SENATE

Thursday, March 17, 1927

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. Horace B. Has-

kell of Gardiner.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Mr. BUZZELL of Oxford: Mr. President, in order to correct a technical error I move that we reconsider our action of yesterday whereby we passed to be engrossed House Document 23, An Act relating to the excise tax on railroads.

The PRESIDENT: Out of order, the Senator from Oxford, Senator Buzzell moves that the rules be suspended and that we reconsider our vote whereby we passed to be engrossed An Act relative to the excise tax on railroads, the purpose of the reconsideration being only to correct a technical error. Is it the pleasure of the Senate that this motion prevail?

The motion to suspend the rules

and reconsider, prevailed.

Mr. BUZZELL: Mr. President, I now move that we adopt House Amendment A in concurrence.

The PRESIDENT: Does any Senator care to hear the amendment read? Is it the pleasure of the Senate that we adopt House Amendment A in concurrence?

The motion to adopt in concurrence prevailed and the bill as amended by House Amendment A was passed to be engrossed.

Papers from the House disposed of in concurrence.

From the House: Resolve, making an appropriation for a nurse's home at Augusta State Hospital. (S.D. 134)

(In Senate, March 1, passed to be engrossed and sent down for concurrence.)

In the House, passed to be engrossed as amended by House Amendment A in non-concurrence. In the Senate:

The PRESIDENT: Does any senator care to hear the amendment read?

Mr. FOSTER of Kennebec: I would like to have the amendment read, Mr. President.

(The Secretary read House Amendment A.)

Mr. FOSTER: I will now move, Mr. President, that the matter petabled pending adoption of the amendment.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will state that the next motion should be to reconsider the vote whereby this resolve was passed to be engrossed, the Chair having allowed the reading of the amendment.

Mr. FOSTER: Then, Mr. President, the proper motion is—?

The PRESIDENT: The proper motion is to reconsider the vote whereby we passed the resolve to be engrossed.

Thereupon on motion by Mr. Foster of Kennebec the Senate reconsidered its former action whereby the resolve was passed to be engrossed, and on further motion by the same senator the resolve and House Amendment A were tabled pending adoption of the amendment.

From the House: An Act prescribing the effect of corporate bylaws and the authority of officers of corporations to execute notes and other instruments. (H. D. 287)

(In Senate, March 9, passed to be engrossed in non-concurrence.)

Orders

Mr. Morrison of Franklin presented the following order and moved its passage: Ordered, the House concurring, that all petitions and remonstrances presented after four o'clock in the afternoon, March 18th, shall be referred to the next Legislature.

CARTER of Androscoggin: Mr. President, I would like to offer an amendment to this order that the time be extended to March 25th for the reception of remonstrances-from the 18th to the 25th-and I would say in support of this amendment that my sole reason for making it is that there is a hearing to be held a week from today, Thursday, which has atracted more or less attention throughout the state. Whether or not it has been advertised as yet I do not know but if it hasn't of course the Senator from Franklin, Senator Morrison might not have known it. It is a hearing on the primary petitions and as the people all over the state are taking more or less interest in this one way or another and as I know that a lot of remonstrances and other petitions are in the course of preparation, it would be rather too bad to cut out the reception of these particular remon-That is my sole reason strances. for offering this amendment.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Carter, moves that we strike out the figure 18 after the word "March" in this order and substitute therefor the figure 25. Is it the pleasure of the Senate to so amend this order?

The motion to amend prevailed and the order as so amended was passed.
