SENATE.

Monday, March 40, 1911.

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Clifford of Gardiner.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Papers from the House disposed of in concurrence.

Bill, An Act to amend Section 26 of Chapter 15 of the Revised Statutes to provide for school privileges for scholars living at fog warning stations and life saving stations.

This bill came from the House, by that body referred to the committee on education. The Senate non-concurred with the action of the House and the bill was placed on file.

Resolve in favor of J. P. Tucker, secretary of the School for Feeble Minded.

This resolve came from the House, by that branch received and given its readings and passed to be engrossed under suspension of the rules, without reference to a committee.

On motion by Mr. Milliken of Aroostook, the Senate non-concurred with the action of the House and referred the resolve to the committee on appropriations and financial affairs. Sent down for concurrence.

Eill, An Act authorizing the Rumford Falls Village Corporation to raise money for the purpose of cleaning its streets and keeping same in sanitary condition.

In the House this bill was received and under suspension of the rules was given its three readings and was passed to be engrossed. Under suspension of the rules, the bill was given its two readings and was passed to be engrossed.

Bill, An Act to amend Section 55 of Chapter 15 of the Revised Statutes, relating to free High schools.

On motion by Mr. Milliken of Aroostook, tabled for printing.

Fill, An Act to legalize the proceedings of the Universalist Society of Orland, Me.

This bill was introduced in the House under the suspension of the rules, was given its three readings without reference to a committee, and was passed to be engrossed.

The rules were suspended and the bill was given its two readings in the Senate and passed to be engrossed.

House Document No. 306, An Act to amend Chapters 8 and 9 of the Revised Statutes, relating to the duties of State and local assessors.

This bill was indefinitely postponed in the Senate in non-concurrence and sent to the House for concurrence. The House insisted upon its former action and called for a committee of conference.

We shall be through tomorrow and make final report.

Mr. KELLOGG: Mr. President, I will say that the insurance committee has a bill that should come up before it tomorrow.

Mr. FARRINGTON of Kennebec: Mr. President, do I understand about that amendment? The committee on legal affairs has assigned for tomorrow two matters on which we will have to have hearings. We have several uncompleted matters to report on. I only want to see that that order does not tie us up.

I move that the bill be indefinitely postponed. The motion was agreed to.
