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SENATE.

Tuesday. Feb. 23, 1897.
The Senate met according to adjournment and was called to order by the President.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Struthers of Gardirer.

Journal of Friday read and approved. Papers from the House disposed of in

concurrence. House report of the committee on snore of fisheries, granting leave to withdraw on petitions of Charles E. Patten and 38 others of Bath and of W. M. Spear and others of Gardiner, praying that no smelts be taken in the Kennebec river and its tribution around with hook and line. House report of the committee on shore tributaries, except with hook and line, came from the House read and accepted and pending acceptance in concurrence was laid on the table on motion by Mr. Clason of Kennebec.

An act to create a lien on spool timber and bars came from the House on its first reading and on motion by Mr. Engel of Penobscot was laid on the table.

TABLED.

An act relating to the Coburn Steam-An act relating to the Coourn Steam-boat Company came up for its first read-ing and on motion by Mr. Savage of An-droscoggin, was laid on the table. Resolve in favor of George M. Coombs came up for its second reading and on

motion by Mr. Billings of Waldo, was laid

on the table.

An act to authorize the Auburn Turner Railroad Company to make a loan came up on its passage to be enacted, and on motion by Mr. Savage of Andros-coggin was laid on the table.

ORDERS OF THE DAY.

On motion by Mr. Clason of Kennebec, ordered, that a message be sent to the governor, requesting the return to the Senate of Senate document 57, an act to amend section 9 of chapter 315 of the Public Laws of 1893, relating to the salary of the assistant librarian of the Maine State Library.

On the return of the bill to the Senate, the vote was reconsidered whereby the same was passed to be enacted. On motion by Mr. Clason it was laid on the table

On motion by Mr. Reynolds of Cumberland, the vote was reconsidered whereby the Senate referred to the committee on legal affairs in concurrence, bill an act to authorize the county commissioners of Cumberland county to negotiate a loan for the payment of land damages in said county, and the bill was laid on the table to be printed.

On motion by Mr. Drummond of Cumberland, bill an act granting a new charter to the city of Portland, was taken from the table and recommitted to the

ommittee on judiciary.
On motion by Mr. Clason, bill an act to amend section 4 of chapter 256 of the Public Laws of 1893 relating to the sale and analysis of commercial fertilizers, was taken from the table and passed to be enacted.

On motion by Mr. Savage of Androscoggin, an act authorizing the lowering of the waters of Noves pond, was taken

from the table.

Mr. Savage offered the following: Sen ate amediment A. Add at the end of section 1 the following: Said corporation shall be liable to pay all damages tion shall be hable to pay all damages sustained by any person by so lowering the said waters, and if any person sustaining damages as aforesaid and said corporations cannot mutually agree upon the sum to be paid therefor, such person may cause his damages to be ascerticed in the components of water the said in the components.

the sum to be paid therefor, such person may cause his damages to be ascertained in the same manner and under the same conditions, restrictions and limitations as are by law prescribed in the case of damages occasioned by the laying out of highways.

Amendment adopted. On motion by Mr. Grindle of Hancock, the bill and amendment were laid on the table.

On motion by Mr. Savage, an act to incorporate the South Branch Improvement Company was taken from the table.

Mr. Savage offered Senate amendment A. Amend section 5 by inserting after the word "tolls" in line nine the words "said lien to be enforced in the manner provided for the enforcement of liens on logs and lumber by sections 38 and 39 of chapter 91 of the Revised Statutes and all amendments and additions thereto."

Amend the same section by striking out all after the word "mark" in line 10, Amendment adopted.
