JOINT RESOLUTION IN HONOR OF WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH AND IN RECOGNITION OF THE CONTRIBUTIONS THAT WOMEN MAKE TO MAINE AND TO THE UNITED STATES

WHEREAS, American women of every race, class and ethnic background have made historic contributions to the growth and strength of our nation in countless recorded and unrecorded ways, especially in the areas of political and social change; and

WHEREAS, the United States boasts a rich history of women whose vast and courageous achievements speak to the sense of excellence and potential shared by all Americans; and

WHEREAS, our country would not have attained its greatness without the strength, bravery, insight and persistence of the women who have come before us; and

WHEREAS, American women have played, and continue to play, critical economic, cultural, political and social roles in every sphere of the life of the nation by constituting a significant portion of the labor force working inside and outside of the home and in professions from educator to astronaut, yet make up a very small percentage of the executives in charge of Fortune 500 companies each year; and

WHEREAS, women have played a major role in the defense of our nation, both on and off the battlefield; and

WHEREAS, American women have been leaders, not only in securing their own rights of suffrage and equal opportunity but also in the abolitionist movement, the industrial labor movement, the civil rights movement and other movements that create a more fair and just society for all; and

WHEREAS, women not only have played critical economic, cultural and social roles in our society but also have permanently changed the face of American government and politics; and

WHEREAS, Maine has a rich and vibrant history of women in leadership, including Senator Margaret Chase Smith, perhaps best known for her contribution to the well-being of the United States and its people with her consistent stand for the condemnation of bigotry and injustice wherever she found them; and

WHEREAS, Senator Margaret Chase Smith was the first woman from Maine to serve in the United States Congress, the first woman in the nation elected to both houses of the United States Congress and the first woman to be placed in nomination for the presidency at a major party's convention; and

WHEREAS, Maine currently has some of the strongest women leaders in the nation, including Senator Susan Collins, the first woman to run for Maine Governor from a major party, and the recently retired Senator Olympia J. Snowe, the first woman to serve in both chambers of a state legislature and both chambers of the United States Congress; and

WHEREAS, the Maine Legislature has a distinguished record of women elected to leadership positions, including the Honorable Beverly Daggett, the first female President of the Senate, the Honorable Betheda Edmonds, the first woman to serve 2 terms as President of the Senate and the Honorable Elizabeth Mitchell, the first woman in the United States to have been chosen in a state legislature as both Speaker of the House and President of the Senate; and

WHEREAS, among the many women who have served in the Maine Legislature are the Honorable Hannah Pingree, the youngest woman to hold the position of Speaker of the House, and the many women who have served as Senate floor leaders, including the Honorable Jane A. Amero, the Honorable Pamela Cahill, the Honorable Nancy Randall Clark, the Honorable Chellie Pingree, the Honorable Sharon Treat, the Honorable Mary Small and the Honorable Carol Weston, and who have served as House floor leaders, including the Honorable Lucia M. Cormier,

the Honorable Emily Cain, the Honorable Carol A. Kontos and the Honorable Mary Clark Webster; and

WHEREAS, women who have served as assistant leaders in the Maine Legislature include the Honorable Minnette Cummings, the Honorable Barbara A. Gill, the Honorable Beverly Bustin-Hatheway, the Honorable Anne Rand, the Honorable Lisa Marraché, the Honorable Debra Plowman, the Honorable Elizabeth D. Moffatt, the Honorable Mary Najarian and the Honorable Anne Haskell; and

WHEREAS, women currently serving in positions of leadership include the Honorable Dawn Hill as Assistant Senate Minority Leader, the Honorable Sara Gideon as Assistant House Majority Leader and the Honorable Eleanor Espling as Assistant House Minority Leader; and

WHEREAS, within our state judicial system, Chief Justice Leigh I. Saufley is the first woman to serve as Maine's Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court; and

WHEREAS, the Honorable Janet T. Mills is the first woman to have served as Maine's Attorney General, as well as being a former District Attorney and Legislator; the Honorable Dale McCormick is the first woman to serve as Treasurer of State, as well as being a former Legislator; the Honorable Gail Chase is the first woman to serve as State Auditor, as well as being a former Legislator; Pola Buckley is the current State Auditor; and the Honorable Teresea Hayes is the Treasurer of State as well as being a former Legislator and Assistant House Minority Leader; and

WHEREAS, we must take every action possible to promote women in leadership so that we can achieve fair representation in our State Government, including recognizing Maine women's contributions to our state history; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of the contributions of women, the United States Congress has passed a resolution each year since 1987 designating the month of March as "Women's History Month"; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh Legislature now assembled in the First Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize March 2015 as Women's History Month in Maine; and be it further

RESOLVED: That We encourage the residents of this State to observe Women's History Month by participating in programs, ceremonies and activities to foster an awareness of and appreciation for the contributions made by women that have benefited and improved society.

Representative **BEAVERS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I apologize for the delay in getting this, since it is the last day of March. Both the Senate and the House found some corrections, and I apologize if there are any further ones.

I wanted to call your attention to the three page summary and policy recommendations in the 2015 Report on the Status of Women and Girls in Maine prepared by Maine's Permanent Commission on the Status of Women. Their 5th Dimension recommendation states that, "Maine should make investment in opportunities for women and girls regarding leadership education and incentivize promotion of women into leadership roles, both in the public and private sectors."

When we see the Legislature with fifty percent women, in proportion to the population, maybe we will not need to commemorate Women's History Month. My thanks go to all our current leaders, and all those in the past. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from New Gloucester, Representative Espling.

Representative **ESPLING**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I stand before you today to recognize women from our great state and country for their accomplishments and contributions to the State of Maine and to the United States.

Across the spectrum of American life, women have had great success in the areas of academia, art, labor, science, military, and government. Women such as Margaret Chase Smith, Susan Collins, and Olympia Snowe have had honorable public service careers, and have paved the way for young women to become leaders in their communities.

Women like Colonel Diane Dunn of Newburgh, the first female to take command of a brigade in the State of Maine, whose leadership has proven influential in the Maine Army National Guard.

Maine has a rich history of distinguished women servings as leaders in their homes, communities, and work places. It is an honor to stand here today as Assistant Leader of my own party. I have, and will, continue to be a voice for women and girls across this state. Thank you for your time and participation in recognizing March as Women's History Month.

Representative **ROTUNDO**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House, I'm pleased to have before you a unanimous, bipartisan supplemental budget.

I want to thank all my House and Senate colleagues on the Appropriations and Financial Affairs Committee for their hard work to make this possible, and for working together to fund critical priorities for our state. I also want to thank the staff of the Office of Fiscal and Program Review for their invaluable assistance.

There are many pieces to this \$28 million dollar supplemental budget. It was particularly important to our committee to include funding to address the crises being faced by our county jails and the Riverview Psychiatric Facility. It was important to all of us to work together to address patient safety, worker safety, and public safety concerns. I urge your support of the supplemental budget. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Oakland, Representative Nutting.

Representative **NUTTING**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Men and Women of the House, I rise to, well, to congratulate the Appropriations Committee on their unanimous budget as well.

The LD 236 that you see before you is an amalgamation of a number of bills that were put together in what we commonly call a supplemental budget. Some of the things we did you've heard from Representative Rotundo, in addition to the reorganizations, re-classes, and the range changes which are typical, we came to an agreement on increasing the staff at Riverview, and addressing some of the shortfall on the money and the consent degree at Riverview.

By including this money in the supplemental budget rather than waiting for the biennial budget allows them to get busy and hire people as they're graduating from school right now, instead of waiting until they all have jobs later in the summer. We addressed the shortfall of 2.5 million, approximately, in the county jails, and I think we came to a reasonable agreement on some of the surplus funds and the Fund for Healthy Maine that we used to maintain the payments to physicians who had received an increase and were about to lose it because the federal program changed, so we've changed that. We've kept the same, I mean.

I too, I would like to thank Chair Rotundo, and our lead Representative Winsor, as well as the members of all the policy committees who gave us insight and got us to where we need to be today. And I hope you can all support the unanimous report out of the Appropriations Committee. Some of these items we will revisit in a much bigger way, and I hope this is a preview of the accommodation and the goodwill that we will see in the biennial budget that is necessary to do later in the session. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Eagle Lake, Representative Martin.

Representative **MARTIN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, some of you have asked how the Appropriations Committee got to the figure that's on page 50, I believe, of the budget bill, which deals specifically with jails.

And, we relied on a report that came to us from the Board of Corrections, Joel Merry, who happens to be the Chair, and I want to quote from it so that people understand where and how we got there. And, basically he said, "The critical need totals 2.488 million. We've calculated the figure for the first six months of county jail expenditures, coupled with the known revenue shortfall. As mentioned in 2014, the Board received 1.2 million in supplemental funding, and it was a sufficient amount due to 9 of the 15 county jails being able to forego a portion of the budgeted revenue to be dispersed of the counties. Those counties are unable to do so in the current fiscal year, including the need this year. The following is a jail-by-jail breakdown of the necessary supplemental funding amount and supporting justification. Aroostook County will require \$782 thousand dollars. Cumberland County Jail will require \$596 thousand dollars. Penobscot County Jail will require \$563 thousand dollars. York County Jail will require \$396 thousand dollars. And Androscoggin County Jail will require 151 thousand. That, being the total that you find in the bill of \$2 million 488 thousand dollars.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Newport, Representative Fredette.

Representative FREDETTE: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, if I may just ask a question through the Chair?

The SPEAKER: The Representative may pose his question. Representative FREDETTE: In regards to the good

Representative FREDETTE: In regards to the good Representative from Eagle Lake's comments, is he suggesting that those are specific allocations within the budget, or not. They're not part of the budget language that I'm reading, and obviously we've learned the language in documents matters, and so, I just would like some clarification on that, because my understanding might be a little bit different. And second of all, Mr. Speaker, I'd request a roll call.

The same Representative REQUESTED a roll call on PASSAGE TO BE ENACTED.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.
