By Mr. Merrill of Bluehill-Bill an act to regulate the taking of clams in the towns of Deer Isle, Sedgwick, Brooksville, Brookline, Bluehill, Castine and Swan Island.

SALARIES.

By Mr. Blanchard of Wilton-Bill an act to regulate the salaries of the county commissioners of Franklin county.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. Simpson from the committee on financial affairs, on petition reported resolve in favor of an appropriation the Maine Woman's Christian for Union. Printed under rule.

Mr. Hamilton from the committee on the judiciary reported ought to pass on bill an act to amend section 59, paragraph 6, of said section of chapter 3, Revised Statutes, relating to town, village and city by-laws and ordinances. Printed under rule.

Mr. Floyd from the committee on monstrance of Josiah Crosby and 162 legal affairs reported ought to pass on bill an act to amend an act to incorporate the Meduxnekeag hospital. Printed under rule.

Mr. Burns from the committee on education reported ought to pass on resolve in favor of Gorham Normal school. Printed under rule.

Mr. Blanchard from the same committee reported ought to pass on resolve in favor of an appropriation for Farmington State Normal school. Frinted under rule.

Mr. Levensaler from the same committee reported ought to pass on resolve in favor of appropriation for the Training and Normal School at Ft. Kent. Printed under rule.

Mr. Pierce from the committee on banks and banking, on petition of Albion Gates and 25 others praying that bankers give bonds, reported leave to withdraw.

Mr. King from the committee on interior waters reported in a new draft and ought to pass on bill an act to prevent the unreasonable obstruction of public travel over the Penobscot river. Printed under rule.

Mr. Thurston from the committee on agriculture reported ought to pass on bill an act to amend section 4, chapter 256, of the Public Laws of 1893 relating to the sale and analysis of commercial fertilizers. Printed under rule.

Mr. Holbrook from the committee on agriculture reported ought to pass on bill an act to regulate the sale of agricultural seeds. Printed under rule.

Mr. Briggs from the same committee reported ought not to pass on bill an act to regulate the sale and analysis of concentrated commercial feeding stuff.

READ AND ASSIGNED.

Resolve in favor of the Bangor Children's Home.

Resolve to secure the proper enforcement of the inland fish and game laws and to aid in the propagation of inland fish and game.

On motion of Mr. Goodrich of Maxfield, this resolve was laid on the table pending its second reading.

PASSED TO BE ENGROSSED.

An act entitled an act relating to a branch railroad track in Ashland and Sheridan plantation.

ORDERS.

On motion of Mr. Talbot of Lewiston, bill an act to provide in part for the expenditures of government, was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same gentleman the bill received its third reading and was passed to be engrossed.

On motion of Mr. Briggs of Auburn, the vote was reconsidered whereby the House accepted the report of the committee on agriculture reporting ought not to pass on bill an act to regulate the sale and analysis of concentrated commercial feeding stuff. On further motion by the same gentleman, the bill was recommitted to the committee on agriculture.

Mr. Jewell of Hallowell moved that when the House adjourns at its session, tomorrow morning, it be to meet Tuesday morning, at 10 o'clock.

The Speaker: The Chair would rule that the motion provides for an adjournment for a longer period than any single branch of the Legislature may adjourn, and that joint action would be required to make so long an adjournment.

Mr. Jewell withdrew his motion.
