Representative GIDEON: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Women and Men of the House. I rise in support of the pending motion because I know, well, I think, we share this belief. When a person from Maine seeks our help to legitimately start a business, it is our job to find a path to yes. LD 1783 is, at its core, a small business bill. It recognizes an existing market, the world of private wine collection and carves a niche industry where finally, these rare and vintage wines, that are bought and sold by Maine residents already, may now be legally sold in the state of Maine. In doing this, we enhance the Maine brand, we fill our hotel and restaurant rooms, we capture thousands of dollars of tax revenue within our borders instead of within of Massachusetts or New York, and we add ancillary jobs in the world of appraisal, auctioneering, transportation, warehousing, printing and cataloguing, just to name a few. The amendment I deliver today recognizes what we believe to be the last legitimate remaining regulatory concern. It makes this law a pilot program for the first three years, allowing no more than three wine auction licenses to be distributed per year. At the end of the three years, BABLO reports back to the VLA Committee to assess how the program is

working. Mr. Speaker, Women and Men of the House, please join me in finding a path to yes. Do not allow one controlling industry to block small business development in this state. Do not allow government bureaucracy to inhibit finding solutions. Instead, honor a Maine entrepreneur's request to invest in the Maine economy. Keep the promise, that I know we all made when we knocked on doors in 2012, to create new jobs in Maine and to show that the Chief Executive's desire to be "open for business" is more than just a sign on the Piscataqua River Bridge. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Caswell, Representative Ayotte.

Representative AYOTTE: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I just want to mention that if this Resolve passes, it will severely set back the creation of jobs in Aroostook County and Penobscot County. It will wipe out about two years of work by the DEP, so we'll have to resubmit the rules and I'm sure they'll be the same rules that they originally submitted. Mr. Speaker, I want to give a little background. When I first came to Augusta eight years ago, one of the departments I harbored grave concern about was the Department of Environmental Protection. After working closely with them and after having seen the many problems they were able to confront and farmed solutions for. I began to realize that the people working for the DEP are highly trained professionals and have a genuine concern for the environment. I have spoken to a number of them in regards to mining in Maine and they all expressed, with great confidence, in their ability to monitor. inspect and evaluate our mining procedures and operations. Mr. Speaker, I have come to respect the DEP, their professional staff and their field-trained scientists. I now truly believe that the DEP is fully capable of monitoring every aspect of the mining operation. Remember, Mr. Speaker, it's very important to emphasize that they have the full authority to shut down the operation in a minute should any infraction occur. I also want to remind you. Mr. Speaker, and my fellow Representatives, that when mining was first initiated the State of Maine, the DEP was nonexistent. We now have one of the finest and most skilled staff in the various areas of responsibility be it water, air quality of any state in the union. New technological advances in mining are now being utilized to protect the environment, not only while operations are occurring but monitoring programs will continue long after the mining operation has ceased. Also, Mr. Speaker. new requirements now exist that mandate the mining operator will and must have a fully funded trust fund prior to the starting up of any mining operation. The DEP can draw upon this fund at any time should circumstances warrant. Also, Mr. Speaker, let me reassure you that we live in different times than when mining was first initiated in the State of Maine. Yes, we have made mistakes, but we have learned from our mistakes. May I once more remind you that we have one of the most professional and most competent DEPs in the United States. They will inspect, monitor and scrutinize each step of the mining operation. The DEP will set parameters for each mining operation before it occurs. Once more, the DEP in the State of Maine has the power to abruptly shut down any operation that would be detrimental to our land, our water or our air. Also, I want to remind you, legislators, that you, yourselves, have given them this mandate. Now is the time to trust the authority you, yourselves, have given them. Lastly, after working with the DEP for eight years, I have full confidence that they will scrupulously do their duty without favor and without prejudice, but will make decisions based on science and facts, for I urge you and I ask you to vote red and not It means jobs in Aroostook County, support this Resolve. Penobscot County and other areas in Maine. We need the jobs. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Orrington, Representative Campbell.

Representative CAMPBELL: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. As I mentioned before and as you all know, this is a reflection of a bill that many of you passed in the last session, in the 125th, and it went out because it was deemed major substantive to have rules which apply to the law specific as you passed it. Now, what we're doing here is we're basically changing the law through rulemaking. I also mentioned what when I first arrived here, 21 years ago, that was a major problem. Rules would go out and were created to address laws, but when they came back, or when they became law, once promulgated, they well exceeded the intent of the law. Major substantive rules are to be created based on the law, the law of which you passed in the last session, and that's how they came back. At the committee, we asked both departments if they complied with the law, period, do they exceed or change the law. Both replied "No." So, in fact, as these go back to rulemaking, they can't exceed the intent of the law. They can't change the law. Each one of us, the minute we leave here, upon sine die, can put in a title to change that law if we want to. We can't do it through rulemaking. So I would encourage you to vote no and go downstairs to the Revisor's office immediately upon sine die and put a bill in to change it, if that's what you want to do.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Fort Kent, Representative Nadeau.

Representative **NADEAU**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Again, this is a

jobs bill for northern Maine and as for my last speech on the jobs for northern Maine, it was said in this chamber that we probably wouldn't get too many of the jobs in northern Maine because they were going to be specialty jobs and there may not be people to be able to do it in northern Maine. Well, I suggest different. Northern Maine is able to run northern Maine and the people that visit northern Maine and say that they love it, they love it because it's the people that created that environment that they love to come and visit. The problem is when rules are made to try to control that part of the state that people have no idea what's going on. The best resource of northern Maine is the people. The people have put into place what other people come and visit and enjoy. We are well capable of taking care of our mining. We are well capable of doing casinos, if that would come back. We are well able to do the logging and take care of our needs in northern Maine. But when it's spoken in these chambers that the number of jobs is exaggerated and the number of jobs would be technical and specialty jobs that wouldn't go to us. I find that appalling.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Rockport, Representative Welsh.

Representative **WELSH**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Again, I would just remind the body that this bill does not change the statute that was passed in the 125th. It does not stop jobs. It is about making sure that when we do mining in Maine, that it keeps our water safe and protects taxpayers. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Gardiner, Representative Grant.

Representative **GRANT**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As I spoke to the Ladies and Gentlemen of the House the last time on this mining bill, the mining rules, it was very clear to those of us who were evaluating these rules that, under the law that was passed by the 125th, the intent of that law was protect the environment and it was to protect the taxpayers. These rules do neither and that is why we are moving that they not be approved at this time. It is especially important that we take care of our water quality, and it is especially important that if we are going to enter into this kind of endeavor here in Maine, that we protect our taxpayers and make sure that our taxpayers are not on the hook for cleanups as they have been in other parts of the state. So I urge you to finally pass this Resolve as we've presented it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Caswell, Representative Ayotte.

Representative AYOTTE: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just rise to address a few of the concerns that were brought up by all. I want to remind the Representatives that these requirements that exist right now that mandate that the mining operator have a fully funded trust fund prior to starting up in the operation and that the DEP can shut an operation down in one minute, should any infraction occur, in reference to water, land or air. Also, I'd like to remind you that we have one of the most competent DEPs of any state in the union. I've talked with them at length about monitoring, inspecting and setting parameters for the mining rules in Maine, not only in Bald Mountain but allover Maine. These are very competent people. They would not allow the water, the land or the air to be polluted in any way. We have to trust the DEP. That's why we put them in place. These people are highly professional, highly skilled, highly trained, and all of the sudden we don't trust them. Ladies and gentlemen, we have two guarantees. We have a trust fund fully capable of putting the environment back in its original primeval condition. We have a DEP that will monitor, inspect and watch for any infraction of the law. That's why we employ those people. It's very important that we trust them because you, yourselves, as legislators, gave them this authority. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from York, Representative McGowan.

Representative McGOWAN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would just take exception to one of my good colleagues. These are not rules for northern Maine. These are rules for all of the State of Maine. These are the rules that would protect, or not, the water quality of all of the State of Maine. These are rules that would protect the taxpayers' dollars for all of the State of Maine. So the contention that this is rules about northern Maine or this only affects northern Maine, we need to realize that if mining is done in Maine, it can be done anywhere and the protections and the guarantees to the taxpayers and to our environment are important to all of us. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
