Mr. Engel: I do not know as there is any necessity to explain my reason, but there is a penalty attached to this, and no governor likes to sign that kind of a bill without giving public notice. By striking out this section the public will have notice that it will not take effect until thirty days after the Legislature has adjourned. has adjourned.
