JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING APRIL 2015 AS AUTISM AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS, autism is a spectrum disorder, which means no 2 people with autism are affected the same way, and it is a complex developmental disability that usually appears during the first 3 years of life and results in a neurological disorder that affects the functioning of the brain and social interaction and communication skills; and

WHEREAS, one in 68 children is diagnosed with this spectrum disorder and prevalence has increased 30% since the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's study in 2008; and

WHEREAS, autism knows no racial, ethnic or social boundaries and neither income nor lifestyle nor education affects its occurrence and it is estimated that 1,500,000 people live with autism spectrum disorder in the United States; and

WHEREAS, autism costs the United States \$137,000,000,000 in annual health care costs, 90% of which are in adult services, and these costs are estimated to increase in the 10 years to between \$200,000,000,000 and next \$400,000,000,000; and

WHEREAS, while a single specific cause of autism is not known, current research links it to biological or neurological differences in the brain, and outdated theories and myths, such as autism being a mental illness, have been proven to be false; and

WHEREAS, with support, people with autism can live full lives and make meaningful contributions to society; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh Legislature now assembled in the First Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, pause in our deliberations to acknowledge that the month of April 2015 is Autism Awareness Month and to pledge our support and encouragement to all those affected by autism; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Autism Society of Maine as a token of our respect and support.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Farnsworth.

Representative **FARNSWORTH**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Before you, you have a sheet of paper that looks like a puzzle on it and a little ribbon. And, one of the symbols that we have been using for autism is the puzzle, primarily because it is still such a puzzle as to what the causes are for autism.

And, researchers are making some progress on that, but nonetheless, we're still dealing with what's going on because the incidences increased so radically over the past few years. But, nonetheless, I think the important thing is that we become aware that autism is a part of our existence, number one. Number two, that it is not hopeless; that with early intervention and appropriate treatment programs and there are a variety of treatment programs that are very effective. Many people with autism on the spectrum can certainly become very, very successful and productive citizens in our country.

So, we're moving away, now, from autism awareness to the concept of autism acceptance, and accepting these people into our society, helping to make them become productive, and becoming citizens like you and I. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from York, Representative Hymanson.

Representative **HYMANSON**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As a neurologist, I have had many opportunities to work with people who have autism. Commonly, we think of it as a loss of function, but many times, there is a gain—a gain in concentration, thinking speed, creativity, and other real gifts. When you meet someone with autism, find a quiet way to engage them. It will change you. Thank you.

JOINT RESOLUTION MAKING APPLICATION TO THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES CALLING A CONVENTION OF THE STATES TO PROPOSE AMENDMENTS TO THE UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION TO IMPOSE FISCAL RESTRAINTS, LIMIT FEDERAL POWER AND IMPOSE TERM LIMITS

WHEREAS, the United States Constitution empowered state legislators to be guardians of liberty against future abuses of power by the Federal Government; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Government has created a crushing national debt through improper and imprudent spending; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Government has invaded the legitimate roles of the states through the manipulative process of federal mandates, most of which are unfunded to a great extent; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Government has ceased to live under a proper interpretation of the United States Constitution; and

WHEREAS, it is the solemn duty of the states to protect the liberty of the American people, particularly for the generations to come, by proposing amendments to the United States Constitution for the purpose of restraining these and related abuses of power; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the Legislature of Maine respectfully applies to the Congress of the United States to call a convention for the specific and exclusive purpose of proposing amendments to the United States Constitution that impose fiscal restraints on the Federal Government, limit the power and jurisdiction of the Federal Government and limit the terms of office for federal government officials and members of Congress; and be it further

RESOLVED: That this application by this body constitutes a continuing application in accordance with the United States Constitution, Article V until at least two-thirds of the legislatures of the several states have made similar application pursuant to Article V but, if Congress proposes an amendment to the United States Constitution identical in subject matter to any of the 3 subject matters contained in this Joint Resolution, this application for a constitutional convention is no longer of any force or effect for that subject matter; and be it further

RESOLVED: That this application is void, rescinded and of no effect in the event that such a convention is not limited to such specific and exclusive purposes; and be it further

RESOLVED: That this body proposes that the legislatures of each of the several states comprising the United States apply to the Congress requesting the enactment of appropriate amendments to the United States Constitution or requiring the Congress to call a constitutional convention for proposing such amendments to the United States Constitution; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Secretary of the Senate and presiding officers of both houses of the legislatures of each of the several states in the nation, the Speaker and the Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, the President and the Secretary of the United States Senate and each member of the Maine Congressional Delegation.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Deer Isle, Representative Kumiega.

Representative **KUMIEGA**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House, you have a sheet on your desk, it was passed out this morning, it highlights some of the fiscal impact that this bill would have on local districts. Or, actually, it lists the pension costs.

The impact would vary depending on what your district's reimbursement rate is through the school funding formula. For example, the pension costs in Scarborough for this coming year are over \$700,000; RSU 19: almost \$400,000; RSU 4: almost \$300. RSU 6 is almost \$700,000; RSU 15 is \$380,000; RSU 87 is \$90,000; RSU 54 is over \$500,000; and RSU 52 is over \$400,000.

I submitted this bill because I didn't agree with the actions of the previous legislature, even though I did vote for that budget, of transferring these costs to local communities. We've had much debate over the past few years and we'll have more debate this year about shifting school costs to the local communities, and I think this is just another stone on the pile onto the backs of property taxpayers.

Passing this bill wouldn't guarantee funding, of course it would have to go through the budget process, but I think it would send a strong message to the Appropriations Committee that we need to stop piling more expenses onto the local property taxpayers. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Presque Isle, Representative Saucier.

Representative **SAUCIER**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Men and Women of the House, it's an amazing thing when we, as legislators, can say that we represent our constituents. When, in fact, a lot of times, we don't.

In cases of some communities in Aroostook County, I'll take Washburn for example, a loss of \$69,084 to the property taxpayers. In Caribou, \$309,212, and in my home town of Presque Isle, \$291,550.

It is clear to me that some members of this body don't actually represent their constituents on all issues. This is something that we are going to saddle our taxpayers, our property taxpayers, in our small communities, a huge sum of money that has to be paid for. It is an amazing thing that we can say we represent our constituents all the time. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Guilford, Representative Stearns.

Representative **STEARNS**: Thank you, Mr. Chair, Mr. Speaker, my apologies. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I stood firmly in my belief that LD 60 should pass, and not so much for the financial aspect of it, while I fully understand that in the next fiscal year, that's going to be a \$38 million transfer of liability to the local school systems, and to the local property taxpayers.

I stand more on the principle that when this state teacher retirement system was developed back in the early 1940s, the state made a decision then that the employer would be the State of Maine, in regard for retirement purposes. I think it's easy for folks to fall into the understanding that the local school unit is the employer, because in effect they are in every way, except for the state retirement purposes. I've heard it argued that the locals have control over this, and I think that argument relates to collective bargaining. And, so if the locals have poor skills at collective bargaining, if you will, it drives the cost of retirement up.

I would, again, go back that the locals don't have control about collective bargaining. That, in and of itself, is another state mandate. So, when you look at that as a lack of local control, and you look at the states shifting their obligation to the locals regarding their retirement fund, it presents a real problem of integrity in my mind. The locals have no ability to change the rates, they have no ability to change any component of the state retirement system, only this body, the Legislature, can do that. So, it's with that belief, I understand finances are tight, I don't believe that should go out under general purpose aid because it's not being used for general purposes in schools, it's a bill that is incurred at this level and being passed to folks at the local level. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Augusta, Representative Doore.

Representative **DOORE**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise today to ask this body to support LD 60. After spending nine years on my local school board, I just know what \$426,000 will do for the City of Augusta. So, regardless of how large your community is, this will be a great amount of money that your town or city can use, so I would urge you to vote in support.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Gardiner, Representative Grant.

Representative **GRANT**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I agree with my good colleagues on both sides of the aisle who've spoken on this issue.

I only want to raise the dollar figure and impact on one of my districts, which includes Gardiner, West Gardiner, Pittston and Randolph. That figure for teacher retirement that the state is trying, once again, to pass on to our local school communities is \$369,042. The taxpayers of those communities cannot make up this difference, and so in effect it means additional cuts to the educational resources going to our students.

The state needs to meet its obligations, not pass those obligations on to the property taxpayers. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Subsequently, the House voted to INSIST.
