Mr. Staples of Cumberland, Bill, An Act additional to and amendatory of Chapter 318 of the Private and Special Laws of 1801, entitled An Act to incorporate the Bridgton Water Company, was passed to be enacted.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Canham of Hallowell.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

Bill, An Act to extend and regulate the liability of employers to make compensation for personal injuries suffered by employes in their service, came from the Senate referred to the committee on legal affairs. On motion of Mr. Drew of Portland it was tabled for printing pending its reference in concurrence.

Senate Bills on First Reading.

Bill, An Act to amend Chapter 372 of the Public Laws of 1885 relating to the compensation of the county commissioners for Oxford county.

On motion of Mr. Pettengill of Rumford, the rules were suspended, the bill received its three readings and was passed to be engrossed.

Bill, An Act to authorize the Biddeford and Saco Water Company to issue bonds and for other purposes.

On motion of Mr. Mewer of Old Orchard, this bill was laid on the table and Thursday of next week assigned for its consideration.

Bill, An Act authorizing the city treasurer to purchase unmatured State of Maine bonds.

This bill came from the Senate read twice and passed to be engrossed under suspension of the rules.

Mr. PETTENGILL of Rumford: This is a bill that is presented by the Committee on Appropriations. have found that during the past year if the treasurer had had authority, when consent was given by the governor and council, he could have applied, from the surplus money in the treasury, at least \$100,000 toward the reduction of our State debt. It seemed to us as a committee that this was a measure of just common, good business prudence to have this authority, and this bill comes from the Committee on Appropriations and is recommended by them. I move that the rules be suspended and that the bill receive three readings at the present time and be passed to be engrossed.
