Thursday, Jan. 14, 1915.

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by Rev. Fred V. Stanley of Hallowell.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

The hour having arrived to which the joint convention adjourned the Senate proceeded to the hall of the House.

(For proceedings in joint convention see House Report.)

On return of the Senate to its chamber, on motion by Mr. Butler of Knox, it was

Ordered: The House concurring, that when the Senate and House adjourn they adjourn to meet at 10.30 o'clock A. M. Tuesday, Jan. 19.

Sent down for concurrence.

Subsequently the Senate was informed that the House had concurred in the action of the Senate.

The following bills, petitions, etc., were presented and on recommendation of the committee on reference of bills were referred to the following committees:

Inland Fisheries and Game

By Mr. Herrick of Franklin: Resolve in favor of preserving the life of the fish in the several fish hatcheries, and for the temporary operation of the hatcheries and feeding stations for fish in this State, and for the protection of fish, game and birds.

Judiciary

By Mr. Colby of Somerset: Bill, An Act to regulate the practice of the system, method or science of healing known as osteopathy, creating a board of examination and regulation for those designing to practice the same, and providing penalties for violation of this act. (Ordered printed and referred.)

Legal Affairs

By Mr. Colby of Somerset: Bill, An Act to amend the charter of Dead River Log Driving Company, as amended by Chapter 233 of the Private and Special Laws of 1903.

By Mr. Boynton of Lincoln: Resolve proposing an amendment to the Con-

stitution of the State of Maine providing for the election on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, biennially, of Governors, senators, representatives and other officers now required to be elected on the second Monday of September, biennially.

Pensions

By Mr. Flaherty of Cumberland: Bill, An Act for the relief of the blind residents of Maine. (Ordered printed and referred.)

Ways and Bridges

By Mr. Boynton of Lincoln: Resolve in favor of repair of bridges in the town of Dresden.

By Mr. Boynton of Lincoln: Resolve appropriating money to assist the town of Whitefield in building a bridge across the Sheepscot river in North Whitefield.

The PRESIDENT: There are two committees appointed by the Chair from the Senate. Those committees were not read by the secretary. The secretary will now read the list of those committees.

Any unexpended balance at the close of the year 1915 shall be available for use in 1916.

On motion by Mr. Hastings of Androscoggin it was

Ordered: That the secretary of the Senate be authorized to furnish wrappers and postage stamps to each member and officer of the Senate, not to exceed \$5 in amount each, for the purpose of distributing the various reports of the departments of State, and other public documents such as they may desire to mail to the citizens of the State.
