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#### SENATE.

Friday, Feb. 26, 1897. The Senate met, according to adjourn-ment, and was called to order by the President.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Wyman of Augusta. Journal of yesterday read and approved.

Papers from the House disposed of in concurrence.

Bill an act to regulate the sale and an-ter 308 of the Private and Special Laws of 1889, as amended by section 1 of chap-ter 232 of the Private and Special Laws of 1891, came up on its first reading. House amendment A was adopted in concur-rence. On motion by Mr. Savage of An-droscoggin the bill with amendment was tabled pending second reading. The temperature of this Senate chamber has been from 70 to 80, and it has been rather an uncomfortable place in which to re-main. I would rather defer these warm surroundings until the time when I can-not help myself, and sitting near the fire place, with the additional heat from the heating anparatus it is a very unthe heating apparatus, it is a very un-comfortable thing for me. If they will keep the temperature down to anywhere near a decent temperature, I have no ob-jection to the fire places being used and a wood fire burning, but I do not care to have it made quite so hot for me while bere on earth

Mr. Stearns: The greatest consolation that I have in this Senate chamber is the actual existence of these open wood fires, actual existence of these open wood hres, and I, for one, would be very unwilling to see them discontinued. I apprehend that there would be no difficulty, on the request of the senator from Knox, or from any other senator, to the person in charge of the heating apparatus, to have the temperature reduced that comes from the steam nines so that the room will the temperature reduced that comes from the steam pipes, so that the room will not be overheated, and I have made this motion, not facetiously, to lay the order. on the table, in the hope that some ar-rangement may be made to satisfy the senator from Knox, so that we will not be deprived of what is to me the almost inestimable comfort of an open fire. The question being on the motion to

table the order, 18 voted in the affirmative and 7 in the negative, and the order was laid on the table. The President called Mr. Engel of Pen-
