The amendment was adopted and the bill was then read twice as amended and assigned for Tuesday morning.

Mr. Gleason offered amendment A, to strike out in line one of Section 2 the words "cess pool" and add "house"; in line two strike out the word "sinkspout"; in line three strike out "two hundred feet" and insert "eight rods"; strike out lines 8, 9 and 10.

He also offered amendment B, in line one of Section 3 to strike out the word "drainage."

The amendments were adopted, the bill was read the third time and was passed to be engrossed.
