On motion by Mr. Hersey of Aroostook the report and bill were tabled pending acceptance and next. Wednesday was assigned for us consideration.

Mr. Hersey from the same committee, on an Act to enlarge the juris: diction ot the Western Somerset Municipal Court, reported same "ought to pass." The report was accepted and the bill tabled for printins under the joint rules.

Mr. Dutton from the same committee on an Act to amend Section 48 of Chapter 47 of the Revised Statutes, relating to eorporations owning, property or conducting business in foreign countries, reported same "ought' not to pass."

The report was accepted.
Mr. Allen from the committee on military affairs, on Resolve in favor of an appropriation to provide for par ticipation by the state of Maine in the joth anniversary exercises on the battlefield of Gettysburg, Pa., reported same in a new draft under the samo title and that it "ought to pass."

Mr. Smith from the committee on insane hospitals, on Resolve in favor of the Eastern Maine Hospital, reported same in a new draft under the title "Resolve in lavor of the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital for maintenance and support," and that it "ought to pass."

On motion by Mr. Flaherty of Cumberland, An Act to amend Section 5 of Chapter 184 of tho Private and Special Laws of 1891 was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same selator, the litle having been amended by adding thereto the worcis "relating to drains and sewers in the city of Portland." was referred to the committee on Itgal affairs.

On motion by Mr. Stearns of Oxford, unamimous consent was given and that senator presented the following joint resolution, and moved its passage:

WHEREAS, there is now pendin: beiore the Legislature of the State of Maine measures looking toward legislation for the regulation and control of public servico corporations, and

WHEREAS, the view and opinions of Eon. Pobert M. LaFollette, United: States Senator of Wisconsin, upon this subject would be of interest and value to this Legislatnre at the present time, now therefore be it

RTSOLVED, the House concurring, that Senator LaFollette be and he heredy is inviter to address the Legislature of Maine upon the aforesaid pending lesislation, ir the Hall of the

House of Representatives on or about February 26, 1913, and that the secretary of the Senate is hereby instructed to transmit this invitation to Senator LaFollette, arrange the date for such address and notify this Legislature thereof.

Read, adopted and sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Stearns of Oxford, An Act to amend Section 1 of Chapter 90 of the Public Laws of 1911, was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same senator, the title having been corrected by adding thereto 'relating to the fishing for smelts in Penobscot and Casco bays," was referred to the committee on sea and shore fisheries in concurrence.

Vir. STrARNS of Oxford: Nr. President, yesterday there was upon the table an Act to provide for a commission to be known as the People's Water Rights and Power Commission of the State of Maine. It was tabled by me, and after looking into it, I had it referred in concurrence vithout printing. I have since learned that there was a. misapprehension in regard to it by in good many people, who supposed it had been tabled for printing, and that there has been a large call for copies of this bill.
I move that the vote whereby the bill was referred to the committee to be reconsidered, and that the bill lie upon the table. Then if the Senate thinks it advisable, that it be printed.

The motion twas agreed to.
Mr. HERSEX of Aroostook: Mr. President, I think that a bill of that kind should be printed, and I move that the vote whereby the bill was tabled, be reconsidered.
The motion was agreed to.
On further motion by the same senator, the bill was tabled for printing pending reference.

On motion by Mr. Cole of York, Senate Document 293, An Act relating to the collection of inheritance taxes, was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same senator, was referred to the committee on judiciary in concurrence.

On motion by the same senator, Senate Document 295, An Act to amend Chapter 118 of the Private and Special Laws of 1911, relating to the park commission of the city of Portland, was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same senator, was referred to the committee on judiciary in concurrence.

On motion by the same senator, An Act to amend Section 21 of Chapter 41 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by Chapter 65 of the Laws of 1909, was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same senator, the title having been corrected by adding the words "relating to shipments of lobsters," was referred to the committee on judiciary in concurrence.
On motion by the same senator, an Act to amend Section 1 of Chapter 188 of the Public Laws of 1007 , was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same senator, the title having been amended by the addition of the words "relating to the assessment of taxes for street sprinkiing," the Senate non-concurred with the action of the House in referring this bild to the commituee on judiciary, and the hill was then referred so the committee on taration.

On motion by the same senator, an Act acditional to Chapter 11 of the Revised Statutes, was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same senator, the title having been corrected by adclins the words "relating to supplying typewriters for resisters of deeds," was referred to committee on judiciary in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Wing of Franklin, Senate Document 290, Report of the committee on salaries and fees with accompanying order relating to appointment of a special joint committee on salaries and fees to sit during the recess of the Legislature and to report to the next Legislature, was taken from the table,

On further motion by the same senator, the Order was given a passage.

On motion by Mr. Colby of Somerset. Senate Document 291, an Act to amend Section 1 of Chapter 94 of the Reviser Statutes of Maine, relating to mills and mill dams, was taken
from the table, and on further motion by the same senator, was referred to the committee on interior waters.

On motion by Mr. Morey of Androscoggin, an Act to amend Section 16 of Chapter 11 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by Chapter 125 of the Public Laws of 1905, was taken from the toble, and on further motion by the same senator, the title having been corrected by aclding the words "relating to the recording of plans," was referred to the committee on lesal affairs in concurrence.

On motion by the same senator, an Act to amend Section 8 of Chapter 325 of the Private and Special Laws of 1897, was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same senator, the titie haring been corrected by addins" the words "to establish a municipal court in the town of Waterville." was referred to the committee on lesal affairs in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Conant, Senate Document 294, An Act relating to en forcement of law regulating sale of seeds, feeding stuffs. commercial fertilizers, drugs, foods, fungicides and insecticides, was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same senator, was referred to the committee on agriculture.

On motion by Mr. Nurphy of Cumberland, Senate Document 292, An Act relating to the compulsory assignment of real estate mortgages under certain circumstances, was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same senator, was referred to the committee on judiciary in concurrence.

On motion by the same senator, Senate Document 236, An Act to amend Section 66 of Chapter 51, Revised StatŁutes of Maine, relating to railroad crossings of highways and other ways, was taken from the table.

On further motion by the same sen. ator, the Senate roted to non-concur With the action of the Fouse in referring this bill to the committee on judiciory, and the bill was then referred to the committee on railroads and expresses.

On motion by the same senator, Senate Document 287, An Act to amend

Section 65 of Chapter il of the Revised statutes of Maine, relating to railroads cossing highways or other public ways, was taken from the table.

On further motion by the same seriator, the Senate voted to concur with the dotion of the Fouse in refermos this bill to the committee on judielars, and the bill was then referred to tho committee on railroads and expresses.

On motion by the some senator, the vote whereby the order accompanying the report of the committee on salaries and fees, Senate Document 290 , was given a passage, was reconsidered.

On further motion by the same senator, the order was tabled pending passage.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair desires to make a brief announcement to the members of the Senate. The presiding officers of the two Branches of this Legislature have been making a very determined effort in the carly weeks and the middle weeks of this session to get business along as rapidly as possible. And the very cheerful and hearty co-operation which has been receired from the members of the Senate and House encourages the Chair to make two or three suggestions, this morning, to the members of the senate.

In the first place the Chair desires to suggest that senators who expect to introduce bills of a public nature will if possible introduce them right away and have them referred to the committees. It is impossible for those in charge of the business of the two Branches to know what bills of a public nature the various senators and representatives may have in mind to introduce, and while no rule has been made in regard to the time limit of such bills, it is very desirable they be introduced at the earliest possible moment for consideration by the committees.

The next suggestion refers to the duties of the senators as chairmen of the joint committees of the Legisla-
ture. The business of the joint committees is regulated to a large extent by the adrice of the chairmen. The Chair desires to suggest to the menbers of the senate in their capacities as chairmen of the joint committees, that re-assignment of matters assignfrt for hearings be resisted unless reassigmment is absolutely necessary. And that in case of reassignment, if possible, the now hoaring be held the same week, even if an evening sossion of the committee is necessary for that purpose.

The Chair wishes to urge very strongly upon mombers of the Senate the matter of an early assignment of all matters before your committees for consideration. If possible, it is hoped that matters may not be assigned latcr than the first of March or the first week in March for hearing.

The Chair aiso desires to urge upori you as chaimmen of committees the great importance of a prompt report from your committees on all matters that have been considered, unless in the case of an appropriation or of a bill of great importance, like the Public Utilities measure, that must be put into shape by the committee. The Chair thinks it advisable that all ordinary matters should be reported promptly after hearing.

These suggestions are made in the interest of prompt dispatch of business more than in the interest of a short session, but these suggestions if carried out will tend to that end. The main purpose of the presiding officers is to avoid as far as possible the unseemly rush and haste that have too often characterized the last week or two or the session. If these suggestions are carried out the rush of the last end of this session will be very materially relieved.
