Thursday, February 8, 1917.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Walsh of Gardiner.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

Senate Bills on First Reading.

Senate 96. An Act relating to duplicate books of deposit, in case of loss of original.

Senate 97. An Act to amend Section 72, Chapter 52 of the Revisea Statutes, relating to increase of capital stock of trust companies.

Mr. DUTTON of Bingham: Mr. Speaker, I would like to ask unanimous consent to introduce a bill out of order under a suspension of the rules, "An Act to create the Maine Power Commission, prescribe its powers and duties, and provide for their regulation and control, and provide for the purchase or taking of water powers for the development and transmission of electricity for heating, lighting and power purposes."

Mr. BARNES of Houlton: Mr. Speaker, until we have further information of the intent and purpose of the framers of the bill than can be gained by a reading of the title, I feel obliged to object.

The SPEAKER: The Chair informs the House that it requires unanimous consent to introduce the act out of order, and the Chair rules that unanimous consent has not been obtained, and that the act can not be laid before the House.

Mr. WILSON of Portland: Mr. Speaker, I would like unanimous consent to introduce an act and resolve out of order. I will say, for the information of the House, that these two matters were just handed to me this morning,

and they relate to the "Good Roads Proposition". The committee had advertised a "Good Roads" hearing next Wednesday, and it is desired that these two matters should be before the committee at that time. In order to do this, it is necessary to have them introduced out of order this morning.

Unanimous consent being given, Mr. Wilson then presented the following:

An Act to amend Sections 7, 33 and 35 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes, relating to funds for State highways.

Resolve amending Article Nine of the Constitution so as to permit an increased bond issue for construction and improvement of State and State-aid highways.
