., President of the 111<sup>th</sup> Maine Senate, to come forward to accept a gift on behalf of the Senate. Would the Sergeant-At-Arms please escort Senator Conley to the rostrum. Former President Conley has the distinction among all those here today of having served in the earliest Maine Senate, the 104<sup>th</sup> Senate. On behalf of the 125<sup>th</sup> Senate please accept this gift.

I would also like to ask the Sergeant-At-Arms if he would please escort the Honorable former Senator Catherine Carswell to the rostrum. Former Senator Carswell has the distinction out of all those here today of being the woman who served in the first Senate, the 105<sup>th</sup> Senate. On behalf of the members of the 125<sup>th</sup> Senate we are very pleased to present you with this gift and thank you for your service.

I would also like to recognize several other distinctions among those here today. The Senate members here today with the longest overall legislative service, and I would ask you to please rise and be recognized. Ronald Usher with 22 years of service, in the House the 107<sup>th</sup> and the 118<sup>th</sup> through the 121<sup>st</sup> sessions, in the Senate 108<sup>th</sup> through the 113<sup>th</sup>. Would you please rise and accept the greetings of the Maine Senate. Longest overall service by a woman Senator, the Honorable Mary Small with 24 years of service, 109<sup>th</sup> through 116<sup>th</sup> in the House and 117th through 120th in the Senate and she was the Republican Leader. Would you please rise and accept the greetings of the Maine Senate. The current Senate member with the longest overall legislative service is, no surprise, the Honorable Joseph Brannigan, his first term was in the 109<sup>th</sup> legislature. He is now serving his 7<sup>th</sup> term in the Senate. He is also the Senator with the longest overall legislative service, currently serving his 14th term. Would he please rise and accept the greetings of the Maine Senate. Now I'll recognize those former Senators who are here with us today and I would ask that you please rise when your name is called and I would ask if everybody would hold their applause until the end. THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Sullivan.

Senator SULLIVAN: Thank you Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, this is truly a simple amendment. It deals with the youth and the hours of working in the day. I was extremely concerned with the 10 o'clock versus 11 o'clock and I had originally put one in to mark it back down to 10 o'clock. A conversation I had with the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Plowman, explained her reason for that. This amendment changes the first amendment I was going to put in to 10:15. Actually the President was very helpful in having us come up with this solution. The concern of the Senator from Penobscot was that you could work until 10:00 and then continually not punch the clock out and there would be additional pay coming up and 10:15 puts us in the middle of where another additional piece would go. It would still get the kids home. I'm very happy with it. I think it's a good move. It shows our concern for kids and education and also the concern for the business community. I'm hoping that it will be accepted with this committee report. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Plowman.

Senator PLOWMAN: Thank you Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I'd like to thank the Senator from York, Senator Sullivan, for what I consider a friendly amendment. I would ask you to support the motion. I, too, had some concerns regarding the testimony about our kids being out around 11 o'clock. We have this conversation at home when I'm asking kids what time they are coming home and the 10:15 gets us past the fact that time clocks work in 6 minute intervals. I've seen times when if you can get that one more interval in your paycheck it sometimes motivates kids to wait just long enough to get to that 10:06 or 10:12. If the penalty kicks in around 10:10 then it's a very expensive two minutes for an employer. It's still gets you past that point but it also takes into consideration that the employers sometimes need that time. They will have to schedule kids until 10 o'clock to make sure they are out of there but I think this is a very good amendment. I consider it a friendly amendment and I would ask you to support it. Thank you.

Senator **COURTNEY**: Thank you Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I just want to make a few comments before we leave tonight. For years our party has toiled in the Minority and waiting around for four, five, or six or seven hours, or when I was a freshman in the other Body as much as twelve or fourteen or eighteen hours, wasn't unusual. This is a little bit bigger than

who has the hammer. This is about the people of Maine. There are two kinds of courage in Maine, two kinds of courage people have. You have the courage of the hammer or you have the courage of your convictions, your passions, and your beliefs. You value your beliefs so much and you believe in them and you are willing to put them to the test, put them to the test with your opponents so that they can join and understand why you have those beliefs. We value the tri-partisan compromise that we've achieved, not through forcing something through but through the diligence of answering questions and answering questions again. Some would say the goalpost has been moved. I think most people in our caucus feel it has been moved and we've continued to try to work together. We've continued to try to not respond to the delays. Even though we could have just ran this through we didn't. We saw the value and the contribution in a tri-partisan compromise. Many times in this building we've made major decisions and we've adjourned under darkness. Tonight is not one of those nights. We are committed to working together. As I said on day one, we're not accustom to the Majority nor are you accustom to the Minority and we make mistakes on both sides of the aisle but we don't walk away from the table. We persevere, we tell the truth, we keep our word, and we persevere to work together. We are not going to make a big decision tonight under darkness because we are confident that it will withstand the attacks and that the people of Maine will be better served because there is a new day in Augusta and we are going to make this decision under daylight. Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator **DIAMOND** of Cumberland was granted unanimous consent to address the Senate on the Record.

Senator DIAMOND: Thank you Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, it's been a long, long evening. I would say at the start that Senator Sullivan and Senator Schneider really did have to go. Senator Sullivan has problems with her feet and Senator Schneider has not had much sleep in the last several days. That's the only reason they are not here, Mr. President. We, as the three Democrats who voted for this bill, thought very strongly about its value and we felt very strongly about what it could do for the people of Maine but we also felt that it was getting so late and so beyond some reasonable hour in the middle of May that the three of us met with the President and we met the Majority Leader and we expressed our concerns to both of these leaders. We had an extended discussion of our concerns. As you heard the Majority Leader say, the people of Maine, we felt, deserved better than where we felt we were headed. We respected and respect the Majority Party and simply said to the President and the Majority Leader that we would like to have this done Monday. We'd like to have this delayed so that people who have been here for so long, so many hours, including both Senators who are pretty much running out of steam, so they could go home and you all could go home and not have to do this at one or two or three o'clock in the morning. I have to tell you that we understood the President could be seen as letting us move the goalpost. He could be seen as someone who wouldn't stand up to the other side, but that is so far from the truth. He showed the type of leader he is. He took our message back to the Republican caucus and they then invited us, the three of us, in so we could tell them and you all in the Majority caucus our concerns. We were received with great respect and when we left

we left with great respect from the Republican caucus. We pledged to them and to you that we will be here bright and early Monday morning and share with our caucus what we are going to do. We're going to support the bill as we have before. We're going to support it and we will not be supporting any efforts to derail it or slow it down. The three of us, at least, are going to be doing what we said we would do. We're going to be standing for the bill, in this case we will be standing with all of those who vote for it. Again, I need to emphasis that this was something the three of us felt very strongly about and we did not know how this would all be received. We suspect there will be some in our caucus who will not be feeling too good about what we did, but we felt it was the right thing. We felt it was right to share our concerns with the President and Majority Leader. We felt it was right to share those concerns face to face with the Republican caucus and we thought it was right that I stand and tell you all exactly what happened now. Mr. President, we thank you for your willingness to listen to us, to show us the respect of our wishes to delay this until Monday morning. The three of us will be here, as will everybody else, with our same convictions but maybe, just maybe, a little more pride in you, Mr. President, and the leaders and all of us because I think as a result of this Maine will get a better product. Thank you, Mr. President.
