SENATE.

Monday, Feb. 20, 1905.

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by Rev. Fr. Doherty of Augusta.

Journal of the last session read and approved.

Papers from the House disposed of in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Staples of Knox, bill "An Act regulating the moving of families within the State" was tabled, pending reference in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Morse of Waldo, bill "An Act to close March River in the county of Waldo," with report of committee on Inland Fisheries and Game to which the same had been referred, that the same be referred to the commissioners of Inland Fisheries and Game as the subject matter of the Act properly comes under their juridiction by the general law, was tabled.

House Bills Read and Assigned.

Orders of the Day.

On motion by Mr. Simpson of York, the rules were suspended, and that senator introduced bill "An Act authorizing the inhabitants of York to give the York Hospital a certain tract of land." On further motion by the same senator, the same was

referred to the committee on legal affairs Mr. SIMPSON of York: Mr. President: At the opening of the Legislature, while in joint convention in the hall of House of Representatives, upon calling the convention to order, you had the mis-fortune to break your gavel. The Hon. The Hon. Horace Mitchell of Kittery was present at that time; and he thought it might be wise for you to have a large stock of the same on hand. It gives me great pleasure, on his behalf, to present you this gavel, and also to acquaint you with the history of the same as appears from the following communication, a part of which
