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SENATE.

Friday, February 12, 1897.

The Senate met according to adjournment and was called to order by the President.

It is permissive in its nature and the provisions must be voted upon by the people, and inasmuch as the time is rapidly approaching for the annual meeting and city election, it is desired that it become a law as speedily as possible. I therefore move that the rules be suspended, the bill take its two several readings at this time and pass to be engrossed. be engrossed.

ORDERS OF THE DAY.

On motion by Mr. Savage of Androscoggin, bill an act to establish the Sanford municipal court, tabled pending reference, was taken from the table and re-ferred to the committee on judiciary in concurrence.

Bill an act to incorporate the Vinalhawen Water Co. was read once and on mo-tion by Mr. Savage of Androscoggin, was laid on the table pending second reading. Subsequently Mr. Savage moved to take the bill from the table and offered the

following amendment: Mr. Savage: I understand that on ac-Mr. Savage: I understand that on account of the approaching town meeting it is desired to make all the haste we reasonably can. Section 8, in regard to wilfully and maliciously corrupting the waters of the source of supply of this water company. In 1891 a general law was passed covering the entire subject matter of this section and as fer as matter of this section, and as far as I can remember, the Legislatures since then have left all these companies under the general law, so that I wish to offer an amendment to strike out section 8 and re-number section 9 as section 8.

The bill was taken from the table and amendment adopted. On motion by Mr. Savage, read the second time under suspension of rules and passed to be en-

grossed.

Resolve in favor of the town of Bruns-

Resolve in favor of the town of Brunswick came from the House indefinitely postponed, and was indefinitely postponed in concurrence. Subsequently Mr. Hargraves of York, moved to reconsider the vote of concurrence.

Mr. Hargraves: I will say in explanation that this matter was before the finance committee. As I understand, it is entirely covered by law and the decision is rendered by the Governor and Council, which was done. A member of the Council appeared before our committee and thoroughly explained the matter tee and thoroughly explained the matter to us, and in our judgment the resolve should have a passage. The point I wish to make here is to have the matter re-committed to the finance committee, because there are certain rights there that should be protected.

Upon Mr. Hargraves' motion, the vote was reconsidered, the Senate non-concurred with the House in the indefinite postponement of this bill, and the same was re-committed to the finance commit-

On motion by Mr. Stearns of Aroostook, the Senate adjourned.
