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SENATE.

Tuesday, January 24, 1911.

Senate called to order by the President. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Hope of Augusta. Journal of previous session read and

approved.

Papers from the House disposed of in concurrence.

Bill, "An Act to authorize the Aroostook Valley Railroad Company to extend the properties of the Canadian Pacific Railway between Presque Isle and Aroostook Junction."

Bill, "An Act to authorize the Aroostook Valey Railroad Company to extend its line from Washburn to New Sweden and for other purpose."

Bill, "An Act to authorize the Aroostook Valley Railroad Company to extend its lines from Washburn to the west line of the State," came from the House, by that Branch referred to the committee on Railroads and Expresses. (On motion by Mr. Irving of Aroostook, these three bills were tabled for printing pending reference to the committee.)

Bill, "An Act to amend Section 65, Chapter 23, of the Revised Statutes, relating to duties of Road Commissioners," came from the House, by that Branch referred to the committee on Ways and Bridges. (On motion by Mr. Staples of Knox, tabled for printing pending reference to the committee.)

Inland Fisheries and Game.

By Mr. Edwards of Androscoggin: Bill, "An Act to regulate the transportation of fish and game beyond the limits of the State of Maine for breeding, scientific and advertising purposes."

Shore Fisheries.

By Mr. Staples of Knox: Petition of S. O. Hurd and 20 others to prohibit the catching, fishing for or taking of herring in the waters of the State except by use of permanent weirs or traps.

Also: Petition of John Bird and 60 others to prohibit the catching, fishing for or taking of herring in the waters of the State except by use of permanent weirs or traps.

Also: Petition of John S. Kelly and 56 others to prohibit the catching, fishing for or taking of herring in the waters of the State except by use of permanent weirs or traps.
