An act to correct a clerical error in chapter 61, Public Laws of 1891, relating to migratory fish.

An act to repeal section 42, chapter 140, of the Revised Statutes, relating to resentencing convicts sentenced to State prison.

An act to amend section 17, of chapter 60, of the Revised Statutes, relating to change of name in divorce proceedings.
