HOUSE

Wednesday, January 22, 1941.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Reverend Mr. Mor-rison of Winslow.

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

Resolves from the Senate requiring reference disposed of in concurrence

From the Senate: Bill "An Act Forbidding Parking Motor Vehicles near Hydrants" (H.

P. 249) (L. D. 88) Came from the Senate, referred to the Committee on Motor Vehicles in non-concurrence.

Mr. PAYSON of Portland: Mr. Speaker, I present an Order amending House Rule No. 10, and give notice that I shall ask for its passage on the next legislative day. I call your attention to Rule No. 10 of the House:

"The seat which a member draws at the commencement of the session shall be his during the session, unless he shall have leave of the Speaker to change it."

The intention of that provision is that only House Members shall occupy these seats within the rail. At the present moment it may not be of any particular importance that others may sit in these seats. Later in the session, when you are having divisions on questions of great importance here, it may happen that there may be a miscount or some persons improperly sitting in these seats would be counted. That is the reason for the amendment I am now presenting and will ask you to consider for passage tomorrow.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Portland, Mr. Payson, presents an Order involving the amendment of House Rule No. 10 and requests that the Clerk read the Order.

Thereupon, the Order was read by the Clerk as follows:

ORDERED, that Rule No. 10 of the House Rules be hereby amended by adding the following: "And no other person shall be permitted to occupy a member's seat at any time during a Session of the House."

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Portland, Mr. Payson, now gives notice that he will ask for the passage of the Order on the next legislative day and moves that the Order lie on the table. Is this the pleasure of the House?

The motion prevailed and Order was tabled pending passage.
