Saturday, February 27, 1915.

Senate called to order by the President.

Praver by Rev. Howard A. Marklev of Hallowell.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

House Bills in First Reading

House 324: An Act to amend Paragraph two of Section 13 of Chapter nine of the Revised Statutes so that the same may conform to Paragraph one of said Section as amended.

By Mr. Cole of York: An Act to amend Section 31 of Chapter 49 of the Revised Statutes of 1903, relating to Insurance and Insurance Companies. (Ordered printed and referred.)

State School for Boys and Industrial School for Girls.

By Mr. Allen of Kennebec: An Act to repeal Section 25 of Chapter 143 of Revised Statutes of 1903, relating to commitment to the Maine Industrial School for Girls.
