Wednesday, January 9, 1935.

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by Rev. W. P. Bradford of Hallowell.

Journal of yesterday read and approved.

Papers from the House, disposed of in concurrence.

The following bills were received and on recommendation of the committee on reference of bills were referred to the following committees:

Banks and Banking

Mr. Pinansky of Cumberland presented Bill "An Act to Amend the Law Relating to Savings Banks Investments." (S. P. 86)

The same Senator presented Bill "An Act to Amend the Law Relating to Industrial Banks Investments." (S. P. 87)

(500 copies of each ordered printed).

Sent down for concurrence.

Judiciary

Mr. Burkett of Cumberland presented Bill "An Act to extend the Charter of the Quebec Extension Railway Company." (S. P. 88) Sent down for concurrence.

Salaries and Fees

Mr. Fernald of Waldo presented Bill "An Act Relating to the Salary of the Attorney-General." S. P. 89) (500 copies ordered printed). Sent down for concurrence.

Mr. Burkett of Cumberland presented Memorial to the President of the United States and the Public Works Administrator in Regard to a Sea Wall and Promenade at Old Orchard Beach.

McDonald of Washington presented Memorial to the President of the United States urging the Undertaking and Completion of the Quoddy Project in Eastport.

Orders

Mr. Burkett of Cumberland presented the following order moved its passage: and

ORDERED, the House concurring,

that no employee of the Eightyseventh Legislature, or of any committee or branch thereof, shall during the term of such employment, serve as legislative counsel or agent for, or accept remuneration for such services from any person, firm, corporation or association interested in any matters pending before this legislature.

Mr. FERNALD of Waldo: Mr. President, I move that this order lie upon the table.

Mr. BLAISDELL of Hancock: Mr. President, may I ask if the Senator from Waldo, Senator Fernald, will assign a date for the consideration of this matter?

Mr. FERNALD: Mr. President, I will assign next Wednesday morning, a week from today.

Mr. BLAISDELL: Mr. President, I see no reason why a matter that may be quite as important as this should not be settled and adjusted between the two branches of the Legislature prior to the organization of the committees, and for that reason I would like to move that the matter be especially assigned for

tomorrow morning.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from Hancock, Senator Blaisdell, moves to amend the motion of the Senator from Waldo, Senator Fernald, that the order be laid upon the tells and experiently confirmed for the table and especially assigned for tomorrow morning. Is it the pleasure of the Senate that the amendment be adopted?

Mr. FERNALD: Mr. President, I would like to offer a further amendment that the Senator from Hancock, Senator Blaisdell, be permitted also to organize the commit-

tees on Labor and Salaries and Fees.
The PRESIDENT: The Chair rules that the Senator from Waldo, Senator Fernald, is out of order. The question is whether or not this order will be tabled and assigned for consideration for tomorrow morning. Is it the pleasure of the Senate that the amendment offered by the Senator from Hancock, Sen-ator Blaisdell, be adopted and that the matter be especially assigned for tomorrow morning?

Mr. SCHNURLE of Cumberland:

The PRESIDENT: Does the Chair understand that the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Schnurle, asks for a division?

Mr. SCHNURLE: Yes, Mr. President.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator

from Cumberland, Senator Schnurle, asks for a division. As many as are in favor of the matter being assigned for tomorrow morning will rise in their places and stand until counted. Those opposed will then rise and stand until counted.

A division of the Senate was had. Twenty-one having voted in the affirmative and eight in the negative, the amendment offered by the Senator from Hancock, Senator Blaisdell, that the order be especially assigned for tomorrow morning, was adopted.

The PRESIDENT: The question now is upon whether or not the order will lie upon the table for consideration tomorrow morning. Is this the pleasure of the Senate?

Mr. SCHNURLE: No, Mr. President.

The PRESIDENT: Does the Chair understand that the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Schnurle, asks for a division again?

Mr. SCHNURLE: Yes, Mr. President.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from Cumberland, Senator Schnurle, asks for a division. All those in favor of the order lying on the table will rise in their places and stand until counted. Those opposed will then rise and stand until counted. A division of the Senate was had.

A division of the Senate was had. Four having voted in the affirmative and twenty-five in the negative the motion to table and assign did not prevail.

The PRESIDENT: The question now is on the motion of the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Burkett, that the order receive passage. Is this the pleasure of the Senate?
