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# **HOUSE.**

#### Tuesday, March 14, 1899.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Meade of Hallowell.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

An act to regulate the increase of capital stock by street railroad companies.

This bill came up from the Senate amended by Senate amendments "A," "B," "C," "D," and "E."

These amendments were adopted, and on motion by Mr. Macomber of Augusta, the bill was read the third time under suspension of the rules and passed to be engrossed as amended.

By Mr. Nickerson of Swanville—Petition of J. H. Sullivan and 18 others in favor of a municipal court at Searsport.

Mr. Maxcy of Gardiner, presented the following: Resolve relating to the record of births, marriages and deaths in the office of the secretary of State.

Mr. MAXCY: This is a matter which I have introduced at the request of the secretary of State. He has records on file in his office, lumbering up his office, and he wishes them removed to the office of the register of vital statistics, and this order simply requires the secretary of State to deliver to the register of vital statistics the records that have accumulated in his office prior to the passage of the law of 1891. This resolve calls for no money, but simply transfers the records from the secretary of State's office. I move that the rules be suspended and that the resolve take its two readings and be passed to be engrossed at the present time.

The motion was agreed to, the resolve was read twice and was passed to be engrossed.

Mr. Bird of Rockland, presented the following: An act to amend section 8, of chapter 24, of the Revised Statutes, as amended by chapter 326, of the Public Laws of 1897.

# REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. Philbrook from the judiciary committee, reported ought not to pass on bill an act to create the Bath and Brunswick Water District.

Same gentleman from same committee, on order, reported bill an act to authorize the inhabitants of the town of Woolwich, or their assigns, to increase the height of the dam across Nequasset stream in the town of Woolwich, and that it ought to pass.

Mr. Morey from the committee on legal affairs, on order, reported ought to pass on bill an act to amend section 28, of chapter 90, of the Revised Statutes, relating to the discharge of mortgages, as amended by chapter 69, of the laws of 1895.

Mr. Gentleman, from the same committee, reported in a new draft and ought to pass, bill an act to amend section 1, of chapter 498, of the Public Laws of 1889, as amended by the Public Laws of 1899, relating to hawkers and peddlers.

Mr. Chase from the same committee, on order, reported a resolve authorizing the Governor and Council to accept in the name of the State from the Pemaquid Monument Association the title to Fort William Henry, and adjacent lands, and that it ought to pass. Mr. Chase from the same committee, reported in a new draft and ought to pass, bill an act additional to chapter 81, of the Revised Statutes, relating to sale and writ of personal property attached.

Mr. Jordan from the committee on ways and means, reported ought to pass on bill an act for the assessment of a State tax for the year 1899.

Mr. Jordan moved that the rules be suspended and that the bill take its three readings at the present time and be passed to be engrossed.

The bill was read once.

On motion by Mr. Virgin of Portland, the bill was laid on the table pending its second reading.

Mr. Jordan from the committee on ways and means, reported ought to pass on bill an act for the assessment of the State tax for the year 1900.
