JOINT RESOLÚTION RECOGNIZING FEBRUARY AS 2-1-1 MAINE MONTH

WHEREAS, 2-1-1 Maine is a comprehensive statewide directory of over 8,000 health and human services available in the State; and

WHEREAS, in order to promote the 2-1-1 Maine health and human services and emergency preparedness hotline, which helps Maine citizens get access to needed resources, we recognize February 2016 as 2-1-1 Maine Month; and

WHEREAS, 2-1-1 Maine helps to identify existing gaps in health and human services; and

WHEREAS, throughout the State, 2-1-1 Maine provides around-the-clock service through efficient and effective responses to questions arising from the growing complexities and needs in health, socioeconomic and human services; and

WHEREAS, 2-1-1 Maine provides emergency operations during times of natural and other disasters, including providing accurate and timely information for preparations and longer-term referrals for follow-up services, and valuable information for community planning and for future matching of resources and unmet needs; and

WHEREAS, 2-1-1 Maine directs Mainers to heating and utility assistance services that help prevent people from contacting the wrong agency for a federal Low-income Home Energy Assistance Program benefit, help prevent utility shutoffs and save people from spending winter nights without fuel assistance; and

WHEREAS, 2-1-1 Maine offers a number of specialized services, including the gambling helpline and assisting the Department of Health and Human Services, Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention with H1N1 influenza calls, and is also a resource for finding information about services such as tax preparation; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize February 2016 as 2-1-1 Maine Month.

Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House, 2-1-1 is a quiet program that punches way above its weight and I just want to just point out the fact that they quietly connect people of Maine with services all across the state. This is their 10th anniversary and they began in Cumberland and Washington Counties back in 2006. They went statewide in July of that year and they've now taken over 600,000 calls from residents of Maine offering help for services from heating assistance, food and shelter, mental health, substance abuse, and other things. They're available 24 hours a day and they operate 365 days a year.

I also just wanted to point out that they've worked very much with the Maine Emergency Management Agency during various state emergencies, whether it's hurricanes or storms or floods, they've been there. So, really, I just want to congratulate them on this important anniversary. I want everyone in this House to know of the important services they provide. The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bath, Representative DeChant.

Representative **DeCHANT**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this legislative sentiment has been about 16 years in the making. Sixteen years ago, we purchased our house on Middle Street, and of course, as our first home, we considered that every home had to have a lobster pot and accessories. So we went downtown to Front and Center to Now You're Cooking, a tiny, quaint, little cooking store and met both of the owners.

We didn't know at the time that it was just about a month or two after they had opened and Betsy Fear showed us the different types of lobster pots and talked through the different accessories. Mike Fear got on a ladder and pulled down the lobster pot that, of course, I decided on that was on the farthest reach of the shelf. Since then, we have watched the Now You're Cooking expand from a third of the storefront to two-thirds to the entire block on Front and Center. They have 3,000 square foot of retail space. They employ 20 people, four of which have been with them for over a decade. They have 18,000 products. And, Mr. Speaker, they have a 50-foot wall of gadgets.

So, this is only about half of the story. The other half of the story, of course, is that they advertise. You may have seen Mike Fear on television with his signature bow tie and his iconic "Crikey." They also run retail out of, of course, the store front, online, at acooksemporium.com, and through direct mail. The other part of this story, of course, are the owners, Betsy and Mike. They have raised their sons in Bath. They are committed and involved in the community in a variety of ways. Through their direct leadership, they contribute to 200 different nonprofits in our community.

So, the next time, Mr. Speaker, that you find yourself on Route 1, or anyone here in the chamber, I encourage you to choose the historic downtown Bath exit, go down to Front and Center, and whether you are a foodie, a gadget geek, or just simply have a kitchen, go and visit Now You're Cooking because I'm sure that you'll agree and also applaud that they were chosen Small Business of the Year by the Southern Maine Chamber of Commerce.
