SENATE.

Thursday, Feb. 23, 1899.

The Senate met according to adjournment and was called to order by the president.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Peckham of Hallowell.

Journal of yesterday read and approved.

(Senator Drummond of Cumberland, in the chair.)

Papers from the House disposed of in concurrence.

Mr. Reynolds, for the committee on legal affairs, reported ought to pass, bill an act to amend section 19 of chapter 242 of the Private and Special Laws of 1895, relating to the charter of the city of South Portland.

Mr. Weeks, for the same committee, reported ought to pass, bill an act to amend section 44 of chapter 2 of the Revised Statutes, relating to distribution of printed copies of the Public Laws.

ORDERS OF THE DAY.

(President Clason in the chair.)

Bill an act in relation to the salary of justices of the supreme judicial court.

This bill came up by special assignment.

Mr. STEARNS of Aroostook said: Mr. President, as this measure has been once discussed, I presume all has been said upon it that it worth while to say. I now move that it be read the second time and pass to be engrossed, and I move that the vote being taken by yeas and nays, the question being upon the second reading of the bill, those in favor of the bill voting yes and those opposed voting no.

The motion prevailed, and the yeas and nays were called, as follows:

And 15 voting in the affirmative and 14 in the negative, the motion prevailed and the bill was read the second time and passed to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Weeks of Somerset—Resolve in favor of road in Indian Township, was taken from the table.

Mr. WEEKS: I now move that the vote whereby this resolve was passed to be engrossed be reconsidered. I do this in order that the chairman of the committee on State lands and State roads may offer an amendment.

Mr. Dudley of Washington offered Senate amendment A, which was adopted and the resolve as amended was passed to be engrossed. On motion by Mr. Jones of Penobscot—Resolve in favor of Lee Normal Academy, was taken from the table and passed to be engrossed.

On motion by the same gentleman, resolve in favor of Wilton Academy, was taken from the table and passed to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Merrill of Somerset, order directing the secretary of the board of agriculture to furnish the committee on financial affairs a full and itemized account of all moneys drawn by him from the State treasury for the years 1897-1898, and to whom paid and for what purpose, was taken from the table and passed.

On motion of Mr. Grindle of Hancock, bill an act to establish the Bar Harbor municipal court, was taken from the table and passed to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. King of Oxford, Adjourned.
