JOINT RESOLUTION IN HONOR OF THE MULTIFACETED AGRICULTURE OF MAINE

WHEREAS, recent statistics show that farming in Maine has grown, and Maine continues to lead the New England states with 8,174 farms; the value of Maine's crops and livestock grew 24% over the past 5 years; and

WHEREAS, Maine's agricultural enterprises provide more than \$764 million through the sale of farm products and contribute more than \$2 billion annually to the State's economy,

and Maine agricultural products are increasingly available locally in farmers' markets, schools and institutions; and

WHEREAS, Maine farmers are the stewards of 1.45 million acres of land, a vital resource in maintaining Maine's rural economy; and

WHEREAS, Maine is a world leader in the production of wild blueberries and brown eggs, third in the Nation in the production of maple syrup, eighth in the Nation in the production of fall potatoes, first in New England in the production of food, first in New England in the value of aquaculture sales, second in New England in milk and livestock production, and is the fastest-growing artisanal cheese-producing state in the country and is the only state involved in the commercial production of fiddleheads; and

WHEREAS, agriculture has always been a part of Maine's prosperity, comprising much of Maine's scenic open space, providing recreational opportunities and contributing to the character of Maine's rural communities; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh Legislature now assembled in the First Regular Session, pause in our deliberations to honor Maine farmers and innovators who have contributed so much to the betterment of our State, to pledge our support and encouragement and to urge the youth of Maine to pursue the growing opportunities for careers in today's technologically advanced agriculture industry; and be it further

RESOLVED: That a suitable copy of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Commissioner of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, as a token of the esteem in which those in this vital field are held.

We have the water, the land, and the fiber here to produce the food. And, I just would like to recognize the farmers and the agricultural sector in the State of Maine of the good job they're doing.

And as has been read in the Resolve, you know, some places, we are leading the country. Thank you.

Representative **TIMBERLAKE**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would also just like to acknowledge the Resolve and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, if you ever want to get something free from me, today is your day to get it. My nephew is down there handing out apples, so please stop and visit the people at their booths. They've taken a lot of pride and time to come visit you today. Thank you.

JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF SOILS TO MAINE'S FUTURE PROSPERITY

WHEREAS, soils are a natural resource that supports major economic sectors of our State, including agriculture, forestry and recreation; and

WHEREAS, healthy soils filter, store and release fresh water, and soil management is closely linked to the water quality in our groundwater, lakes, ponds, rivers and oceans; and

WHEREAS, wetland soils mitigate the effects of major storms and protect our coastal and riverine ecosystems; and

WHEREAS, soil is a living ecosystem that provides keys to scientific advances that directly affect human health, such as the development of new medicines, including recent advances in antibiotic technology developed from Maine soil; and

WHEREAS, good soil management can prevent damaging erosion, loss of organic matter, soil compaction and degradation of soil structure, thereby sustaining the essential ecosystem functions performed by soils; and

WHEREAS, soils are renewable only on the scale of geologic time yet support the renewable resources upon which Maine's future depends; and

WHEREAS, the 119th Maine Legislature designated the Chesuncook soil series as our official state soil to promote public awareness and education regarding soil resources; and

WHEREAS, 2015 has been declared by the United Nations General Assembly the International Year of Soils, celebrated by the Soil Science Society of America and many other organizations; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh Legislature now assembled in the First Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity during the International Year of Soils to recognize the essential role of all of Maine's soils in supporting a thriving Maine economy and healthy environment and ensuring a sustainable and productive future for the people of Maine.

READ.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Rockport, Representative Welsh.

Representative **WELSH**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Soil, unless we're farmers and serious gardeners, we don't really think about it. Yet, it's so critical to our livelihood and well-being.

This Resolution reminds us of the importance and value of our sustaining soils. Like air and water, our earth, our soil is life sustaining. Please take the time to consider this Resolution. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Winthrop, Representative Hickman.

Representative **HICKMAN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Women and Men of the House, I rise today to celebrate Maine farmers on what we call Ag Day in Maine AND to properly observe the International Year of Soils.

And I quote:

"Doomsayers have been warning about soil abuse since the dawn of agriculture, at least 5000 years before Christ. We have also known how its fertility gets rebuilt ever since 1882, when Charles Darwin published one of his more obscure discoveries: topsoil is created by none other than the lowly earthworm, at a rate of 10 to 20 tons per acre each year. (Worms manage this feat because, alone among the creatures on the planet, they dine on rocks, mixing their minerals with roots, leaves and biology's other leftovers for a nice, square meal. When it's time to relieve themselves, out comes fertile soil.) But if that soil is beaten into the dusty powder that has become increasingly common across the globe, there is nothing in it anymore for the worms to eat—or, by extension, for the rest of the earth's ecosystem.

Scientists have counted more organisms in a teaspoon of soil than there are human beings on the planet. Under a microscope, the dirt in that teaspoon looks like a cross between an Amazon jungle and some exotic, tropical coral reef teeming with seaweed, plankton, and monstrous creatures from a Jules Verne novel. During the last few decades, soil scientists have found that this ecosystem is far more extensive than anything yet seen on land or in the sea. Some have counted more organisms in a teaspoon of soil than there are human beings on the planet. Others have found the biodiversity of soil to be so vast that it defies tabulation through today's DNA tests. When examined under a microscope, excuse me, all these invisible creatures collaborate, they strengthen the soil to hold water; withstand erosion; store and feed the plants' nutrients; help build their immune systems; and, preliminary research suggests that they stimulate symbiotic microbes in the human gut as we eat these plants, which strengthens our immune systems, as well. Considering all this activity, Paul Kaiser (an urban farmer in Northern California), like a growing number of his peers, cannot understand the way we have treated the world beneath our feet. What creates life?' he asks. 'Sun, rain and soil. We can only impact one of these-and that is the soil. It's the only thing on the planet that takes death and converts it back to life. And all we seem to do is destroy it."

That is from an article entitled "Drought Farmer" by Todd Oppenheimer published in the *Craftsmanship Magazine* in January of this year.

As an organic farmer, Mr. Speaker, I know firsthand the importance of soil to my own prosperity. I cannot grow wholesome, nutritious food for myself, my family, or my community without healthy soil. And so I build my soil with so much attention and so much care that those who have come to know it call it dark chocolate. And so what a great coincidence it is today to have both of these Joint Resolutions on Agriculture and Soil presented on the exact same day.

If we are going to move Maine toward prosperity, we must continue to invest in our soils and support our farmers. We can NOT take agriculture for granted. We must continue to rebuild Maine's economy from the ground up. Thank you Mr. Speaker.
