Tuesday, January 14, 1913.

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by Rev. Henry E. Dunnack of Augusta.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Papers from the House disposed of in concurrence.

From the House: An Act to amend Section 1 of Chapter 284 of the Public Laws of 1909, relating to the Westbrook Municipal Court, came from the House by that Branch referred to the Committee on Legal Affairs.

Judiciary.

By Mr. Stearns of Oxford: An Act to amend Section 116 of Chapter 15 of the Revised Statutes of Maine, relating to instruction for the blind.

Ways and Bridges.
